Nuthin' But Good Times Ahead Molly Ivins (Vintage \$12)

Good times is another book by Molly Ivins, Nuthin' But Good Times Ahead. This book, like her first, Molly Ivins Can't Say That, Can She?, is a collection of her political columns from the likes of the Dallas Times-Herald, The Progressive, and the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Ivins describes herself as "a leftwing, aging-Bohemian journalist, who never made a shrewd career move, never got married, and isn't even a lesbian, which at least would be interesting."

An interesting comment, that. Especially in view of the near absence of any comment on gay issues in the first book, which consisted of columns written before the 1992 Republican convention. Now she has written about "Ignorance Epidemic Threatens in Texas During AIDS Crisis," "Let Gays Serve Their Country and Get on to Real Problems," and "Beware Those Who Profit from Fear." In her summary of the Republican convention, "Notes from Another Country," Ivins writes

"The gay-bashing at the convention would have been offensive even without the AIDS epidemic. Have they no shame, at long last, have they no shame? I watched delegates who are the mothers of gay sons sit there and listen without protest. I don't know what it says about their family values."

I liked Ivins' first book because it helped me keep a sense of humor about the nonsense. Legislatures, attitudes, economics, ignorance, fear—she dealt with them all with laid-back Texas humor and a good set of facts. Nuthin' But Good Times Ahead is going to be even more help.

Molly Ivins is now a regular at the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Maybe I can convince the Texas connection to subscribe to the Star-Telegram and clip Molly's columns so I won't have to wait for the next book.

Nestle...Not so Sweet!

A refreshing list of major companies purchased advertising spots during the recent broadcast of *Serving in Silence*. The made-for-television movie was shown by NBC on February 6th and affirmatively depicted the life story of Margarethe Cammermeyer, who was booted out of the U.S. Army for being a lesbian.

Not on the list of proud sponsors, however, was Nestle USA. The cowardly company specifically pulled its advertising from the movie. According to Laurie MacDonald, Nestle's Vice President of Corporate affairs, her company adheres to a policy of not advertising on programs "deemed by a majority of the public to be controversial or not widely accepted."

Citing the same policy, Nestle also refused to sponsor last year's gay wedding episode of *Northern Exposure* (CBS, May 2, 1994).

Such an advertising policy is an open invitation to homophobes, letting them know that every time they turn our lives into a "controversy," Nestle will back away from doing the right thing.

Moreover, the decision to forego advertising on Serving in Silence actually helps to perpetuate the "controversial" and "not widely accepted" status of homosexuality in our society. Nestle is, in effect, creating the very problem the company claims to be avoiding.

applauded the death of gay AIDS activist (and MTV Real World television star) Pedro Zamora. Among the comments: "Pedro deserved what he got! His lifestyle killed him and nothing else!...Homosexuals brought AIDS to the U.S. in the early 1980's (from framklt@aol.com), "I hated that fagboy...I think Pedro is where he deserves to be right now, IN HELL" (from ademduritz@aol.com), and "He was a fag and all fags should die and I was happy to see him got what he got" (from phloutrel@aol.com)

- Well Endowed Art... March 14th is arts and culture "Advocacy Day," a chance to lobby Congressional representatives to same the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA): the new Republican Congress has threatened the NEA's funding, which currently costs each U.S. citizen the equivalent of two postage stamps a year. Erin "gay" Braugh: Irish & Gay

People

Oscar Wilde (1854-1900) Gay Irish wit, novelist and playwright. Wilde was out and flamboyant. His relationship with Lord Alfred Douglas incurred the wrath of Douglas' father, and in a celebrated trial, Wilde was charged with sodomy. He was convicted and imprisoned for two years, and five years later died alone and penniless. He was recently honored with a stained glass window in Poet's Corner at Westminster Abbey. Numerous biographies describe Wilde's remarkable life.

The Ladies of Llangollen Elizabeth Butler and Sarah Ponsonby were two Irish ladies who fell in love and lived as a married couple for all their lives. They moved to a village in Wales, became well-known throughout Britain, and entertained many of the great minds of their time. Their charming story is told in a number of books, like Doris Grumbach's *The Ludies*.

Sir Roger Casement (1864-1916) Casement was a compassionate gay man who exposed the unspeakably horrible conditions that the Europeans had forced on native workers in the Congo, and helped put an end to the horrors. He was also an Irish nationalist, active in the cause of Irish independence for England. When he was convicted of being a traitor, there was a worldwide protest. But when the British made Casement's sexual diaries public, the protests stopped. He was hanged for treason in 1916.

Stir Fry, by Emma O'Donogue(HarperCollins \$20) Set in modern Dublin, the story of a young woman who discovers her feelings for women.

One Last Waltz, by Ethan Mordden (St. Martin's \$7.95). The story of an Irish family, focusing on three Irish-American brothers—one of whom is gay—set in New York.

