

### Allegheny College Celebrates Stonewall 25

MEADVILLE, PA—A series of events in celebration of the 25th anniversary of Stonewall will be held at Allegheny College. The rebellion at Stonewall in New York City in 1969 is recognized as the birthplace of the modern lesbigay human rights movement. Allegheny's campus commemoration of this historical event will be held on March 6 - 16.

The **Stonewall 25 Celebration** is a project of the Allegheny College Committee in Support of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual People. Highlighting the series will be a lecture by noted author Martin Duberman and a concert by the gay a capella group *The Flirtations*. In addition, other events including a timeline display, lecture, workshop, video showings, and a performance of the musical *Cabaret* are scheduled during the eleven day period.

> Martin Duberman will speak on "Reclaiming the Gay and Lesbian Past" on Sunday, March 6th at 8 p.m. in Ford Chapel. Duberman, a renowned historian, playwright and activist, is the author of 15 books, including the recently published *Stonewall*. In


> Stonewall, Duberman traces



the lives of six people who were drawn into the struggle for gay and lesbian rights as a result of the upheaval at the Stonewall Inn and the

events that followed. He is also the author of the acclaimed biography Paul Robeson; Cures: A Gay Man's

Odyssey; and (as co-editor) the Lambda Award-winning Hidden from History. He is currently distinguished professor of history at Lehman College and the CUNY Graduate Center, and the founder and director of the Center for Lesbian and Gay Studies (CLAGS) at CUNY. Numerous vendors will offer lesbigay literature, including Duberman's works, and Stonewall 25 and other merchandise for sale following the lecture. Admission is free.



The Flirtchions will appear in concert at Ford Chapel on Tuesday, March 15 at 8 pm. The Flirts began singing on the streets of New York's Greenwich Village in 1988. 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Am I Gay? They appear in Jonathan Demme's film, Philadelphia, and will soon be performing at Carnegie Hall. They are known as the world's most famous openly gay, politically active, multi-cultural a cappella singing group. As their name suggests, The Flirtations are mostly about fun. Audiences have to listen closely because they like nothing more than taking doo-wop classics and bending the words to suit their purposes -"Mr. Sandman, send me a dream. Make him the cutest boy that I've ever seen." Their music includes songs from the Fifties, ballads, rock, folk songs, gay anthems, salsa, and even a lullaby. A "Flirt with the Flirts" reception will follow their Allegheny appearance. General seating concert tickets are \$10, \$5 with any student ID. A special package which includes reserved seating and the reception is \$20, \$10 with any student ID.







### In Review:

Philadelphia (TriStar Pictures 1993) Tales of the City (PBS)

Hello everyone! As you know, gays and lesbians made significant strides toward being a more visible force in 1993, especially in the media. It looks as though our efforts are paying off on the big and small screens. 1994 is only a month old, but we have already seen two very distinctive—and very different—films depicting gays and lesbians in a non-judgmental, positive light.

The more high-profile of the two is, of course, the film Philadelphia, directed by Jonathon Demme. Demme, you'll recall, directed the Oscar-winning Silence of the Lambs, a film that, while well-done, presented a transvestite/transsexual as its horrific killer. Perhaps in response to the protest from the lesbigay community, Demme has crafted a film with an HIVpositive gay man as its main character. Tom Hanks is wonderful beyond words as Andrew Beckett, the lawyer who, along with battling KS and lowered T-Cell counts, hauls his phobic bosses into court because they fired him on the basis of his HIV status. Denzel Washington plays Joe Miller, a TV-cartoon lawyer ("If you've been hurt in an accident..."). Miller is African-American, married, and a new father. He is also homophobic.

Balancing out the intense seriousness of *Philadelphia*'s subject matter is the breezy, witty PBS production of Armistead Maupin's *Tales of the City*. Based on a series of books written by Maupin, the miniseries begins in 1976 San Francisco, at the mythical 28 Barbary Lane, headed by eccentric landlady Anna Madrigal (Olympia Dukakis).

Although it is described as a film, what it really plays as is a very witty and well-written soap opera. Maupin's plotting is as tight as any daytime drama, and he leaves the viewer with several unforgettable images-the towering headdresses, the roller skating drag queens in nun's habits, the classic clothes and hairstyles of the 1970s. I loved the character of Anna Madrigal (her secret is a huge surprise) but most of us reading this will relate to the three twentysomething characters: Michael "Mouse" Tolliver (Marcus D'Amico) a fresh-faced gay emigre from Florida; Mona Ramsey (Chloe Webb), Michael's bisexual roommate with Drucilla locks; and Mary Ann Singleton (Laura Linney), the 4-H type from Cleveland who lands in the middle of Oz-and soon learns she's definitely not in Kansas anymore. I must add that I loved Tales of the City more simply because it was so slice-of-life and so many strong gay references weren't compromised. In the end, Tales of the City was also more satisfying.

