



On Deck Softball Team Works Together

In the On Deck women's softball team, they're proving that straights and gays can get along together just fine.

"It's a wonderful group of women," says coach Bill Dewey. "The whole bunch likes each other, and it shows in the great way they play the game. Mutual respect, that's the key to a good team."

And what a team they are—they're defending major champions, ninth in the nation!

"'It's not me," insists Dewey. "Just a bunch of women with good attitude."

Dewey, 43, has been coaching women's softball for eight years—five for On Deck. He started playing when he was 17. Bad knees made him quit about ten years ago.

He admits that he wasn't too sure about what to expect when he started coaching women's softball. "I hadn't been around gay women before and I wasn't sure I'd be comfortable," he says. "But I found they're just human beings like everyone else. Actually, I could honestly say I came to love and respect just about all the gay women who've been on the team over the years."

The gay women, straight women, and coach all party together, do New Year's Eve, sometimes even do Lizzie's.

Do any of the husbands or boyfriends ever get jealous or concerned about their wives and girlfriends being on a team with gay women? "I've never heard anything," Dewey says, laughing, "But if I did we'd probably tell them to get out of our faces!"

If you live in Florida, you can worry about heat and crime. If you live in large metropolitan areas, you can worry about a divided lesbigay community, some of which seem to spend more time being annoyed than anything.

Another reason I feel the way that I do is because I know that even the most progressive areas had to develop. San Francisco was not built in a day. All the progress happened because folks did stuff. Look at all the things that are going on here- we have a newsletter and folks who advertise in it, the student groups out on wonderful celebrations for Coming Out Day last year and probably will again. We have had Margie Adam, Leah Zichari, Susan Herrick, the Flirtations, Romanovsky & Phillips, the national community theater premiere of *Falsettos*, and other speakers and acts I can't even remember. LGLV has gotten out the Voters Guide, a nice reception for Tom Paniccia and a very successful skating party. Allegheny College is having a course on "Before and After Stonewall." There are groups that have started or are starting in Meadville, Bradford and Warren (members of whom have been heard to comment on how much there is to do when they visit Erie.) We have a community that basically gets along with each other relatively well.

Just think about it, okay?

One final non-related item: Micheal and I frequently catch Comedy Central, which has actually a fair amount of gay and gay-themed stuff, especially *Kids in the Hall.* Scott Thompson is fab! One sketch had Scott smooching another very nice guy. After seeing *Melrose Place* and *Northern Exposure* wimp out of showing same-sex kissing between guys, it was a refreshing change to see it at any level. Entertainment Notes

- A NOW OUT: Local alternative band The Void has a new recording out called Now. On this album, which has been dubbed a work of self-discovery, one of the most popular cuts is a song called "Closet Land," about gay/lesbian identity. Greg Ropp, who composed and wrote the song, says the individual in the song is a composite of several people he has known. "The person is questioning who they D are," explains Ropp. "They decide that they are going to accept themselves regardless of what Mom or Dad or anyone else thinks." The song has even found its way onto the jukebox at the Boro Bar, where it gets a lot of play. Members of the Void are straight, but they have a gay following, and are very gay-positive. "We're for everyone," says Ropp. "It's so ridiculous that people would discriminate against someone because they're gay. I agree with Kurt Cobain when he told his fans that if they didn't like gays and others they could just get lost. I say, 'Keep on living!'" The Void's Now is available on tape or CD from Digg Dios, Record Den, Record Country, Home Video Exchange (Edinboro), Graham's Used Records and Tapes, and Boro Tunes. It can also be bought at the Void's performances.

MICHAEL EHRENS ART SHOW: Local artist Michael Ehrens will be showing some of his works at Cup-a-Ccino's starting in July. There is one

piece with two men embracing, but the gay sensibility of most of his pieces is much more subtle. "Being gay is significant in my life, and therefore it comes through in my pieces, but not all of my work has something to do with being gay," says Ehrens. "Also, there is an ambiguity of gender in many of my paintings, so you can pass by the gay aspect of it." The works being shown were done over the past year—during which time Ehrens came out and transferred from Gannon University to Edinboro, where he felt freer to be him-



Ehrens does have some erotic works, but these will not be on display at this show. "I'm proud of that work," he says, "but it's not appropriate for this particular show." The show will be on display July 17 till August 7.

