

# Lea De-Larious

I can't believe she said that!

That was one of my many reactions to Lea DeLaria's Nov 5 performance at the Marquee at the Traif in Buffalo. She was a scream. I can't remember when I last enjoyed a live stand-up performance so much.

My husband Michael and I laughed our heads off as she bemoaned the loss of Martina Navratilova to Women's tennis: "I really had my hopes set on that little Jennifer Capriati babe, but then it turned out that she had a little drug problem. Of course we should have realized this at last year's Wimbledon when the judge yelled 'Line!' and she went S-s-s-s-n-n-i-i-i-f-f-f-f!"

I can't believe she said that!

We also howled at her "Dyke Dating Tips," a segment of her show where she answered audience questions like "What is safe sex?" Answer: "If you want to practice safe sex cut your f---ing nails; sex with you is like Edward f---ing Scissorhands!" Question: "How do you use a dental dam?" Answer: "Dental dams are square pieces of latex that you can find.... nowhere! # **Michael Dithers**

First and foremost, a great big thank you to the wonderful women of Womynspace who helped collate last month's issue which was running late.

I would like to get people thinking about something important this month. I had been thinking about getting an HIV test for a while. I wasn't really concerned about being positive, but I had never gathered the courage to actually get it done. It was sort of a health-themed day. I went to the doctor for the first time in years to check out a sore throat that afternoon, and later that night I took my cat, Smokey Joe, the newsletter's unofficial mascot, to the vet.

Like many people, I suspect, I didn't really want my employer to know I had gone in for HIV testing. But there are programs here in Erie that are free and confidential. Behrend provides them to their students. The Erie Co. Health Dept provides them both in Erie and Corry. I went to Minority Health Education and Delivery Systems (MHEDS). They were really very nice. They were quite flexible about scheduling. You don't even know at first glance that it's a clinic. I have lived a few doors down from them for the past three years and never realized that that is what they were. They get a fair number of gay and lesbian people. They do other health-related stuff, so it is not by any means only for gay people or people who want to be tested for HIV. It is also not just for racial and ethnic minorities.

If possible, you want to try to go 6 months after your most recent possible exposure because it can take 6 weeks to 6 months for the antibodies to form. I have never done IV drugs and haven't been with anyone new in a year and a half, so I was definitely in the clear. They explain to you what circumstances can cause you to sometimes show positive when you are not. But don't worry, they do test you again if you test positive and they do use the more stringent test for retesting. You do have to schedule to go back in to have your test results presented face-to-face. They have to do this because of confidentiality laws. Otherwise, someone could find out your HIV status by phoning in and claiming to be you. I was also a bit uneasy because I thought they were going to ask a whole bunch of really probing questions, but they don't really pry into your sex life or anything. The woman who did the testing for me, said that they get folks referred to them by other doctors in town and folks from as far away as Meadville and Oil City.

Why did I wait so long to get tested? I don't know. It didn't even hurt very much when they drew the blood. It is great knowing I am HIV negative, but even if I had been positive, it would have been better knowing for sure. Please think about getting tested, whether through MHEDS, the Erie County Health Department or whatever. See, we have even been running a listing of free and confidential sites for HIV testing and counseling in the HIV/AIDS Directory, next to the Community Directory in the back. Do it for someone you love and care for—You!

You probably saw in the news section about Pedro Zamora's funeral. I got e-mail from the evil Fred Phelps Pholks that they would be protesting at his funeral (and they did). See, they want to prevent gays and PWA's from looking like martyrs. Obviously, vilifying them at funerals will prevent that. What are these people on??? This is not only mean, it can't help but create sympathy. One wonders what will happen at the funerals of Fred Phelps and his followers. I do have a modest suggestion. Wouldn't a nice lesbian and/or gay wedding on Fred Phelps' gravesite be poetic revenge? Maybe showing that love does indeed conquer all? Well, it's a nice fantasy.

I hope everyone is having a really nice holiday season. Micheal and I spent Thanksgiving at my mom's with my stepfather, brother, aunt, uncle and cousin. My cousin is also gay (which made my little brother the token straight boy for our generation.) It really meant a lot that my family has accepted Micheal so fully. A year ago there were some real problems, but I couldn't ask for more right now. Since the first of the year, there hasn't been a family function that Micheal has not been explicitly welcome at. It was rough working our way through this but we did. It made me think about when folks talk about "family values" how they can forget that all gays and lesbians are members of families and that what is really important about families is not penile-vaginal intercourse, but love and commitment.