For those of you who are interested, both of these films will soon be on videocassette. *Tales* should be easier to watch its six hours in that format.

One final word: If you liked *Philadelphia* or *Tales* of the City and want to see more of the subject matter, write the movie studio (TriStar)! Write WQLN, WNED or whatever your PBS affiliate is, and thank them for presenting.it. You can do things on a local level. Plays with gay themes or subthemes have been presented by both the Erie Playhouse (*The Sum of Us*) and the Roadhouse Theater (*Cabaret*) in the last year. Write them and tell them you'd like to see more. Or most importantly, if you don't wish to vote with your pen, then vote with something even more powerful—your wallet!

Well, it's February and that means the sighting of cupids, hearts and flowers just about everywhere in commemoration of romantic love. Perhaps there is no better time than this to think about how we, as lesbians and gay men, acknowledge and celebrate our lives, loves and relationships. Let's take a minute to reflect upon what rituals and traditions and celebrations we have established in our loving partnerships. It is through these that our relationships gain a sense of history, meaning in the present and direction for the future.

When two heterosexual persons decide to enter into marriage, there is usually much tradition that is followed that helps the couple gain family, society and legal support and affirmation. There are the engagement rings, parties, showers, bachelor parties and the wedding ceremony itself. After the wedding, there's the honeymoon, and of course, yearly anniversaries. Perhaps, it is these rituals that enable straight couples to approach marriage with the expectation that it will be permanent. While most gay couples enter relationships with hopes that it will be long lasting.

Rituals, traditions and celebrations are an integral part of life. It is through them that we are able to see and experience the emotional ties that connect us to our families, lovers, children and friends. Rituals, traditions and celebrations give us a way to be playful, thoughtful, and to explore the meaning of our lives. They provide us the place and experience to build and

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honor intimate relationships, as well as a channel to rebuild and/or rework important interpersonal relationships.

So, how can we begin to celebrate our gay and lesbian relationships? For those in committed relationships or considering entering into one, why not have a ceremony. It need not be a large, expensive gay counterpart to a heterosexual marriage. It can be a small, quiet affair with a few friends and family, just friends, or with just the couple. Whatever form it takes, the important thing is that it must have meaning to both people involved. Take the time to remember and honor yearly anniversaries and important dates of your relationship. As a couple, establish your own traditions for holidays and special dates, yet give yourselves permission to stop or modify old traditions when they become tiresome, lose meaning or create stress or conflict. Spend time with your partner identifying and discussing what household rituals are enjoyable, meaningful and desired. In my home, long Sunday mornings drinking coffee and reading newspapers followed by afternoons of antique hunting are a tradition I wouldn't give up easily, and one that I look forward to all week long. However, household rituals that become restrictive, expected, and cause pain need to be changed or eliminated.

One way to celebrate our loving relationships, and one that is not that easily available in the Erie area, is talking and sharing stories with other lesbian and gay couples. In sharing the joys, hurts, struggles and rewards of being in a relationship couples can gain support and validation. Might there be a need for a couples group in Erie which would provide support and social opportunities? I believe there is, and I would be interested in starting such a group. ### Local HIV/AIDS News

### AIDS Council Disbands; Will Distribute Funds

At a mid-January meeting, the now-defunct AIDS Council of Erie County, Inc. agreed to dissolve the Board of Directors and distribute assets to area organizations involved in the fight against AIDS.

The Council is currently awaiting final distributions from the Northwest Regional Alliance to pay outstanding debts; any leftover will be added to the \$5,300 Direct Client Service (DCS) fund and divided between agencies requesting funding.

The DCS fund, always a point of contention within the lesbigay community, will not be used to pay any debts.

Jim Molczan, a Board member, stated that the Council is soliciting AIDS organizations to apply for the remaining money, which will be distributed by early March. Your group must be active and located in Erie County. Contact Carolyn Beck at the Erie County Health Department, (814)451-6700.

The *Erie Gay Community Newsletter* will announce to which organizations the funds are distributed when this information is made available.