The first part of the epic, Angels in America: Millenium Approaches, also won a Tony for Best Play last year. In receiving the award, Kushner said, "I'd like to dedicate this award to my gay and lesbian brothers [sic] the world over who are fighting for both a cure (for AIDS) and for citizenship." Steven Spinella won for Best Actor in his role of a gay man fighting AIDS (Spinella won Best Featured Actor in Angels last year). This year's Angels also received Best Featured Actor.
- ✿ BUFFALO THEATER: Hag Theater will present Hollandia 45, a play by lesbian writer Sarah Dreher. July 29 & 30, and August 5 & 6. At TheaterLoft, 545 Elmwood Ave.
- ERIE THEATER: The Roadhouse Theater will present Inherit the Wind, which is based on the 1925 Scopes Trial, or "monkey trial," which was considered the Trial of the Century. A school teacher in Tennessee had broken that state's fundamentalist law by teaching his class the theory of evolution. The actual trial was theatrical in and of itself, providing a fascinating clash of ideas and value systems. The play will be performed in Courtroom H of the Erie County Courthouse, 140 W. 6th, and will run from mid-July to early August. For days and times call Roadhouse at 456-5656 or consult Showcase.

- ☆ MELISSA NEWS: Melissa Etheridge is doing the theme song for the new Ellen Degeneres sitcom, renamed Ellen...VH-1 honored Etheridge for her work with PWAs in the VH-1 Honors Show (broadcast June 26)...if you'd like to catch M.E. in concert, she'll be in Cleveland July 19 (check EGCN calendar for details).
- GAY DAY AT DISNEYWORLD: About 20,000 3 lesbians and gay men showed up at the 4th "Gay Day at Disney." The event was not sponsored by Disney, and the corporation put up signs saying so. Disney did meet with the Gay Alliance, a group of gay theme-park employees, to talk about behavior guidelines. They said holding hands would be acceptable, but "passionate activity" would not be acceptable by anyone. "The purpose of the day is for our community to get together and have a good time and show the people attending the park that we're just like everyone else" said Gay Alliance member Richard Sullivan. Some Christian right activists protested before the event. About 30 protesters-mostly from Rev. Donald Wildmon's American Family Association and the anti-abortion group Operation Rescue-held up banners on the day of the event.
- ★ EURO-MTV GETS OUT THE VOTE: Europe's MTV carried on a campaign encouraging their young viewers to get out and vote in the June Europeean parliament elections. Among the appeals were interviews with young people talking about how much the new European parliament had done for equality of gay couples.

As I'm always apt to say, "It was so beautiful!" (What can I say? I was raised by flower children).


Too bad y'unz couldn't make it to The Embers that night. It was great! I'd never seen female impersonators before—well, not in a show I mean—and I just

We hosted a reception for members of our Alumni Caucus on Saturday, June 4. This is a group of approximately 50 gay/lesbian/bisexual alums and allies which was organized in October 1993. The group exists to support the goals and activities of our campus group and to serve as a resource network.


For the 1994 fall semester, a liberal studies course, "Before and After Stonewall" is being offered. The course is a historical exploration of gay and lesbian issues in the context of artistic, intellectual, social, and political movements in the U.S., England, France, and Germany. This class will form part of a proposed concentration in the Gay and Lesbian Studies which is currently being reviewed by the Curriculum Committee.

Plans are underway for National Coming Out Day Activities on campus Sunday, October 9 through Thursday, October 13, 1994. Details to come.