# **Entertainment Notes**

- A GAY TV TEEN GETS THROWN OUT OF HOUSE, In December, the ABC drama My So Called Life will air an episode about a gay kid (Wilson Cruz) getting thrown out of the house when his parents find out about his sexual orientation. Wilson is gay in real life, and last Christmas Eve he was, in fact, also thrown out of his parents' house. We tried to find out the air date with no luck, so you'll have to watch the listings. The show is on ABC Thursdays at 8 p.m.
- ★ LESBIAN MOMS ON SITCOM: The sitcom Friends recently did an episode about lesbian mothers and handled it really well. The program airs on Tuesdays at 8:30 p.m. on NBC
- A MATT STANDS HIS GROUND: The Nov. 21 episode of *Melrose Place* showed gay character Matt (**Doug Savant**) asking if he can bring his boyfriend to Thanksgiving dinner. His "tolerant" parents say they'd rather not have to deal with the relationship up close. Matt refuses to go along with it, and when his mother asks what to tell the family, he says, "Tell them I'm having dinner with my lover."
- NO TALES SEQUEL: Fans of the highly-successful mini-series Tales of the City will be disappointed to learn that the long-awaited sequel is not going to be filmed. The reason? No American network wants it. Britain's Channel Four was prepared to invest \$4 million of the \$8 million budget, but couldn't find an American network

that would invest the rest of the money. So Channel Four has dropped it. Although *Tales* was one of the most successful dramas ever aired on PBS, conservative pressure caused that network to back off. In the meantime, console yourself with the books that the series was based on, by Armistead Maupin. In chronological order, these are: *Tales of the City, More Tales of the City, Further Tales of the City, Babycakes, Significant Others*, and *Sure of You*.

# '94 Election: The End of the Gay 90's?

Just hours after the midterm election, Republicans were trumpeting their victories and conservative agendas across the nation. The GOP took control of both chambers of Congress, and the polls reflected the sentiment of the 'angry white male' vote.

With the right-wing takeover, a dismayed lesbigay community is searching for signs that the visibility and political momentum the 90's ushered in had not gone the way of the Democrats.

It appears the incoming Congress will provide a much harsher environment for lesbigay activists. In the election analysis provided by the League of Gay and Lesbian Voters, "Incoming leaders of the House and Senate, Gingrich and Dole respectively, are from the conservative wing of the Republican party. Both have uthibited hostile attitudes towards the lesbigay community. This means it will be more difficult to stop anti-gay legislation...the lesbigay community will have o spend valuable time and resources working to defeat anti-gay legislation, rather than working for increased with rights protections and domestic partnerships."

Bright spots do exist nationally, however. A record number of openly gay officials have been elected to citice, according to the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, an organization that provides funding for openly gay candidates. Of the 17 candidates which received funding, 12 (75%) won. Also winning seats were four incumbents who originally were elected with the help of the Victory Fund.

Ballot initiatives that would have repealed or blocked anti-gay discrimination laws in both Idaho and Oregon were rejected. Support for the Employment Non-Discrimination Act will remain about the same—all the incumbent Senate cosponsors were reelected, and while the House lost 10 supporters, 10 newly elected members have pledged to support the legislation.

In PA, the news was mixed. Our biggest setback was the defeat of Senator Harris Wofford by the Christian Coalition-backed Rick Santorum, Lesbigay leaders were upset with the Wofford campaign, citing the slow start, lack of organization, and at times avoiding public support from the lesbigay community. Locally, gays and lesbians were contacted by Wofford campaigners and actively recruited to help.

Phil English, another right-wing candidate, became Tom Ridge's successor in the 21st Congressional district. English's "I'll be an independent voice for the 21st District" rang hollow as he raked in anti-gay Christian Coalition, Eagle Forum, and other conservative PAC money. When questioned about gay rights and the amount of religious right contributions on the campaign trail, English responded with the stock Christian Coalition answers "I support equal rights for everyone" and "I'm really not sure how much." Antigay Jerry Knight ran this campaign, which doesn't bode well for the lesbigay community.