### Episcopal Outreach Ministry

The following is a message from Sue B. Kuebler, from the HIV/AIDS Outreach Ministry of the Cathedral of St. Paul (Episcopal):

"Individuals who had taken advantage of the AIDS Council of Erie County's food pantry should keep in touch with their case managers for information regarding these services.

"The HIV/AIDS Outreach Ministry of the Cathedral of St. Paul, 134 W. 7th St., Erie, is in the process of expanding their existing food pantry to include those individuals who had been receiving groceries from the Council.

"All case managers have been contacted and, as was the practice of the AIDS Council, referrals from case managers determining eligibility will be required. All volunteers of the food pantry are required to sign STATEMENTS OF CONFIDENTIALITY. Look

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for operations to begin in February (assuming the weather cooperates).

"The HIV/AIDS Outreach Ministry began in 1989.

"We currently offer educational programs to church and secular organizations. Instructors are American Red Cross-certified.


"Healing services are offered at the Cathedral following the 10 a.m. services every Sunday. In addition, special services of healing for those infected and affected by HIV/AIDS are provided several times a year. The local chapter of Integrity meets on a monthly basis at the Cathedral as well.

"It is the Mission of this ministry to provide a Christian response to the pandemic of HIV/AIDS. For more information contact the Cathedral of St. Paul (located directly across the street from the Erie County on W. 6th Street). Call 452-3779."

### World AIDS Day Corrections

In last month's reporting of World AIDS Day activities in Erie we made two omissions of important information:

The HIV/AIDS Outreach Ministry of the Episcopal Church *co-organized* the activities *with* the AIDS Council of Erie County. Our reporting gave the mistaken impression that the AIDS Council was the sole organizer of the activities; while the Council did do a lot of organizing around the event, it is important to note that the Outreach Ministry did a lot of work as well.



Also, emcee at the event in the park was Carolyn Beck, President of the AIDS Council, who also read the proclamation of World AIDS Day.

### Friends From the HeartGoing Full Tilt

The newly formed AIDS organization Friends from the Heart has picked up steam and is rapidly gaining the support of Erie's lesbigay community.

At the January 15 meeting, Friends discussed the structure of the organization and quickly agreed to limit the Board of Directors to three. Deb Gabler-Monohon, area AIDS case manager and unofficial leader of the group, stressed "This will be a working board." Although the Friends agreed that a consumer, a health care professional, and perhaps an individual with a public relations background would be sought for the positions, Gabler-Monohon emphasized that capable, caring individuals would not be excluded simply because they lack professional qualifications. She noted that Friends was not interested in people looking to procure "another feather in their cap."

Area professionals have pledged to work on the Articles of Incorporation and accounting. The group is seeking individuals with experience in By-Laws.

The atmosphere at the meeting was incredibly upbeat. With the announcement that almost \$2000 had been raised before even having had an official fund-raiser, Friends debated the merits of making a major purchase of a new nutritional supplement. These compassionate individuals, while understanding the grim reality of their work, were obviously grateful to

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even be in the position to discuss helping the HIVaffected community.

"Harry Miller and the people at la bella bistro have been very generous," said Gabler-Monohon. "They raised \$1,000 for us, from First Night Erie, from the red ribbon Christmas tree they had at the restaurant, and one employee donated all the tips he collected one night." She also cited Glass Growers Gallery and the Charles Daley Foundation as donors. And she noted that the 114 pounds of food donated at the Jan.22 Bridges dance was immediately put to use the day after it was received.

Friends From the Heart formed late last year to provide for the immediate needs of people with HIV infection and AIDS. Envisioned as simply a fundraising source, the organization quickly developed a mission which offers referrals, support, and therapeutic benefits for both consumers and volunteers.



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## National/World News Bits

Ugly Words in Wilkes-Barre

WILKES-BARRE, Pa.—At a meeting Dec. 21, city councilman Al Boris said that gays should be shot ("At least half of them anyway.") Shortly after that, he accused gays of molesting children and "recruiting" retarded people for sex.

Boris made the remarks while discussing the issue of gay men having sex in city parks. During a meeting at which he apologized for the remarks, Boris criticized federal spending for AIDS research because gays with HIV/AIDS "are getting what they deserve."

Civil rights groups and Wilkes-Barre's gay/lesbian community are concerned about the implications and effects of Boris' remarks. The furor has helped the gay/lesbian com-

munity there to become organized.

### Homophobia and Racism Linked

CINCINNATI--A study of schoolage children indicates that anti-gay and racist attitudes go together.