PA Hate Crimes Bill Stalled

Despite the support of the majority of members on the Senate Judiciary committee, the Hate crimes Bill, SB 1218, was pulled from the committee's June l4th agenda at the last minute. The move prevented a vote on the bill and significantly diminished hopes for its passage in 1994. The League of Gay and Lesbian Voters, lead advocates for the bill, set sites on preparing for 1995 while exploring what, if any, potential options are available during the current session.

The request to pull the bill from the agenda came from senator John Shumaker (R-Dauphin), and was encouraged by Senators Michael Fisher (R-Allegheny)



and Tim Shaffer (R-Butler). All three were expected to vote against the bill. Shumaker indicated he wished the bill be pulled from the agenda and to schedule a public hearing, despite the fact that a hearing was held in 1992 on the same legislation. "The public hearing was clearly an excuse to pull the bill from the agenda, rather than a serious proposal," said Chris Young, chair of LGLV. "I think that he just wanted to block the bill."

The setback came just as LGLV-Erie was preparing to blitz area bars and organizations with leaflets and last minute appeals to call Senator Andrezeski, who had not committed his vote.

Despite the disappointment in the Senate, the League encourages people to continue to let their Senators know how they feel. In addition, they should contact their state Representatives and urge their support of the House version, HB 2312, to provide momentum into 1995.

Abuse: Not Just a Straight Problem

If there is a silver lining to the revelations about O.J. Simpson's relationship to his murdered ex-wife, it is the attention it has brought to the issue of domestic violence.

Although most domestic abuse that happens in this county goes on between straight people, it certainly happens within same-sex couples as well.

Abuse isn't talked about much in our community. When I started telling people I was writing this article, some people expressed concern about "the wrong people" getting ahold of information that gay and lesbian abuse exists. They were concerned it would make us look bad.

Actually, straight homophobes have absolutely no room to put us down for having abuse in our community. The statistics on straight domestic violence are horrifying. For instance, every 15 seconds, a woman in the U.S. is beaten by her husband ex-husband, or boyfriend. Up to a third of the women who visit emergency rooms do so because of repeated assaults by boyfriends or husbands. In Canada, which has a less violent society ours, a massive study found that 29 per cent of women who were ever married or in a commonlaw relationship with a man had reported violence from a partner. Clearly, if anti-gay people really did care about "immoral relationships," they would put domestic abuse at the very top of the list.

There. Now, that "the wrong people" have been given the what-for, let's talk.

Understanding Abusive Relationships

As with O.J. Simpson, abusers—of all sexual orientations—can often have a charming, wonderful side to them. When they're good they can be very, very good, and when they're bad...well, they're capable of causing an awful lot of misery to the people who love them. It's that good side of the abuser that can cause abuse victims to stay in a relationship.

If you're dealing with an abusive relationship, it helps to understand what's going on. Lenore Walker,

in *The Battered Woman*, described the five parts of the cycle of abuse:

- 1. Conflicts and problems.
- 2. Tension builds.
- 3. Abuse takes place.
- 4. Abuser feels remorse.

5. Abuse victim feels hopeful that things will get better.

It's easy to see how this combination of fists and flowers, of rage and tenderness can be confusing. Having the component parts laid out like that, it's easier get control over the situation.

Physical Abuse

This doesn't need as much explanation as sexual and emotional abuse, because it's a lot more obvious. Punching, kicking, restraining, choking, striking with an object, are examples of physical abuse. Sometimes the violence and the injuries get worse.

Emotional Abuse

Emotional abuse can sometimes be more destructive than physical violence. Unfortunately, the destructiveness of emotional abuse is not widely recognized; in fact, some supposedly non-violent people emotionally abuse others without dealing with the fact that they are inflicting harm. Emotional abuse includes threats of physical abuse, humiliation, accusations, insults, ridicule, "crazy-making" lying, spying, and isolating someone from friends and family.

Sexual Abuse

Sex should feel good for both partners.

Sexual abuse has more to do with abuse than sex. If your partner is coercing you into having sex that makes you feel anger, helplessness, humiliation, pain or fear, it is abusive sex.