Kathleen O'Donogue, by Penny Hayes (Naiad \$9.95) An Irish woman immigrates to America, where she meets and falls in love with—an English woman! Set in the turn of the century.

Halfway Home, by Paul Monette (Avon \$10). Novel about two Irish-Catholic brothers, one straight, the other gay and living with AIDS.

Lawyers Group Supports Gay Parents

CHICAGO, Feb. 23—The American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers has announced its support for the rights of gay parents. The group has filed a friend of the court brief in the case of Sharon Bottoms, who lost custody of her son in 1993 because she is a lesbian. According to the organization, "Any presumption that a homosexual parent is 'unfit' for custody simply by virtue of his or her homosexuality is a doctrine based upon prejudice and stereotypes which deprives a parent of fundamental rights and privileges guaranteed under the Constitution, while simultaneously ignoring the best interests of the child."

Utah, South Dakota Move Toward Banning Same-Sex Marriages

The state legislatures of Utah and South Dakota are quickly moving to ban recognition of same-sex marriages. Utah recognizes same-sex marriages that are performed in countries where they are legal, South Dakota does not.

Cop Program Anti-Lesbian Mom?

Lesbian and gay viewers are upset over the February 15 episode of NBC's Law and Order, in which Detectives Logan and Briscoe question two lesbians about a clinic where one of them has been inseminated. After the questioning the following exchange takes place:

Logan: And I thought I had it bad being raised by two alcoholics.

Briscoe: I wonder which mommy is going to teach him how to smoke and drink?

Logan: And shave...heh, heh!

Briscoe: Well, it's the nineties. Everyone's allowed to be gross and disgusting, not just you.

Logan: Well, all I know is that I had one mommy and she did enough ball-breaking for one lifetime.

The show's producers insist that *Law and Order* has always been sensitive to gay men and lesbians, that the dialog took place between two characters on the show, and was not the producers' or networks' opinion on the issue.

Allstate Permits Joint Coverage to Same-Sex Couples

Later this year, Allstate Insurance Co. will begin issuing excess liability coverage to same-sex couples. The changes were inspired by a New York gay couple (who had been together for ten years) who wanted to buy joint liability insurance from Allstate but, according to the company's policies, would have to have bought two separate policies. The couple sought legal help from the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, and after nine months of legal negotiations, the company issued the couple joint coverage.

COPA to hold "Legal Night"

Gay and Lesbian Couples of the Pittsburgh Area (COPA) will present "Legal Night" to discuss legal matters important to same-gender couples. Laura Dunhoff, Esquire, a local attorney, will be the main speaker, addressing such issues as wills and estates, power-of-attorney, property rights, civil rights, living wills, family law and virtually any other area of concern for same-gender couples. COPA Legal Night can help same-gender couples become legally informed. COPA Legal Night will occur on Tuesday, March 21st at 7:30 pm. Bicentennial Float



Franklin Transsexual Runs for Office

FRANKLIN—Kristine Holt, the transsexual who has been fighting for the job she says she lost because of a sex change, announced that she is running for Venango County commissioner.

Holt, 38, had been employed at the Northwest Pennsylvania Training Partnership Consortium. She was dismissed from her job after starting the sex change process, and the state ordered the agency to reinstate her. The agency refused, and Holt filed a \$12.2 million suit against the agency and other parties in September

Holt says her experience with the sex change and discrimination battle has helped to prepare her for the office she is seeking.

Hate Crime Bills Circulated in PA Legislature

Legislation aimed at protecting lesbians and gays from violence is now being circulated in both the PA Senate and House of Representatives.

Senator David Heckler (R-Bucks) began his search for support of the measure in early February and the League of Gay and Lesbian Voters learned that three others have already expressed interest in cosponsoring the Senate version of the bill. They are Afflerbach (D-Lebanon), Stewart (D-Cambria), and Brightbill (R-Berks).

Lita Cohen (R-Montgomery) brought out the House version on February 15, but no additional information was available.

The Hate Crimes bill adds 'sexual orientation' to the list of groups covered under the current Ethnic Intimidation Act and punishes more severely those guilty of bias-related crimes. It has been introduced in previous sessions of both the PA Senate and House of Representatives, but has never passed either chamber.

In another development, Senator Anthony Andrezeski (D-Erie) was recently assigned to the Judiciary committee, which must review and vote the legislation to the floor of the Senate. Andrezeski's vote is considered very important. The bill was stymied last year in this committee and was not sent to the full Senate.

Help the lesbigay community by calling Andrezeski at 452-4783 and urging him to cosponsor and support the bill (the legislation doesn't have a number assigned yet, so urge the Senator to cosponsor the Hate Crimes Bill circulated by Senator Heckler). Also, urge Rep. Linda Bebko-Jones (459-1949), Rep. Italo Cappabianca (453-7639), and Rep. Karl Boyes (868-5489) to cosponsor the House version, sponsored by Lita Cohen.

