





► Nov 1—Keening Circle with David Butler 7:30 p.m.In this Ritual/Performance, an opportunity will be created for the participants to wail, lament, scream, cry, or stand silent as a community. We all carry pain and anger whether from the death of those close or from the sometimes lonely and difficult tribulations of everyday life. Those living in the Gay and Lesbian community are particularly aware of pain and frustration, but we rarely take the chance to formally release it, hardly every in the traditional sense of wailing and certainly never formally as a community. After a brief explanation of what is to ensue, the audience, as part of the Performance, will create the environment with sound and candles, which will accelerate into screaming and wailing. This type of performance takes an old idea that Theater is ritual and vice-versa.


- HETEROSEX, RUMORS, AND VIDEOTAPE: **☆** When he was brutally murdered back in 1978, a number of publications wrote that actor Bob Crane (best known as Colonel Hogan on Hogan's Heroes) was into the gay S/M scene and his murderer was probably some rough trade he picked up. When his accused murderer (John Henry Carpenter) was finally tried last month, a completely different picture emerged. Turns out that Crane was very heterosexual, and was obsessed with picking up girls who would agree to be videotaped blowing the Colonel's bugle. Crane and Carpenter went girl-hunting together, and when Crane finally told Carpenter he'd rather not have him along anymore, Carpenter apparently became violently angry.
- ERIE THEATER: Roadhouse Theater will be pre-☆ senting Charles Busch's Vampire Lesbians of **Sodom** from October 28 through November 26. Reminiscent of Rocky Horror Show, Roadhouse Theater describes it as "a gender-bending, crossdressing, drag show cult extravaganza straight from off-Broadway in New York." It follows two lesbian vampires (played by two men!) in the days of Sodom, later finds them in Hollywood in the 1920s, and they end up in modern-day Las Vegas. The New York Times said of this play, "Costumes flashier than a pinball machine, outrageous lines, awful puns, sinister innocence, harmless depravity-it's all here. They're looking for an April release date...Woody Allen's new movie Bullets Over Broadway will include Harvey Fierstein as well as Mary Louise Parker who will play the lesbian detective in the upcoming Murder at the Nightwood Bar, based on Katherine V. Forrest's novel of the same name (check it out, it's a great lesbian mystery!)

- I'M A PERSON WITH HIV AND I PLAY ONE ON TV: Lee Mathis who plays an HIV-positive character on daytime TV's General Hospital, has publicly disclosed that he is himself HIVpositive. Mathis plays the recurring role of Jon.
- ☆ LIVE LONGER, SUGAR: Patti LaBelle is making an appeal to minorities with HIV to take care of themselves. In a new campaign, LaBelle encourages people with HIV to seek treatment that can help them live longer, healthier lives. Recent studies have shown that minorities are less likely to seek treatment for HIV. The billboards and printed materials will feature LaBelle saying, "Live longer, sugar."

Comedy

- ★ Daddy's Girls. Harvey Fierstein becomes the first openly-gay regular character played by an openly-gay actor on network TV in this CBS prime-time sitcom. At first, Fierstein was going to play a gay man with a stable, long-term committed relationship with another man, to contrast with Dudley Moore's character who was a single parent with a failed marriage. There is now the possibility that Fierstein might play Moore's gay side-kick, which would be a somewhat diminished role. None of that has been worked through yet. On Wednesdays 8:30 p.m.
- Frasier. Dan Butler is an openly-gay actor who plays a straight, macho sports announcer, foil to the prissy-but-straight Frasier Crane. NBC Tuesdays, 9 p.m. He and Leslie Jordan (next item) were

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profiled in the September 20 issue of *The Advocate* and the Sept./Oct. *10 Percent*. This summer Butler wrote and starred in an acclaimed one-man play about coming out, called *The Only Thing Worse You Could Have Told Me*.

- Hearts Afire. Leslie Jordan plays a fey but straight printer. Jordan is an openly gay actor who wrote and starred in *Hysterical Blindness*, a play which dealt with coming out. *Hearts Afire* is on CBS Saturdays at 9:30 p.m.
- Absolutely Fabulous There are no regular gay characters in this British sitcom, but gay audiences (particularly the guys) are absolutely taken with it, perhaps because the two female leads come across like a couple of bitchy queens. On Comedy Central Channel, Sundays 11 p.m.
- ☆ Women in the House. Delta Burke will be playing a character similar to the sassy Suzanne Sugarbaker (Designing Women) in this CBS sitcom. The show will be produced by Harry Thomason and Linda Bloodworth-Thomason, who produced Designing Women and had a serious falling-out with Burke while she was on that show. The three apparently realized they had a good thing going. It's a back-up show that will be put on when another new show bites the dust.


versions of that show. Air dates not known; watch your listings.