There are those "differently-pleasured" folks who get sexual pleasure out of play-acting abusive sex. That sort of sex may disturb some people, but if two people *both* seek out that sort of sex play, *both* get enjoyment out of it, and in reality are *both* in control of what's going on, it isn't really sexual abuse. Lumping real sexual abuse and consensual sex-play together harms the cause of getting people to take sexual abuse seriously.

One issue of particular concern for abused gay and bisexual men is safer sex. Victims of abusive men often have unprotected sex because of the very real fear that they will end up being beaten if they insist on condoms. Although people in abused relationships sometimes stay with their abuser in the hopes that things will get better, this is one area where that thinking is absolutely dangerous: bruises and hurt feelings may go away with time, but HIV infection does not.

Self-Esteem

Self-esteem is a big problem for abuse victims. An abuser can tear down a victim's self-esteem, by constant ridicule, accusations, insults, and saying things like "You're ugly and noone else would want you." Also, the victim may start to feel stupid for staying in an abusive relationship, and that causes more loss of selfesteem. To get the strength to get out of an abusive situation, you need to take to heart that you do deserve something better. It's not all that easy, especially if you've started believing what your abuser tells you about being undesirable or incredibly stupid, but that's where you have to start. Get counseling, choose the company of people who treat you well, and check out the self-help sections at book stores and libraries. You really do deserve better.

Excuses

Abusers tend to blame others for their abusive behavior. They had a bad childhood, things are bad at work, they got laid off, their partner screws up so much that they have to kick them around to get them to straighten out, the booze did it, the drugs did it, and on and on and on.

Certainly if bad things have happened to the abuser, that's a shame. But it's not an excuse for abuse. Whatever their partner might be doing that bothers them, it's not an excuse for abuse. Alcohol and drugs also are not excuses for abuse.

If your partner is okay till he or she gets drunk or high, find out about living with someone who has this problem. One thing you need to understand is they probably aren't going to change until they're good and teady, and even then they're going to have to work at recovery. Recovery is something that takes a lifetime commitment, not just a month or two. Read and/or

Person with HIV Forms New Support Group By Robert Saunders

When I returned home from L.A. in 1990, just finding out I was HIV positive, I had a lot of fear of being rejected from friends and family. I learned Erie had an AIDS Council and quickly got in contact with them. I found that they had support groups for individuals with HIV and AIDS. I attended these support groups every week. They offered two kinds of group meetings. One was a type of spiritual healing and the other more of an education type which kept us alert of new drugs and therapies. Eventually, a lot of my fears about HIV and AIDS began to diminish and the groups allowed me to take on my responsibility to change my thinking and remain healthy. I can honestly say that attending those meetings contributed greatly to my good health today. They gave me a positive foundation on which I based my positive outlook on living, even on a day-to-day basis. After about two years, these group meetings were terminated. It was a real shame, because I believe every individual who has HIV has the right to have these meetings available to them. The group that I'm getting together is much different than some support groups that are now being offered, in that this group will be run by the people attending the meetings. It is very important that everyone attend the first few meetings to offer their input and help shape the group into what is needed most. (For example, will this be a group geared toward education or geared toward keeping a good mental outlook?) I am glad to be able to organize a support

group of this nature. If you need information or transportaion to this group, please call 455-8846 and ask for Bob or call 833-3764 and ask for Laurie. The first meeting will be on Wednesday July 20.

AIDS Alliance Opens Satellite Office in Erie

Acting upon client requests and a growing Erie area caseload, the Northwest Rural AIDS Alliance (NRAA) has opened an office at the Baldwin Building in downtown Erie.

The Alliance was founded in 1991 in response to a PA mandate which required the formation of seven regional coalitions to distribute AIDS monies equitably throughout the state. Clarion university was awarded the contract to administer state and federal Ryan White AIDS funding to organizations within the 13 northwestern counties serviced by the Alliance.