The study was conducted on 369 white middle-class school children frrom grades 3-11, and was conducted by Janet G. Baker, a psychologist at the University of Cincinnati.

Among the findings:

As they become older, children become less racist, or at least express it less. But as boys grow older they are less interested in having black friends; girls interest in having black friends doesn't change with their age.

The boys were more prejudiced than girls toward gay males. They both had about, the same attitudes toward lesbians.

Children with strong anti-gay attitudes were also very racially prejudiced.

"Maybe it's a matter of power and looking down on all the people you think are at the bottom," Baker said in an interview with USA Today.

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### Inman Denies He's Gay

WASHINGTON, Jan 18—When Bobby Ray Inman suddenly withdrew as secretary of defense nominee, he denied that rumors of his being gay had anything to do with it.

Inman said that the rumors originated with a 1980 decision he made, while at the National Security Agency, to not revoke the security clearance of a gay employee. "When I made that decision, a very pragmatic one, to keep the gay employee on at NSA there were lots of allegations, whispers, suggesting that I must be of comparable persuasion, else I wouldn't have

made the decision, " said Inman. "All of the law enforcement and security agencies were adverse to the decision."

Inman cited aversion to media criticism and public scrutiny as reasons for his withdrawal.

President Clinton reportedly nominated the retired admiral as a step toward healing his relationship with the military, which had been damaged during the gays in the military controversy.

### **Brit Bits**

LONDON, Jan 11—Britain's Conservative Party, which campaigned last fall on traditional moral values, is being accused of hypocrisy after having been rocked by a number of moralityrelated scandals within a two-week period. Much was made of one Conservative member of Parliament who revealed that while on vacation he shared a bed

with another male but insisted he didn't have sex with him. A number of men resigned when certain aspects of their own lives were revealed: A cabinet minister who fathered child out of wedlock, another who had an affair with a party delegate, an aide who profited from a government housing scheme. The transportation minister resigned after it was revealed that his wife killed herself because of an adulterous affair he was having. Another minister is in trouble now since he admitted to having had a number of mistresses.



LONDON, Jan 21—The British army's new code of conduct prohibits homosexual activity, adultery, and marriages between officers and noncommissioned ranks.

LONDON, Jan 21—A British study says that only one man in 90 is an "active homosexual." According to that study, only 3.5 per cent of men admitted to ever having had a male partner, and only 6.1 percent admitted to any sort of "homosexual experience" (which could include simply touching) at any time in their lives. 1.4 percent said they had had a male partner during the year previous to the report. Of the women surveyed, 1.7 percent admitted to having had a lesbian partner, and 3.4 percent admitted having any sort of "homosexual" experience with another female.

Britons opposed to gay rights point to the study as proof that the gay and lesbian population is much smaller than the one-in-ten figure that has been accepted since the 1948 Kinsey Report. David Smith of the England's *Gay Times* magazine, challenged the study. "If people are asked in their homes whether they are homosexual, they are likely to say 'no," he said.

The study is from a book entitled *Sexual Behaviour in Britain*, which has just been released.

LONDON—The above study may affect a debate, now going on in the British House of Commons, on the lowering of age of consent for gays from 21 years of age to 16. Gay rights activists have argued that the law discriminates, because the age of consent for heterosexuals is and has been 16. The issue will go to a vote at the end of January.

### Gay Couples at Divinity School

NEWYORK—Committed same-sex couples may now reside in the seminary housing of a leading Episcopal divinity school.

The board of trustees at the General Theological Seminary approved the policy with the hopes that it would help the church to deal with the issue of homosexuality. The decision was partly a result of a lesbian professor who filed a complaint that she could not live with her female partner because it was against school policy; she had taken her complaint to the New York City Commission on Human Rights.

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In 1991, the Episcopal Church General Convention passed a resolution affirming that sexual union is only acceptable within heterosexual marriage. That resolution has created a serious and ongoing controversy within the Episcopal Church. About a dozen Episcopal bishops have ordained gay/lesbian clergy.



### Stonewall 25

### March on the United Nations

The 25th anniversary of the start of the Gay Liberation movement is next June and celebrations are being planned.

The March on Washington was a political demonstration for equal rights, reminding the country how far we have yet to go. This June the Gay/Lesbian movement will celebrate its 25th anniversary, remembering how far we have come since drag queens turned on abusive New York City police.