Koystone Pageantry

Keystone Pageantry, which is the statewide franchise for Miss Gay USA, is producing its third state pageant. Other states have been franchised, but this is Pennsylvania's first year of being franchised with the Pageant. The Pennsylvania state-wide pageant is heald one a year, in February. The site has permanently been moved to Phildelphia. Every winner and runner-up of local (city/county) preliminary pageant will go to state pageant. The winner and runner-up of state pageant go to National Miss Gay USA Pageant. May 1995 will mark the tenth anniversary of the national pageant.

Pennsylvania was awarded a trophy last year for best preliminary pageant in the USA. It was the first time that award was given to franchise east of the Mississippi. The first franchise pageant of this year took place at The Embers on Sept 17. Miss Greater Erie USA. Winner of state pageant gets \$1,000 cash, hundreds of dollars in gift certificates, and air fare, room and entry fee to national pageant. In prelims, entrants must be resident of state or border state. For statewide, must win or be runner-up in prelim.

All state pageants donate substantial portions to an AIDS-related organization. Last year, the Pennsylvania pageant donated \$2,000 to the Names Project (AIDS Quilt). This year, they will work with a Philadelphia organization called We the People Living with AIDS & HIV, and hope to be able to donate \$4,000-5,000. The State pageant will take place at a ballroom in center city in Philadelphia.

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Art Review

Earth & Sky & All Shows Between Show by Jill Flynn a.k.a. Urbana Dyke Sept. 18-Oct. 28 at Cup-a-Ccino's

Do I admit my bias?

Okay, I'll admit that I am more apt to ooh and ahh over "family" art. I would also exclaim how the work is a true expression of real life. How it really is. So when it comes to artwork done by a womon within the lesbian experience, I tend to be partial. Downright prejudiced.

Artwork done by another lesbian is, of course, going to "smack of reality" to me because it is within my experience also.

Jill Flynn does mixed media. That all encompassing instrument which includes anything and everything an artist can find. Mixed media is as exciting to work in for the artist as it is for the viewer to look at. And Jill makes mixed media exciting. She is a womon on a journey exploring found objects and incorporating them into her personal experience.

Okay, now for my favorites. "Rain" appears to me with its incredible simplicity. The combination of a window shade rod, two springs, and a perforated sheet of metal feels like some kind of Zen tapestry. "Rain" is a koan (Zen riddle) a question impossible to answer but tantalizing just the same.

The three-dimensional pieces are Jill's strongest in the show. Some are assemblages of the discarded while another might be a portrait as in "A Girl I Know." This work is a pair of colorful bib overalls bedecked with trinkets from a life. It works so well, I feel I have become acquainted with her and want to go hang out with her.

The really "out" piece in the show is "Table Talk." Why, even the "L" word is painted in big letters through the middle of the work. This piece has great potential. What a great idea—this tribute to the Lipstick Lesbian. But I feel this is just a study for a larger, more comprehensive piece. The *objets de Lipstick Lesbian* piece includes a pair of high heels, a cassette tape of *Lavender Jane Loves Women*, a pink triangle button, lipstick, perfume, skin cream, a bottle of spring water, and a cherry. Even with the absence of flannel, leather, and beer cans that I relate to so well, I heartily

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approve of this work. So go ahead Jill—show me all those *objets* in a drop-dead-to-die-for composition and a knock-out-your-eyes presence.

Do some more!

Breast Cancer

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Breast cancer is an issue of interest to all women, but is of special interest to lesbians, who may be at a higher risk. There will be local breast cancer events going on in October, so check the Showcase or your local newspaper for what's going on.

Lesbians and Breast Cancer

Breast cancer strikes one in eight women in this country. That's scary enough. But a report presented last spring by an epidemiologist at the National Cancer Institute suggested that one in three lesbians may get it.

Since researching lesbian health hasn't been a priority, the hard evidence of increased lesbian risk simply isn't there. But if lesbians are at increased risk, it is *not* because they are lesbians per se.

One important risk factor is childlessness. Women of all sexual orientations who don't bear children are more susceptible to breast cancer. (According to one study, only 16% of lesbians have had children.) It has also been suggested that lesbians increase their risk because as a group they have diets higher in fat and drink more alcohol than women in general.