Tom Ridge as Governor appears to be at least somewhat supportive of lesbigay issues. LGLV Chair Chris Young states, "Tom Ridge will be more receptive to our community than Governor Casey. Ridge has indicated that he supports the Hate Crimes Bill." His support may actually shift some votes in both chambers. This will be needed, since some strong supporters in the PA Senate have not sought re-election, and the Republicans now have control of the state Senate and

Although the country has experienced a rightwing shift, a post-election poll by Mellman Lazarus Lake, Inc. shows that Americans still support ending discrimination against lesbigays. The poll surveyed a random sample of 800 people who voted in the midterm election; the margin of error is +/- 3.5%. The results show that 70% feel that gays should not face unfair job discrimination, 57% supported the Employment Non-Discrimination Act, 78% are in favor of increasing efforts against AIDS, and 54% opposed eliminating lesbigay teachers and school books discussing homosexuality. Interestingly, the poll found that 40% of those surveyed were more worried about a "religious right wing agenda" than a "gay agenda" (21%)

LGLV concludes that "Voters were looking for a change, and this year that change was to vote for Republicans. Although Americans elected a more conservative congress, this resulted from economic uncertainty and dissatisfaction with President Clinton, not an agreement with an anti-lesbigay or socially conservative philosophy.'

It remains to be seen how national and state leaders will react to the new conservative Congress, and how much support the lesbigay community will receive from legislators, even those who support our goals. This election may make elected officials reassess their positions on our issues because of the volatility of the electorate.

# **Election Round-Up**

#### Compiled by EGCN

USA: The Human Rights Campaign Fund reported that most of the openly gay/lesbian canididates were successful across the country. Anti-gay initiatives in Oregon and Idaho were defeated, but one was successful in Florida. Candidates endorsed by the Christian Coalition were very successful all across the country.

NY: Democratic Governor Mario Cuomo lost to George Pataki in the race for New York Governor. The gay civil rights movement has lost a strong ally. Democrat Karen Burstein, an open lesbian running for state attorney general, lost to Republican Dennis Vacco, even though she was ahead in the polls fairly late in the race. Analysts don't seem to think the sexual orientation was the issue, especially since homophic statements coming from a prominent Vacco supporter seemed to turn voters off. Liberal Democrat Patrick Moynihan won a fourth term.

OHIO: None of the candidates in the list of pro-gay candidates we ran last month (taken from endorsements by Ohio's Gay People's Chronicle) won in the Ohio elections.

PA: Christian Coalition-backed candidate Rick Santorum beat Harris Wofford in the race for U.S. Senate. Bill Leavens was beaten by Christian-Coalitionbacked Phil English. Neither the Wofford nor the Leavens campaigns made any major reference to religious right supporters, even though other campaigns have successfully defeated religious right candidates when they made their extremist associations public.

CA: Out lesbian Sheila Kuehl, best known as Zelda from The Many Lives of Dobie Gillis, won a seat in the state assembly. Republican Gov. Pete Wilson, who has vetoed gay rights legislation, won re-election by emphasizing tough stands on illegal immigration and crime. Gay rights supporter Sen. Dianne Feinstein won in the

nation's most expensive race, against Republican Michael

MASS: Republican Governor William Weld won reelection. Weld has been initiating pioneering legislation to deal with the problems faced by gay and lesbian youth. Democrat Edward M. Kennedy, our strongest supporter in the Senate, won in a race against Republican businessman Mitt Romney.

Republican Governor Arne Carlson, who supports gay civil rights and legalized abortion, won reelection.

WISCONSIN: Republican Congressman Steve Gunderson won re-election even though he recently


Cocoon will be closing some time in January. A promising venture with Phoenix Fire has presented itself and the offer is too good to pass up.

#### **Grind & Squeeze Future Uncertain**

Here's the latest on the Grind & Squeeze Coffeehouse, in Edinboro:

The owners of the coffeehouse, Gabriella Savelli and Sean Rockey, haven't had any luck in locating another place. Edinboro is not a community with a lot of vacant spaces. The Grind & Squeeze will be open until December 15 at 105 Erie Street, but after that, they don't know what's going to happen.