NRAA had provided funding for the now-defunct AIDS Council of Erie County, and currently channels funds to the Erie County Department of Health.

The services provided by NRAA include: case management and referrals, patient care funds (pharmaceutical, physician, dental, emergency, rent, utilities, supportive services, and nutritional supplements), a speakers' bureau, hotline, conference calendar, library, and an educator (currently funded only for minorities, women, and substance abuse organizations).

The Northwest Rural AIDS Alliance is located in Room 321 of the Baldwin Building, 10th and State Streets, in Erie. Office hours are 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, Monday through Friday. Although walk-in services are available, call 456-8849 for an appointment if possible. *Persons with HIV: AIDS Clinical Trials in Cleveland is Interested in You.*

"Blades for AIDS"

Some Millcreek elementary and junior high school students got some practice giving to organizations serving people with HIV/AIDS. Students at J.S. Wilson Middle School, West Lake Middle School, and Chestnut Hill Elementary raised money through a roller blade event, and donated \$1,000 to three organizations. Joe Trzbynski, director of the Erie Co. Health Dept., said the county would match the monies. About ten kids met with representatives from Hospoice of Metroplitan Erie, HIV/AIDS Outreach of the Cathedral of St. Paul, and St. Martin's Center. They asked the representatives some pretty pointed questions. They decided to give St. Martin's \$1,000, Hospice \$500 (saying it could only be spent for prescriptions), and the HIV/AIDS Ministry received \$450 (stating that \$150 was for educational materials, \$150 for the HIV/AIDS food pantry. \$150 for AIDS work in Uganda). "The teachers guided them," said Sue Kuebler of HIV/AIDS Ministry, "but these were some pretty sharp kids and they knew what they were doing."

HIV/AIDS News - World Bishop Condemns Condoms in AIDS-Ravaged Uganda

NAMUGONGO, Uganda, June 6—Roman Catholic Bishop Edward Baharagate condemned the Ugandan government's use of condoms in their efforts to fight AIDS. Uganda has one of the highest rates of AIDS in the world; about nine percent of the Uganda is infected with HIV, and the population has been decimated. The government distributes millions of free condoms in an attempt to control new infections. The Bishop stated that condoms encourage immorality and cause death. He chose to make his point at the commemoration of the 1889 martyrdom of 22 young male Christians, who were killed when they rejected the advances of a tribal king.

get counseled about living and loving someone with an alcohol or drug problem. Don't try to deal with it alone.

Getting Help

When an abused partner is ready to seek help, they are usually ashamed and afraid. Lesbian and gay abuse victims may also worry that the people they seek help from will look down on them because they are gay. If you're a victim of abuse, don't let this concern keep you from getting help. Counselors and agencies are becoming much more enlightened about dealing with samesex abuse. Consult the list in this article for help from gay-friendly counselors and agencies.

Hospitality House in Erie has a very strong policy of treating clients and employees equally, specifically naming sexual orientation several times in their affirmative action policy statement. Executive Director Linda Lyons King says, that the agency has experience in dealing with lesbian and gay clients, though they tend to need legal aid more than any of the agency's other services. "Domestic abuse draws its strength from the power of silence of the abuse victim," she says. "The abuser counts on it. When the silence is broken, the abuser loses some power."

Brenda Olson, Program Assistant for YWCA Alternatives to Violence in Jamestown, says "When people come to us for help, we deal with the issue of abuse, not their sexual orientation. Being the YWCA, we believe in equality for all. We believe you have the right to own your own body, you have the right not to be hurt by someone. I would really hate to think there are people out there who need help and aren't coming to us because they think we'll look down on them."

What if the abuser really wants to change? Getting the abuser to go to couple counseling usually doesn't work. Help that deals specifically with the abuser is not that easy to find, either. The emphasis has been on the abuse victim, because they've had the greatest need. If you know of providers of therapy for abusers, please contact *EGCN*, and we'll pass it along to our readers.