Newly-Infected Are Most Contagious

A person who has just been infected with the AIDS virus is more contagious than he or she ever will be again. Researchers at the University of Michigan have found that in the first 60 days after being infected, a person is 100 to 1,000 times more contagious than they will be later. And during this extremely dangerous period of time, the virus won't be detected by HIV tests, since the body needs from three to six months to produce antibodies.

Risk of HIV

The risk of HIV infection is increasing! Why aren't people listening? Even with all the media hype, and the tremendous amounts of information about HIV/AIDS, people are still taking risks. Indicators that HIV/AIDS statistics will continue to rise are the increase in teen pregnancy, the increased use of injectable drugs, and the increase in unprotected sex. Is your behavior putting you at risk for HIV infection?

The Center for Disease Control and State and local health departments continue to flood the market with literature, posters, and public service announce-

Increase your awareness of the behaviors that can put you at risk and don't be fooled into thinking you can identify individuals who are infected with HIV.

Carefully read the following list of risk behaviors and if you answer yes to any one item you should be

- Having sex with a man infected with HIV.
- Having sex with a woman infected with HIV.
- Using injectable drugs and sharing needles.
- Using non-injectable drugs like alcohol and marijuana that clouds your judgement and sexual behavior.
- Having sex for drugs and/or money.
- Contracting a sexually transmitted disease increases your vulnerability.
- Having sex with an intravenous drug user who shares needles.
- Having sex with a man who has had sex with a
- Having sex with a person who has HIV or AIDS.
- Getting a needlestick or blood splash when caring for an HIV or AIDS patient.
- Being a victim of a sexual assault

Evaluate your own risk behavior and reduce your chance of HIV infection. If you have concerns about your HIV status, Get Tested!

AIDS Now #1 Killer of Young

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31—New figures by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) show that in 1993 HIV became the leading cause of death among people ages 25-44.

Individual Research Encouraged

WASHINGTON—AIDS research money needs to focus more on supporting the work of individual scientists and away from central planning. This was the position of William A. Paul, Head of the Office of AIDS Research at the National Institutes of Health (NIH), published in the journal *Science*. Paul also believes more money needs to be spent on understanding how HIV behaves. The two positions are a departure from recent AIDS policy, and have received strong support from the AIDS research community and AIDS activists.

New Congress Slashes AIDS Programs

WASHINGTON—The approprations committee on Labor/Health and Human Services/Education has voted to cut \$13 million from the Ryan White CARE Act Programs, which go directly to states and cities to care for people with AIDS. The same committee slashed \$23 million from prevention programs at the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), even though the programs are effectively stemming the spread of the disease. The appropriations subcommittee on Veterans Affairs/housing and Urban Development is considering the total elimination of the \$186 million Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS (HOPWA) program, which provides assistance to people with AIDS who would otherwise lose their homes.

National/World News Bits

"Lesbians With Bugs!"

SAN RAFAEL, Calif., Feb. 8-The San Francisco Lesbian Avengers summoned a "plague of locusts" onto Exodus International today, a cult-like organization whose mission is to "cure" people of their homosexuality. The San Francisco Avengers chose to target Exodus because conversion programs, organized by the Christian Right, have profoundly devastating effects on lesbian, bisexual and gay people. Five avengers stormed the organization's headquarters, carrying signs proclaiming "Queer Love is Not a Disease," and chanting "Exodus, stop your hate and fear! Help like yours is killing queers!" Once inside, the activists climbed onto the reception desk, shouted "We don't need to be cured," and released 1,000 "locusts" (they were actually crickets) in an attempt to shut the operation down. The Exodus staff watched dumbfounded as a swarming pile of crickets spread across their office floor. One woman picked up the phone and dialed 911, shaking as she said, "There are lesbians here with bugs!" By the time she was able to convince the police it wasn't a prank call, the Avengers were on their way back to San Francisco. The Avengers are a nationwide network of local lesbian groups that do colorful consciousness-raising actions.

Bisexual Fruit Flies

Researchers triggering a female gene in male fruit flies caused the males to become attracted to both male and female fruit flies. The findings are expected to be added to the growing list of evidence that sexual orientation has a biological cause. But geneticist Jean-François Ferveur cautions that "What we found in the fruit fly is the first link in a long, complicated story. In flies genes are much more important--in humans it is much more difficult to know their role."

School Board Member Comes Out in **Protest**

DES MOINES, Iowa—After the Des Moines school board dropped a proposal to teach acceptance of gays and lesbians, school board member Jonathon Wilson came out. Wilson came out at a packed meeting, and many in the room gave him a standing ovation. He was also prepared for other reactions, wearing a bulletproof vest at the request of the police. Wilson has served on the school board for 12 years, and was once board president. He had recently received death threats and blackmail threats.