In addition, lesbians do not need to see the gynecologist or obstetrician as much as heterosexual women do, and so their health isn't monitored as closely as women in general.

Not all breast cancer activists or lesbian/women's health advocates go along with all this. Some question the whole idea that lesbians are at increased risk. Some find the idea of risk factors to be offensive and valueloaded, that is, "blaming" women for not having children, for how they eat, or for drinking alcohol. Susan Love, who wrote *Dr. Susan Love's Breast Book*, says that almost 70% of the women who have breast cancer have none of these risk factors. "All we can do is get a mammogram once a year after age 50," she says. "That's all we've got."

The lack of information and options shows how important breast cancer research is.

If it matters to you, get involved and get informed. Check out the "Resources Box" on the next page.

PA Breast Cancer Coalition

Although there are several agencies in Pennsylvania that deal with cancer, there was no organization that made breast cancer a priority.

So in June 1993, the Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition was born.

The Coalition is a grassroots organization involving patients, breast cancer survivors, families, medical professionals, government, labor and business leaders and caring others. They advocate action, education, and research to end the epidemic. "The Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition was formed to bring more attention to the need for more breast cancer research and the need to find a cure," says Corrine Halperin, who is coordinator of the 13-county northwest PA region.

The Coalition advocates:

+Better research into the causes of and treatment for breast cancer, and more funding for and coordination of that reearch.

+Improved access to high quality breast cancer screening, diagnosis, treatment and care for all women, particularly the under-served and uninsured.

+Increased involvement and influence of those living with breast cancer in the areas of legislation, regulatory process and all aspects of clinical trial design, including access to clinical trials.

In the short time they've existed, the Coalition has accomplished a lot. Last fall they collected over 310,000 signatures on Petitions carried to the White House on October 18, 1993. The Coalition joined 200 other members of the National Breast Cancer Coalition demanding a comprehensive strategy for the breast cancer epidemic. The Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition delivered more signatures than from any other state.

In May of this year, the Coalition encouraged good breast health by organizing a program that offered mammogram "certificates" as Mother's Day gifts, at reduced cost. Halperin reports that about half of the northwestern PA women who called in about the mammograms had no insurance.

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To put a face on the epidemic, the Coalition created a touring photolessay exhibit. Called 67 Women—67 Counties: Facing Breast Cancer in Pennsylvania, the exhibit features a woman from each of the 67 counties in the state. Most of the women in the exhibit have triumphed over the disease, some are still struggling with it, and some, sadly, have lost the fight. The exhibit will be at the Millcreek Mall near Kaufman's, from Sept. 27 until October 11.

If you are interested in supporting the important work that the Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition is doing—by making a tax-deductible contribution, volunteering time, etc., you may contact Corrine Halperin at (814)455-7833. Halperin encourages people in the lesbian/gay community to become involved. "I would love to have people from your community join the coalition," she told told *EGCN*.

Statistics

Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer in women in the United States.

Last year, 46,000 women died from breast cancer. The magnititude of the epidemic can be seen when compared to another health catastrophe, that of HIV/ AIDS: Last year 37,000 people died of AIDS complications.

The incidence of breast cancer is rising and we don't know why. In 1960, one in fourteen women got the disease; now it is one in eight.

Detection Guidelines

From the American Cancer Society

Women 20 years of age and older should perform breast self-examination every month.

Women 20-40 should have a physical examination of the breast every three years.

Women age 40 to 49 should have a physical examination of the breast annually, and mammography should be performed at intervals of 1-2 years.

Women 50 years of age and older should have a mammogram every year.

Screening mammography should begin at age 40.

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Pink Ribbons

The pink ribbon is the symbol for breast cancer awareness. Think about wearing one, especially this month.

As of this writing, Pedro Zamora, a PWA who won the heart of young America on MTV's *Real World*, is to be speaking at Behrend on Sept. 27. He was orginally to have appeared in October, but became very sick, and so his visit was rescheduled to September. We'll have a report on Pedro in the November *EGCN*.

Man Sentenced in AIDS Council Theft

Clarence Andrew Szoszorek, who stole over \$6,200 from the AIDS Council while a volunteer there, was sentenced to prison September 15. He is to serve a sentence of four to 15 months in prison. He also received three years consecutive probation. Most of the prison sentence will not be served in prison; instead, Szoszorek will be placed under "house arrest," on home electronic monitoring. He will only be allowed to leave to receive medical treatment. Also, he will be expected to make some restitution of the stolen funds.