A tiny article in the *New York Times*, dated June 28, 1969, barely noticed the social earthquake. "Hundreds of young men went on a rampage in Greenwich Village shortly after 3am yesterday, after a force of plain-clothes men raided a bar that police said was well-known for its homosexual clientele. Thirteen persons were arrested and four policemen injured. The young men threw bricks, bottles, garbage, pennies and a parking meter at the policemen."

The *New York Post* reported, "A police raid on the Stonewall Inn...triggered a near riot today. As persons seized in the raid were driven away by police, hundreds of passersby shouted 'Gay Power' and 'We Want Freedom' and laid siege to the tavern with an improvised battering ram, garbage cans, bottles and beer cans in a protest demonstration."

Headlines in the next day's newspapers began to recognize something extraordinary was happening. "Homo nest raided, Queen bees are stinging mad," sneered the *Daily News*.

"Last weekend the queens had turned commandos and stood bra strap to bra strap against an invasion of the helmeted Tactical Police Force," the *Daily News* reported. "Queen power reared its bleached blond head in revolt. New York City experienced its first homosexual riot."

The "Gay Liberation" movement had begun.

Nine years in the planning, the Stonewall 25 Celebration will mark the anniversary of the Stonewall riots. Events including a candlelight vigil will be held on Christopher Street where the three days of rioting occurred. On Sunday, June 26, 1994, more than one million Gays, Lesbians, Bisexuals and Transgender people will march on the United Nations, and a pride rally will be held in Central Park. The march and rally are being designed with a vision equal to that of a Cecil B. DeMille film. The press release from the Stonewall 25 group describes the rally as a "world class, professionally staged event with global implications and an international message. It is a message that will be delivered in principal by a core of speakers, of every color and of every religious, social, and political persuasion, gathered from the far corners of the globe."

Gay and Lesbian speakers and world leaders may make speeches from around the world with their remarks viewed on large screens in Central Park. Famous Gays and Lesbians who helped promote human rights throughout the world will be featured in film clips. Such personalities may include Eleanor Roosevelt, who figured so heavily in the drafting and passage of the Declaration of Human Rights 1948, and Dag Hammarskjold, a Gay man who was Secretary General of the United Nations from 1953 to 1961.

Organizers for the event are currently requesting artisitic performances that may be used in the Sunday rally.

The Stonewall 25 Celebration will emphasize the international nature of the movement and make a list of 12 demands of the United Nations.

The Gay Games, Unity 94, will be held in New York the week preceding Stonewall 25. The Games alone are expected to draw as many as 15,000 athletes and 500,000 spectators to New York, more than doubling the Vancouver Gay Games.

Martina Navratilova, former baseballumpire Dave Pallone, and Olympic gold-medal winner Bruce Hayes are members of the host committees, recruiting big name athletes to the games.

Traditionally, Pride parades around the country are held on the last Sunday of June, the Sunday of the riots. In 1994, most Pride parades have been moved up one week, so as to allow people to attend their own local Pride events in addition to Stonewall 25.

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### Stonewall 25/Erie Committee

Hello everyone, an Erie area committee has formed to promote Stonewall 25 and other Gay Pride Week events in New York City this June.

Stonewall 25 is the 25th anniversary of the riots at the Stonewall Inn in New York City, when patrons spontaneously resisted "just another night" of police harassment. It was an event that now marks the beginning of the modern Gay and Lesbian civil rights movement.

The purpose of the Stonewall 25 committee is to educate our community about the Stonewall riots, to encourage as many people as possible to attend the anniversary in New York City this June and through fund-raising to supply scholarships to people that need financial assistance to attend.

We have chartered a motorcoach to and from New York City and reserved a block of hotel rooms: the first is a five day four night mini gay vacation leaving Erie June 23, with a return on June 27. This would give one some time to catch the last three days of the Gay Games and Cultural Festival, the Candlelight March on the 25th, the March on the U.N. the 26th, and some time to do whatever you want to do in the New York City such as shop, dine, theatre and hit the club scene if you wish. This package is available for up to 40 people at \$220.00 per person quad accommodation and \$375.00 per person double. Our second package is a two day one night, leaving Erie June 25 and departing New York City late June 26. This would get you maybe some time on the club scene Saturday night or time to rest up before the March on the U.N. Sunday the 26th. This package is available for up to 40 people at \$90 per person quad. If we can fill these buses we would consider putting together more buses. So it is very important to get your reservations and deposits made as soon as possible, so if needed we can make additional accommodations. We can't stress enough, time is of the essence here because there is so much going on in New York City at this time beside the fact that one to two million gay people from all over the world are estimated to attend these events.