Hate Host Convicted of Child Abuse

GOLDEN, Colo., Feb. 7— The Christian rightwing talk show host who made homophobic jokes about people who died with AIDS has been found guilty of child abuse. Bob Enyert, whose TV show Bob Enyert Live airs in several cities, was found guilty of injuring his seven-year-old stepson while beating him. He could receive two years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. At this writing he was scheduled to go to trial for another beating he gave the boy. Enyert has enraged lesbian and gay viewers by his mean-spirited homophobia. In January he read a sarcastic, homophobic obituary of a gay man who had died of AIDS. After much outcry, the station manager ordered Enyert to stop the practice.

National Lesbian Sex & Relationship Survey

The questionnaire for The Advocate's national survey of lesbian and bisexual women will be in that magazine's Issue 677, on sale March 7. The responses will be tabulated and reported in a later issue.

Gays Barred From Boston St. Pat's Parade

BOSTON, Jan. 27—Organizers of Boston's big St. Patrick's parade can bar gay people. A U.S. District Court judge has ruled that prohibiting gay marchers is legal because parade organizers have registered the event as an anti-gay protest. The Irish-American Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Group of Boston was allowed to march in the parade in 1993, because of a court order. In 1994, the parade's organizers canceled the parade rather than allow gays to march. The U.S. Supreme Court has agreed to review the case.

Gay Minister Arrested at Pat Robertson's HQ

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. Feb. 21—Rev. Mel White, a former ghostwriter for Pat Robertson, is fasting following his arrest on February 15 at Pat Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network (CBN) headquarters. Rev. White, who is openly gay, has been attempting to meet with his former boss Robertson for more than 20 months to discuss Robertson's extensive use of anti-gay rhetoric on the 700 Club and in Christian Coalition policy statements and fund-raising appeals. Rev. White is currently with the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches, which minister to gay, lesbian, and bisexual people.

Conviction in Laurel Murder Trial

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 13—Rejecting the HIV and gay panic arguments of the defense, a jury convicted Marvin McClendon, 17, in the slaying of two gay men near Laurel, Mississippi. Circuit Judge Billy Landrum, who earlier had released the HIV status of both victims to the jury, sentenced McClendon to two consecutive life prison terms for the murders of Robert Walters and Joseph Shoemake. The 12 member jury included five African-Americans. The defense attorney had tried to create the impression that McClendon, who is black, was being framed by white gay activists.

Freedom Ride to Mississippi

A freedom ride involving a thousand gays and lesbians from across America is being organized to go to the besieged Camp Sister Spirit, in Ovett, Mississippi. Camp Sister Spirit is a women's retreat owned by two lesbians, Brenda and Wands Henson. The camp has been the target of an ongoing campaign of violence, harassment, and intimidation and death threats organized by the radical right. The Freedom Ride hopes to bring a thousand people to the aid of the Hensons and their besieged property. Participants will help clear the land and aid in building, and will have the opportunity to participare in workshops, sing-alongs, and worship services. The event will take place over Memorial Day Weekend. Italian Bishop Makes Supportive Remarks

ROME, Feb. 15—Italy's gay and lesbian community was encouraged by a Catholic bishop's supportive remarks about gays. In his St. Valentine's Day sermon, Bishop Franco Gualdrini of Terni said "other unions are 'other' and 'different'... Certainly, one does not want to take away their [gays'] right to dignity and their right to a home and work and their right to contribute to the good of others and society." Italian gay activist Franco Grillini said he hopes this indicates that the Roman Catholic church is relaxing its harsh position about homosexuality.

Transitions

DISCLOSED: Greg Louganis, 35, that he has developed full-blown AIDS. An Olympic gold medalist, Louganis is considered the greatest diver of all time. He came out during the Gay Games.

DIED: Paul Monette, 49, of complications due to AIDS. Monette was a prolific and widely-acclaimed writer and poet. His memoir Becoming a Man: Half a Life Story told about his difficult struggle to accept his homosexuality while growing up, and won him a National Book Award in 1992. Some other works include Borrowed Time: An AIDS Memoir; Love Alone: Eighteen Elegies for Rog, and Halfway Home.

DIED: Jean Swallow, 41, lesbian author. Swallow wrote a novel, Leave a Light On for Me, and two books on lesbians and alcohol recovery, Out From Under and The Next Step. She apparently committed suicide.

DIED: Patricia Highsmith, 74, of leukemia. Highsmith was a popular crime novelist, but her writing is best known to lesbians in her book The Price of Salt, a classic tale of lesbian romance that was unusually sympathetic for its time (1952). It was published under the pseudonym Claire Morgan.