Szoszorek, also known as Andee Childs, took \$6,234.89 from the AIDS Council between November 8, 1993 and January 24, 1994. Szoszorek's defense introduced the fact that he is in poor health an in need of medical treatment, and Judge Stephanie Domitrovich ruled that Szoszorek may leave town to receive medical treatment.

American Red Cross Events and Projects

American Red Cross Instructor Training for HIV/ AIDS Educators will take place October 19-21 at Savelli's Union Station. Fee is \$50, and includes continental breakfast, lunch, snacks, and materials. When it disbanded, the AIDS Council of Erie County left behind a lot of books and videos. At the August meeting of the AIDS/HIV Network, people discussed placing the materials where people would have access to them. The HIV/AIDS Outreach Ministry and NW PA Rural AIDS Alliance received the books so that clients may read them. The Department of Health received the video library. Man Convicted in HIV+ Rape Case

An Erie County man with HIV who had unprotected sex with two runaway girls was convicted on several charges.

Willie Griffin, 33, was convicted of reckless endangerment of lives because he had unprotected sex while knowing he had HIV. Sentencing is October 24; Griffin could receive 13-26 years on all counts.

In addition to reckless endangerment, Griffin was convicted of a felony charge of statutory rape (one of the girls was 11), two misdemeanor counts of corruption of minors and furnishing alcohol to minors.

It is the first time that an HIV-positive person in Erie County has been convicted of reckless endanger-



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ment for having unprotected sex while aware of their HIV status.

Condom Brands Compared

All condoms are *not* created equal.

A recent survey discovered big differences in condom brands. So which ones were the most reliable? Researchers who conducted the study recom-

mended the following brands: *Touch Non-Lube (formerly Ramses Non-Lube)* Ramses Sensitol Gold Circle Coin**

Gold Circle Sheik Elite* Durex Nuform Pleaser

None of these brands leaked. Note that the brands with the stars (*) were most highly recommended because they also tested in the top eight in a condom study published in *Consumer Reports* in March 1989.

All the recommended brands were produced by two companies: Safetex/Aladan (formerly Circle) and Schmid. Although Trojans are a popular brand, all Trojan brands included in this study ended up in the bottom half of the list (Trojans also tested poorly in the *Consumer Reports* study).

The poorest performers, ranked from bad to absolute worst, were:

Lifestyles Conture Lifestyles Nuda Trojan Naturalube Ribbed Trojan Ribbed Contracept Plus

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The lowest ranked condom, Contracept Plus, was tested using samples of that brand. Every single one leaked. It was by far the worst. Following this study, it was removed from the market.

A total of 31 brands were investigated, and a total of 31,000 condoms were tested.

The study was conducted by the Mariposa Foundation and Sequoia Associates in California, and Nelson

Laboratories in Salt Lake City. The Mariposa Foundation has pioneered a range of research on human sexuality and the prevention of sexually transmitted diseases. Testing of condoms and spermicides has been a major focus of their projects. They publish the *Mariposa Newsletter*, which keeps contributors informed of their studies and related information. Los Angeles Approves Needle Exhange

The Los Angeles City Council has approved (9-1) a needle exchange program in an effort to fight that city's AIDS epidemic. The Council declared the HIV/ AIDS epidemic to be an emergency situation, and were thus able to bypass the state's law against such programs. The California legislature has twice passed needle exchange laws, but conservative Governor Pete Wilson vetoed them both times.

HIV Transmitted in Fist fight

ROME, Sept. 19—A man became infected with HIV after being in a bloody fist fight with his brother, who has HIV. It was unusual but not the first time: 1989 a British man became infected with the virus during a fight at a wedding.

U.N. Population Conference and AIDS

CAIRO—Although the Vatican has consistently argued against the use of condoms, at the U.N. Population Conference it agreed not to formally contest a phrase in a document that calls for "voluntary abstinence and condom use." The Vatican agreed set aside differences about condoms and contraceptives in order to concentrate on working against abortion. Also brought up at the conference: the fact that women in many male-domianted society's are at particular risk and have no right to demand safer sex from their husbands.

IL-2 Therapy

From Novum Pharmaceutical Research Services:

Interleukin-12 (IL-12) is a recently discovered cytokine. A growing body of evidence indicates that this cytokine has interesting and unique structural and biological activities.

