Meadville Man Harassed and Vandalized

For two weeks in August, Harry Smith Jr., 38, of

Meadville received harassing phone calls. On August 9, his apartment was spraypainted with words like "Fag" and "Queer."

Smith had a tracer put on his phone, and called the Meadville police, who nabbed the culprit a few days later.

It turned out that his tormenter was another gay man, and Smith wonders why.

"I was amazed," said Smith. thought, Why did he

attack me like that? I didn't know him very well. We never had any problems. We 're not ex-lovers or anything. I haven't seen the guy for a year, and when I last saw him, I thought we were friends." Smith says the man, who is in his forties, is out of work, and that may have contributed to some emotional instability. But he thinks the fact that the man attacked him in a homophobic way has more to do with the self-hatred of frightened gays in the Meadville community. "I'm a little more obvious, or what you'd call 'nellie'." he says. "A lot of the guys around here act straight, and by putting me down they cover up being gay. I'm really angry about these people who live such closeted lives."

Smith praises Meadville police for treating him with respect. "None of them looked at me like, 'Well, that's what you get for being like that'," he says. "They took the information and then they got the guy who did it. One of the cops told me 'Bigotry is bigotry. Even as a cop I get called names.' Another called me from the

station and told me to call if I had any problems with the neighbors."

So far the neighbors haven't given him any prob-

lems. He also said his landlord was very understanding.

The offender will be sentenced in September.

Man Pleads Guilty to Theft of AIDS Council Funds

ERIE, Aug. I—Clarence Andrew Szoszorek, also known as Andee Childs, pleaded guilty in Erie County Criminal Court to one felony count of receiving stolen property and five misdemeanor counts.

Szoszorek had been a full-time volunteer at the Council for about a year. According to court records, he stole \$6,234.89 from the agency between November 8, 1993 and January 24, 1994.

Szoszorek was able to get the Council's acting treasurer, William Glecos, to sign checks made out to his grandmother. He would then withdraw them from his grandmother's account. Checks were made in amounts ranging from \$500 to \$2,600.

As part of the plea bargain, numerous charges were dismissed. These include six counts each of theft by failing to make required disposition of funds, theft by unlawful taking, and theft by deception.

Erie County Judge Stephanie Domitrovich will sentence Szoszorek on September 8. The felony counts carry a maximum sentence of seven years in prison and \$15,000 fine. The five misdemeanors carry a possible 25 years in prison and \$50,000 fine. First Assistant District Attorney James Vogel says that repayment of funds should be included in the sentence.

AIDS Quilt Coming to Erie

From Sue Kuebler, HIV/AIDS Ministry of the Cathedral of St. Paul:

The Episcopal Cathedral of St. Paul and its HIV/AIDS Outreach Ministry is pleased to be one of the first congregations in the country to pilot the NAMES Project's National Interfaith Quilt Program. The mission of this project is to break down barriers and increase awareness of the pandemic of HIV/AIDS.

The NAMES Project features panels, each commemorating an individuals who has been lost to AIDS. The project began in 1987, because Cleve Jones became overwhlemed by the loss and lack of government response and searched for a way to make the public understand what he and his friends were experiencing. They hung the panels from a storefront on San

Francisco's Market Street, "To take all of our individual experiences and stitch them together to make something that has strength and beauty." It was there that the Quilt began. It now has about 33,000 panels, covering 16 acres (with the walk way), and weighing 29 tons.

The Episcopal Cathedral of St. Paul is honored to be able to display two 12'x12' sections in our sanctuary from mid-November until mid-December. Planning is still incomplete, however, and we are looking for individuals who are interested in being involved in the Quilt Display Team. We are also interested in individuals from this area who may have submitted a panel to the NAMES Project. We would like those individuals to share their stories from the Quilt with others if they are willing. And we would be interested in helping people from the area to create their own their own panels, commemorating loved ones.

The NAMES Project sought out the National Episcopal AIDS Coalition (NEAC) to develop a partnership for new, and much needed, use of panels from

the Quilt. They did this for two reasons. Female Condom

Wisconsin Pharmacal is now distributing their Reality female condom to retail stores and wholesalers.

The condom was developed to give women some control over whether or not a condom is used during intercourse. The female condom is made of polyurethane (male condoms are presently made of latex or animal membrane) and have an inner ring that fits over the cervix and an outer ring that extends outside the vagina. The product has met with various reviews, some bad ("It makes a distracting noise") and some good ("The external ring provides additional stimulation," "Polyurethane feels better than latex.").

How effective would it be in preventing HIV and STD transmission? So far, the studies have concerned effectiveness in preventing pregnancies, but their results can give some idea about their use in STD prevention. In one six-month study, 13% of the women became pregnant. Because of this, the Food and Drug Administration is requiring the Reality label to state that the product had a 26% failure rate for a one-year period of time (this figure arrived at by doubling six months and 13%). The company states that if women use the product correctly and every time they have intercourse, that figure would be 5%.



Female Condom and Anal Intercourse

Can the Reality female condom be used by the passive (receptive) partner during anal intercourse for

protection against HIV?

EGCN called the Centers for Disease Control to ask. The fellow who answered at the hotline said that no studies had been done on anal intercourse with the female condom, but pointed out that it was designed specifically for penis-vagina intercourse. We asked a Dr. Bernard Branson (also at the CDC) if the inner ring could cause injury if worn for anal intercourse (it is about the diameter of a pop can). Dr. Branson indicated he didn't see this as a problem, saying, "The real question would be whether you could keep it in without slippage."

Female Condom and Cunnilingus

Could the female condom be used as a barrier method in place of a latex dam?