Medieval Gay Christian Wedding Texts

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—A newly-published book is already turning Christian teachings about same-sex relationships on their ear. Same-Sex Unions in Premodern Europe, written by respected Yale historian John Boswell, claims to have found early Christian ceremonies for male couples, which bear remarkable similarity to heterosexual wedding ceremonies. Critics say that the ceremonies are for blessing friendships or swearing brotherhood, not marriages. An excerpt from an 11th century Greek ceremony included in Boswell's book: "For this holy place, we beseech Thee, O Lord. That these thy servants (names) be sanctified with thy spiritual benediction, we beseech Thee, O Lord. That their love abide without offense or scandal all the days of their lives, we beseech Thee, O Lord. That they be granted all things needed for salvation and godly enjoyment of life everlasting, we beseech Thee, O Lord."

Surgeon General Elders and President Clinton Blast Religious Right

NEW YORK, June 22—Attacking what she calls "the un-Christian religious right," Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders said "We've got to be strong to take on these people who are selling out children our in the name of religion. We've got to be as aggressive as they've been." Elders made the remarks in a speech opening the four-day Lesbian and Gay Health Conference. Two days later, 87 Republican House members called for her resignation, partly in response to these remarks.

ST. LOUIS, June 22—President Clinton took off the gloves and criticized the religious right, naming Rev. Jerry Falwell. "I'm going to be far more aggressive," he promised. Clinton indicated he was fed up with being attacked by people who "put on the mantle of religion and then (use it) to justify anything they say or do."

Catholic Catechism

The new English translation of the Catechism of the Catholic Church encourages compassion and justice for gay people, calling for people with "deep-seated homosexual tendencies" to be "accepted with respect,

compassion, and sensitivity," and stating that "unjust discrimination" should be avoided. At the same time, it condemns "homosexual acts" as being "grave depravity" and is clear in stating that such behavior can never be approved of.

Vatican Lashes Out at Lesbian Moms

VATICAN CITY, June 22—After an Italian physician announced he had artificially inseminated a lesbian, the Vatican condemned lesbian mothers, lesbian artifical insemination, and homosexuality. "Homosexuals have as much love to give children as heterosexuals," said Giuseppe Ambrassa, the gynecologist who performed the procedure.

Presbyterian Uproar

WICHITA, Kan—At the Presbyterian Church's 206th General Assembly in mid-June:

Gay activists were able to cause the rejection of a proposal that single people abstain from sex and married people remain faithful. The activists objected to the proposal because it was unfair to gays: the day earlier the assembly voted to prohibit Presbyterian pastors from blessing same-sex marriages.

A big, mostly-unresolved clash over last November's "Re-Imagining" conference on women and religion. Organizers saw it as a new look at women and spirituality; critics condemned the conference as a celebration of lesbianism and paganism.

UCC: Gay Couple Hired as Joint Pastors

SEATTLE—A United Church of Christ Congregation has hired a gay male couple to share an associate pastorship. Reverends David Shull and Peter Ilgenfritz have been together about eight years. They will serve the 1,200-member University Congregational Church. It is probably the first time a church in a major denomination has given a joint pastorship to a gay couple. The United Church of Christ is a liberal Protestant denomination that allows gay and lesbian ordinations, the church received a \$10,000 donation from a family who supported the hiring.

National/World News Bits

Sweden OKs Gay Marriage

STOCKHOLM, Sweden-The Swedish parliament voted June 7 to allow same-sex couples to marry. Gay and lesbian couples will now have the right to civil marriage ceremony, and have the same benefits and obligations as heterosexual married couples, but the bill does not allow adoptions or artificial insemination for same-sex couples. In 1989, Denmark became the first country in the world to allow same-sex marriages. Norway followed suit in 1993.

Surgeon General and the Girl Scouts

WASHINGTON-In an interview with USA Weekend magazine, Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders said that lesbians should be allowed to join the Girl Scouts and become Girl Scout leaders. The Girl Scouts stated that while they do not recruit lesbians, they have never ω discriminated against them. Elders also defended an interview she did with The Advocate, in which she criticized the Boy Scouts for not allowing gay boys; the Boy Scouts do, in fact, discriminate on sexual orientation grounds. The USA Weekend interview also dealt with other issues like cigarettes and diet.