The owner of the property at 105 Erie Street has refused to renew the lease. He has reportedly stated that the coffeehouse makes too much noise, and that people in Edinboro have been complaining about the sort of people it attracts. Petitions are being circulated by supporters of the coffeehouse, in an effort to demonstrate that there is a lot of support for the Grind & Squeeze among people living in Edinboro.



WNEQ (PBS-Buffalo, Channel 23) will be airing In the Life, a gay and lesbian newsmagazine. The first broadcast will be on Dec. 12 at 9 p.m. According to their program guide here's what to expect in that episode. "First, a look at the culture of "two-spirited people," the name for gays lesbians and transgendered people of the Native American communities. Then, a look at Terrance McNally's off-Broadway Love, Valour and Compassion! Finally, experts from Straight From the Heart, a moving profile of parents who have come to a new understanding of their gay and lesbian children." # **National/World News Bits**

#### **Massachusetts Teachers Must Learn Gay Issues**

BOSTON, Nov. 15-Future Massachusetts public school teachers and administrators must now learn about issues faced by gay students, lesbian, and bisexual student. The course material is required in order to be certified in that state. Massachusetts is the first state in the nation to implement such a change, which was recommended by the Governor's Commission on Gay and Lesbian Youth. Massachusetts Governor William Weld, a Republican, has been a strong supporter of programs and approaches that address the seriousness of the problems of gay and lesbian teens.

#### Priest Dies in Gay Sauna

DUBLIN, Ireland, Nov. 13-A Catholic priest died in a gay sauna club here and was given last rites by one of two priests who were also at the club. According to one report, the priest suffered a heart attack while watching a pornographic movie. The dead priest reportedly was a regular at the club. "We would not normally give out this information," said Liam Ledwige, the club's manager, "but as a gay community we rebel against the Catholic Church, which refuses to recognize us."

#### Study: Gay Men Have Bigger Ones

NEW YORK—Researchers report that in a study comparing the brains of gay and straight men, they discovered that a key passageway between two parts of the brain is thicker in gay men. The structure, called the isthmus of the corpus callosum, is a communication conduit. When the men's brains were scanned it was found that that part was about 13 percent thicker in gay men. Peri Jude Radecic, Executive Director of the Gay and Lesbian Task Force, said that the study "is an important addition to the growing body of evidence indicating a biological basis for homosexuality in some people. And it shows that homosexuality is a naturally occurring and common variation...Regardless of the origins of homosexuality, however, discrimination based on sexual orientation is wrong and must end. This is

especially true if science should ever discover a gene responsible for homosexuality."

#### **Martina Retires**

NEW YORK, Nov. 15-The woman widely regarded as the greatest player in women's tennis lost her game (6-4, 6-2) in a match with Gabriela Sabatini. The Madison Square Garden audience of 18,000 applauded Navratilova's farewell game, and gave a powerful ovation during a farewell ceremony. During the ceremony, a video recapped her career, and a banner bearing Navratilova's name was raised to the rafters.

#### **Gay Sperm Donor Wins Paternity** Rights

NEW YORK, Nov. 19—A gay man who artificially inseminated a lesbian has won paternity rights to the daughter that she bore. Thomas Steel, 44, had had a mutual agreement with the biological mother to visit with the girl, and Steel visited with her during the time when she was four to nine years old. The girls's mother is in a committed relationship with another woman who has a daughter. When in 1990, Steel asked if his daughter and the other child could visit him in California without their mothers, the women cut off all contact. The New York Supreme Court's Appellate Division ruled 3-2 in favor of Steel's rights, stating, "The notion that a lesbian mother should enjoy parental relationship with her, but a gay father should not, is so innately discriminatory as to be unworthy of comment.'

#### **Helms Death Threat**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—On the anniversary of President Kennedy's assassination, Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.) made an indirect death threat against President Clinton. Helms stated that the president "better have a bodyguard if he visits North Carolina" implying that people in the military hate Clinton so much (because of gays in the military, among other things), that they are likely to try to kill him. Helms, who is being considered for the chairmanship of the Foreign Relations Committee, quickly retracted the statement.



Many influentail Republican legislators, concerned about Democratic charges that the Republican Party was being taken over by right-wing extremists, scrambled to distance themselves from his remarks.