One problem is that the female condom doesn't cover as much as a dam would, even if you pulled it half-way out. It's also much more expensive than dams.

Study Confirms: Condoms Really Do Work If Used Right

If one partner is negative and the other posititive, how much protection do they offer the negative partner?

Researchers studied 245 heterosexual European couples where one of the partners was HIV-positive and the other HIV-negative. In each of the couples, both partners new the HIV status of the other. Yet over half of the couples did not use condoms consistently; some of those couples never used condoms when they had vaginal or anal sex. In that group, twelve people were infected by the virus. Among the couples who always used condoms when they had vaginal or anal intercourse, nobody became infected.

The study was published in the New England Journal of Medicine.

Swiss Kids Tops in Safer Sex

LONDON, Aug. 6-A new survey reveals that Swiss teenagers are most conscientious about using condoms, with 66 percent of Swiss teens (16-21 years) using condoms with a new partner. Other figures: Britain 20 percent, France 12 percent, Japan 10%.

National/World News Bits

Congress Works on Employment Protection

WASHINGTON DC—The House and Senate are working on a bill to prohibit job discrimination based on sexual orientation. The bill has gained support from both parties, and polls show that most Americans support equal employment rights for LesBiGay people. There currently is no federal legislation protecting people from discrimination because of sexual orientation.

People are being encouraged to write their U.S. Senators and Congressmembers to express support for the Employment Non-Discrimination Act.

Congressional Hearing **Examines Camp Sister Spirit** Conflict

JACKSON, Miss., July 6—Testimony about right wing harassment of the Camp Sister Spirit feminist retreat was heard by the Subcommittee on Civil and Constitutional Rights of the House Judiciary Committee. Openly-gay congressman Barney Frank (D-Mass.) conducted the hearings. Testimony was heard from Brenda and Wanda Henson, who own and run the retreat, as well as local officials, hate crimes experts, representatives of the U.S. Department of Justice, and leaders of the anti-gay Mississippi for Family Values.

Anti-Gay Measure Struck Down in Cinci

CINCINNATI, Aug. 9—A federal judge voided an anti-gay rights measure that Cincinnati voters had approved last November. U.S. District Judge S. Arthur Spiegel ruled that the measure was unconstitutional and violated First and 14th Amendment rights of gay/ lesbian people. He also issued an order that the issue may never appear on the ballot again. The city is considering an appeal, and the anti-gay rights group Equal Rights-Not Special Rights has vowed they will

Texas Gay-Slayer Sentenced to Death

KERRVILLE, Texas, Aug. 9-A man who confessed to robbing and killing a man because he was gay was sentenced to death here. The victim, Nicholas West, was kidnapped, robbed and shot to death on November 30, 1993 by Donald Aldrich. Gay rights activists expressed concern about the jury taking the case seriously because of the victim's sexual orientation, and the prosecution also addressed the issue. The jury deliberated only 30 minutes to find Aldrich guilty.

Japanese-American Convention Endorses Same-Sex Marriage

The national Japanese-American Citizens League has endorsed legalizing same-sex marriage by a vote of 57-45. Japanese-American Congressman Norman Mineta (D-CA) stood up for same-sex marriage, and is credited with having swung a number of important votes. Among the presentations made about the subject, only one was negative. Interest in the issue was apparently raised because the issue of same-sex marriage is being debated in Hawaii, where there is a large population of Japanese-Americans.

Vatican Appeals to Muslims

VATICAN CITY, Aug. 9—The Vatican is appealing to Islamic countries (including Iran) to try to

gather support against a U.N. population conference that they fear could end up being sympathetic toward gay and lesbian people and endorsing abortion. The conference will be held on Sept. 5 in Cairo, Egypt. The Vatican will be sending 16 delegates to the conference. Many Islamic newspapers in Egypt are condemning the conference.

Congress Debates How Gay Students will Be Treated

WASHINGTON—The Senate and House have been making decisions affecting how gay kids and homosexuality is dealt with in public schools.

While working on acceptance of a school funding bill, anti-gay amendments were proposed in both the House and Senate. In response, pro-gay amendments were proposed, in both the Senate and the House, which competed with the anti-gay amendments. The anti-gay amendment was defeated in the House. In the Senate, the two competing amendments are still being debated.

On August 1, the U.S. Senate voted 63-36 for a measure that would cut federal funds to school districts that teach acceptance of homosexuality. It would have forbidden counseling of gay and lesbian students, and school personnel would not have been allowed to refer them to other agencies. The measure was sponsored by conservative Senators Jesse Helms (R-N.C.) and Bob Smith (R-N.H.). To counter the Helms amendment, Sen. Ted Kennedy (D- Mass.) introduced an alternative amendment, which would considerably weaken Helms' anti-gay measure. The Kennedy amendment mandates that schools could not use federal monies "to develop materials or programs directed at youth that are designed to directly promote or encourage sexual activity, whether homosexual or heterosexual." That measure passed 99-0, which indicated that there was much more support for it than for Helms anti-gay measure. A spokesperson for the Human Rights Campaign Fund told EGCN that the Kennedy (pro-gay) amendment will probably win because there is much more support for it.

The two amendments voted on in the House were similar to the Senate amendments.

Here's how your U.S. Senators voted on the Helms measure:

For Helms amendment (anti-gay): Spector (R-PA), D'Amato (R-NY).

Against Helms amendment:

Wofford (D-PA), Moynihan (D-NY), Glenn (D-OH), Metzenbaum (D-OH).

For Kennedy amendment (not anti-gay): All.