Discharged Lesbian Colonel Reinstated, Justice Dept. Appeals

SEATTLE, June 1-A federal judge reinstated a highly decorated former colonel who had been discharged from the National Guard when she revealed she was a lesbian. Former Colonel Margarethe Cammermeyer was discharged in 1992, cutting short a 26-year career in the Army and National Guard. The judge ruled the discharge unconstitutional, concluding that "the sole motivation for the exclusion of acknowledged homosexuals from the service is prejudice." The Justice Department is appealing the decision.

WASHINGTON—The Navy and Coast Guard have banned sexual orientation discrimination for their civilian employees, though uniformed personnel remain under the Pentagon's "Don't ask, don't tell" policy.

The court ruled that parent and child have the right to be together unless there are compelling reasons for removal of separation, and sexual orientation does not constitute a com-

pelling reason. Kay said she would appeal the ruling to the Virginia Supreme Court.

Ontario Nixes Civil Rights

TORONTO, Ont., June 10-In a close vote, the parliament of the Canadian province of Ontario rejected a bill that would have granted equal rights to same-sex couples. Supporters of the bill had dropped

gay adoption rights in hopes of getting at least employment rights. The gay and lesbian communities in Ontario responded in shock and anger, with activists vowing to take the civil rights fights to the courts and to work against those who defeated the bill.

Same-Sex Couples OK Here

Places that have recently approved benefits for partners of employees in same-sex couples

San Diego, California, June 3. For city workers.

Portland, Oregon, June 8— While efforts to squelch gay rights go on in the state of Oregon, Portland's city council unanimously gives same-sex couples health coverage.

Vermont, June 11—First state to offer health benefits to partners of state workers in gay/lesbian relationships.

RICHMOND, Va., June

21—Virgina Governor George Allen overrode Virgina objections from state housing commissioners approving new regulations that allowed same-sex couples to jointly obtain state housing loans.

Daughter of Anti-Gay Leader Comes Out

ATLANTA, June 22—Last year, Cobb County Commissioners became a national symbol of homophobia when they voted to stop funding the arts, which they claimed were bringing the "gay agenda" into their community. Gay activists are trying encourage businesses and organizations—most notably the 1996 Atlanta Olympic Games not to hold conferences in Cobb County. Those activists were given a boost when Shannon Byrne, daughter of County Commission Chairman Bill Byrne, came out publicly with her lover as a lesbian. "They're not speaking about family values at all," she said in an interview, "and I just feel the need to correct that."

U.S. May Give Asylum for Gay Refugees

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14-Attorney General Janet Reno stated that the Justice Department is

considering offering political asylum to gay people in situations "where someone is being persecuted in their country because they are homosexual." She said decisions would be made on a case-by-case basis.

Italy: Rabidly Anti-Gay Candidate Loses European Parliament Bid

ROME—A candidate who said gays should go to concentration camps lost his bid for a seat on the European parliament. One of the reasons Piero Buscaroli decided to run for the seat was because he was angry about pro-gay decisions that the European parliament had been making. Buscaroli's comments provoked a firestorm of protest in Europe, and embarrassed Italy's new right-wing government.

France: No Artificial Insemination for Lesbians

PARIS, June 28—The French

parliament passed a bill setting limits on a wide variety of conception and genetic technologies. Now artifical insemination is available only to couples in which both members are alive, of child-bearing age, and married or living together for two or more years. Lesbian couples and post-menopausal women may not receive test-tube fertilization.

Albanian Rights

TIRANA, Albania, June 6—"Albania. The only country in Europe without a gay organization. No longer." This was the motto of the Gay Albania Society, announcing their existence to the world. Homosexuality is still illegal in this country, punishable by a maximum prison term of ten years.