#### **Republican Family Values**

WASHINGTON—The Republican Party, which officially supports traditional family values, unveiled a welfare reform plan that would place children of poor parents in orphanages. Under the plan, aid for school lunches would be cut, young unwed mothers could not receive assistance, and if the father could not be located, the mother could not receive assistance for children. Those parents who simply could not afford to support their children without public assistance would be placed in orphanages. Money saved from these welfare cuts would be used to fund the orphanages.

#### Gingrich on Gays

WASHINGTON—New Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich (R-Georgia) says he thinks the Republican Party's position on gays "should be toleration." But he also believes homosexuality is "an orientation in the way that alcoholism is an orientation." and that it is "madness" to include anything but heterosexual couples in a definition of families. The interview appeared in Washington D.C.'s gay newspaper *The Washington Blade*.

#### Serial Killer Nabbed

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. Nov. 23—Just days after being placed on the FBI's Ten Most Wanted List, a man who murdered several gay men was captured. Gary Ray Bowles, 32, has confessed to killing six men. He was a hustler who met his victims in gay bars, after which he would brutally kill them and mutilate their bodies. The men he chose were closeted, older gay men. In giving a reason for his actions, Bowles said that as a child he had been physically and mentally abused by his stepfathers. The murders apparently all took place between Maryland and Florida.

#### **Court: Military's Gay Policy Upheld**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22—The military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy is constitutional, according to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia.

The court made the 7-3 ruling in the case of Joseph C. Steffan, who was expelled from the Naval Academy in 1987 when he admitted he was gay. Steffan was six weeks from graduation when he was expelled. The ruling reverses the earlier finding of a three-judge panel.

#### Deaths

**Pedro Zamora**, on November 11, of complications due to AIDS. He was 22. Zamora, his life, and his struggle with HIV became known to and loved by millions of people who watched him on the MTV program *Real World*, which he taped earlier this year. Because of his participation in *Real World*, millions of young viewers have now known someone with AIDS. Zamora, who spoke before congressional committees several times, was 17 when he was infected, and was adamant about the need for frank, relevant AIDS education approaches for young gay men. # HIV/AIDS - US & World

#### **New AIDS Czar**

WASHINGTON—President Clinton has appointed Patricia C. Fleming as the new AIDS policy coordinator, a position more popularly known as "AIDS Czar." She had been special assistant to Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala, helping to coordinate their strategies and policies about AIDS. Regarding HIV in teens, she encourages abstinence and delaying sex for as long as possible.

#### **Home Testing Controversy**

WASHINGTON—AIDS activists are charging that Johnson and Johnson is illegally promoting its home HIV testing kits in order to influence and cause the FDA to approve the tests without closer scutiny. Companies are not allowed to promote products that have not yet been approved, and the home testing kits have not been approved. The test is to be taken by pricking one's finger and sending a dried sample of blood to a lab. Post-test counseling would take place by phone. Opponents question how an untrained person can take an adequate blood sample when health workers often have problems doing it. They are also concerned about the sort of counseling that could take place by telephone. Proponents of the test say that it will allow people to be tested in the privacy of their own home, and that people who might not otherwise be tested might take the home test.

#### **Baboons Provide Vaccine Hope**

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28—Researchers have been successful in infecting baboons with HIV, and the animals appear to develop full-blown AIDS symptoms. Animal rights activists are critical of the experiments, while the researchers say that having animals that react to HIV like humans allows them to test new drugs and vaccines more quickly.

# Male-Female Sex: Women at Higher Risk

An Italian study has determined that HIV transmission is 2.3 times more likely to happen from maleto-female than from female-to-male. The study was reported in the journal, *Epidemiology*.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 21—The American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR) announced that it was cutting back 11 jobs. They cited a falling-off in donations. Reportedly, no programs will be cut. #### Israeli AIDS Murder

TEL AVIV, Israel—A gay man who is believed to have dedicated his last year of life to intentionally infecting others with HIV was found murdered in his apartment. Yeshayahu Demner, 46, was a "kindly" and respected professor. His detailed personal records indicated that after he discovered he had HIV, Demner had sex "with many dozens of men," always insisting that condoms not be used. Police believe the murderer may have been a sex partner of Demner's, who discovered what Demner was doing. Gay activists in Israel are concerned that this incident will have serious negative effects on public opinion of gays.