Last December, researchers at the National Cancer Institute and the Genetics Institute (a bio-tech company based in Cambridge, Massachusetts) discovered that when IL-12 was added to white blood cells taken from HIV-positive asymptomatic individuals, the T-cells began to proliferate robustly, producing a critical T-cell growth factor, IL-2, and an important anti-viral immunomodulator, interferon gamma. In the absence of IL-12 the cells were unresponsive.

POTENTIAL BENEFITS OF IL-12[°]THERAPY MAY INCLUDE:

Delayed progression from an asymptomatic state to full blown AIDS

Prevention of infection by *Toxoplasma gondii* by activation of natural killer (NK) cells

Elevation of the cell-mediated immune response of HIV vaccines

Enhancing cell-mediated immunity by stimulating T-helper (CD_4) cell proliferation and activating Tkiller (CD_4) cell activity

Increasing production of IL-2, a cytokine involved in T-cell proliferation, and interferon gamma, a potent anti-viral molecule

Augmented targeting and destruction of virusinfected cells by NK cells

Novum, Inc. has joined a multi-center study to determine the safety of IL-12 in asymptomatic HIV-positive individuals with CD_4 counts between 300 and 500, who are on a stable regimen of anti-viral therapy.

This is a Phase I, Double-Blind, Placebo-Controlled, Dose-Escalating, Single-Dose study.

National/World News Bits

Congross Drops Anti-Gay Youth Law

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23—Legislation that would have cut federal funding to schools that teach acceptance of homosexuality has been dropped. A moderate compromise, offered by Jolene Unsoeld (D-Washington) simply states that federal school funds may not be used for programs that promote sexual activity, obscene materials, or condom distribution. It goes on to state that AIDS education and sex education courses and programs must discuss abstinence as a healthy sexual choice. The legislation was an amendment to the \$13 billion Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

German Politicians Fined for Inciting Hatred

BERLIN, Sept. 13—Two local council politicians were fined by a Berlin court for inciting hatred against gays here. The two men, members of the extreme-right Republican party, wrote a letter to Berlin's health minister in 1992 urging him to cut funding for counseling to gay men and lesbians. "If they...stay in their little room nothing will happen to them," the men wrote. The court fined the men an unprecented sum of money for abusing their positions on council in communicating with the minister.

Study: 1 in 5 Attracted to Same Sex

WASHINGTON—A study has found that about 20% of Americans has felt same-sex attraction at some point since they were 15. The 1 in 5 figure had to do simply with attraction, not whether or not those feelings were acted on. David Wypij, co-author of the study, said that the gay/straight categories may be too simplistic. "I think in most individuals there is some sort of range," he said. "You may be more heterosexual, you may be more homosexual." The study was conducted at the Harvard School of Public Health and the Center for Health Policy Studies in Washington, and will be published in the Arhives of Sexual Behavior. **Partnership Bills**

After narrowly passing in the California legislature, Governor Pete Wilson vetoed the partnership bill which would have recognized unmarried couples regardless of their sexual orientation. The Republican governor said he vetoed the bill because it would have weakened the institution of marriage. The bill received much support from senior citizen groups like the American Association of Retired Persons and the Congress of California Seniors. That's because the bill's author presented census figures showing large numbers of elderly heterosexuals who live together but do not marry.

Massachusetts Teacher Loses Suit

WALTHAM, Mass. Sept. 16—A lesbian teacher at a private school lost her discrimination suit against the school that told her she could not live with her lover. As a head house parent at Chapel Hill-Chauncy Hall, Christine Huff has to live on campus. Unmarried couples may not live together on campus, but because Huff and her lover cannot marry, Huff's attorney argued, she was "put in a position no heterosexual person would be put in." The state's top antidiscrimination official ruled that this did not constitute a violation of the state's gay rights law, because the law does not legitimize same-sex marriages.

Lesbian Settles Lawsult Against Police Dept.

DALLAS, Sept. 15—After refusing to hire her as a police officer because of her sexual orientation, a lesbian has accepted a \$73,000 settlement from the city of Dallas. In 1992, a judge ruled that the police department's policy regarding sexual orientation was unconstitutional. The Dallas police chief now says that he supports hiring lesbians and gay men.

Lesbian Mom Still Can't Have Her Son

RICHMOND, Va. Sept. 16—Although lesbian mother Sharon Bottoms regained custody of her threeyear-old son, she can't have him back while that decision is being appealed. In September 1993, Bottoms made national news when a cicuit court judge removed the son from Bottoms' home because she is a lesbian. He was placed with Bottoms mother. In June, the Virginia Court of Appeals overturned that decision.


