





An Open Letter to the Gay Community

Please allow me five minutes of your time to tell you about an important opportunity for the gay / lesbian / transgendered community.

On May 16, 1995, voters all across Pennsylvania will be casting ballots in the Municipal Primaries, deciding who the party candidates will be for various offices being filled in the November General Election. While most races statewide embrace the typical fare of campaign rhetoric, one campaign in northwestern Pennsylvania holds particular interest for the lesbigay/ Transgender community: the County Commissioners' race in Venango Co. What distinguishes this race from the others is the candidacy of Kristine W. Holt.

Recently, a news article was carried by the Associated Press, announcing Ms. Holt's candidacy. The headline proclaimed her "difference"; she is a transsexual woman, who has lived openly in her community as such since her transition three years ago. In spite of some resistance from a small segment of people, she has been very active in the public affairs of her community. She currently holds the elected position of Democratic Committeewoman for her ward; her base of support in the larger community is strong. Now, she seeks the office of County Commissioner.

What does Ms. Holt's campaign mean for the lesbigay community? Simply put, Kris's effort is a visible sign that people of minority sexual orientations *can participate fully* in the political processes that affect our lives. Until Harvey Milk, openly gay politicians were unheard of. His election opened a floodgate of unashamedly gay candidates nationwide. Unfortunately, this change has yet to come to northwestern Pennsylvania. The citizenry still holds to old prejudices and fears about the gay community, and these are reflected in the political structure. Discrimination is openly embraced. And up to now, the community has *no* voice in the important matters that affect it.

Kristine Holt can change that. She herself has been waging an antidiscrimination battle against a government agency and the political offices of five separate northwestern Pennsylvania counties. She now wishes to be able to *make* policy, not just fight it, in order to ensure that what happened to her can never happen to others. Her platform calls for "...recognizing the value of diversity among our citizens and [being] receptive to new ideas." Kris's tenure as County Commissioner of Venango County will set a shining example to the rest of rural Pennsylvania.

Your help is desperately needed. To be bluntly honest, a political campaign costs money. While Kris has won paper victories in her antidiscrimination actions, they have not translated to real dollars. True to her will to effect real change in society, though, she is persevering in the struggle, despite her current welfare recipient status.

As an open member of the gay community, I feel an obligation to support Ms. Holt's campaign in whatever way I can. To this end, I have volunteered many hours helping her collect signatures for her nominating petition, distributing leaflets, and brainstorming with others over campaign issues and tactics. But this doesn't cover the basic expenses of the campaign, such as media and newspaper advertising and printing costs for posters, flyers and other campaign literature. For these, cold hard cash is needed. There is no local organization available to help us with this need.

Your cash contribution, in any amount, will be gratefully appreciated. The donation is an investment in our civil rights, in a voice in our government. It was made in response to the Radical Right's hateful *The Gay Agenda*. Nominated for Best Actor is **Nigel Hawthorne** for his role in **The Madness of King George**. Hawthorne recently came out in *The Advocate*. In the article he talks about his partner of 15 years. **Melissa Etheridge** won an Outstanding Music Video award from the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) for her video for "I'm the Only **One**", which includes lesbians.

Scheduled for release in May is Too Wong Foo, Thanks for Everything Julie Newmar with Patrick Swayze, Wesley Snipes, and John Leguizamo as gay drag queens. Swayze says the portrayals are sympathetic, and that he wouldn't have participated in a film that made fun of the characters.
- GRAMMIES: Lesbians and gay men did pretty well at the Grammies. Bruce Springsteen (a decidedly straight artist) won took home four awards for his haunting "Streets of Philadelphia" including Song of the year. Melissa Etheridge won for Female Rock Vocal with "Come to My Window" (and Entertainment Tonight showed Melissa and her lover dancing at a post Grammies party). Elton John won best male pop vocal for "Can You Feel the Love Tonight." (his Circle of Life was also nominated in

Salt-N-Pepa won for rap duo or group with "None of Your Business," a whocares-what-you-think anthem that includes quick reference to gayness in the song's video. k.d. lang & Tony Bennett were nominated for best collaboration with "Moonglow," but didn't win (they also performed together on the Grammies). New artist and out lesbian Me'Shell NdegeOcello was nominated for four categories but didn't win any. Reba McEntire was nominated but didn't win for female country vocal for her "She Thinks His Name Was John," a cautionary tale about HIV and unsafe sex.

Buffalo United Artists will give a "community discount," that is, people who come to their performances and tell them they are a member of this or that lesbian/gay organization can buy their tickets at \$10 instead of the usual \$15. Because most gay/lesbian groups don't issue cards, this will be on the honor system. Readers may be confused about where Twilight of the Golds is playing, because last month we noted that it would be performed in Pittsburgh. It is indeed playing there at the same time (April) in both places. The plot, as was noted last month, is about a woman who discovers that the child she is pregnant with will be born gay. She considers an abortion, and then her brother comes out to her. Lots of interesting ethical issues brought up. . . In Pittsburgh, Slavs! It's not exactly a gay-themed play, being set in Russia on the eve of glasnost, though there is a major character who is a lesbian who watches over the labs where the brains of the country's great thinkers are stored. It's written by Tony Kushner, the gay playwright who wrote the gay AIDS epic Angels in America. Tickets & info (412)431-CITY.



Gay/Lesbian Parent Books Top Most Hated List

The two most banned books in America are children's books about parents with same-sex partners. *Daddy's Roommate*, by Michael Willhoite (Alyson, \$8.95) and *Heather Has Two Mommies* by Leslea Neaman (Alyson \$7.95) topped the American Library Associations 1994 list of books that have been banned from libraries.

Pitt Blames Funding Woes on Same-Sex Partners Policy

The University of Pittsburgh's plans to build a college of business administration are jeopardized because of serious financial problems, and some in the surrounding business community are blaming it on Pitt's domestic partners policy.

State Laws

South Dakota, March 1—A bill that would have banned same-sex marriages has been defeated in South Dakota's state legislature. The bill was the first attempt to ban gay marriage, as a preemptive strike against a pending decision in Hawaii that may give same-sex marriage legal standing. Although the bill sailed through the state house, it couldn't get enough support tin the sate Senate. The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force is calling the victory "stunning."

JUNEAU, Alaska—The Alaskan state legislature is considering two bills against same-sex marriage. One bill, HB 227, would ban recognition of same-sex marriage. This could have national implications if the state of Hawaii, which is currently deciding on marriage rights of same-sex couples, would grant those rights in the near future.

SALT LAKE CITY—Utah's Lesbian and gay activists have announced they will fight their state's bid to host the 2002 Winter Olympics after state legislators voted to ban recognition of same-sex marriage. Gay activists were successful in moving 1996 Olympic events out of Cobb County Georgia after that community enacted anti-gay legislation. The Utah activists are modeling their campaign after the Cobb County efforts.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 13-California Governor Pete Wilson rescinded 3-month-old

legislation allowing same-sex couples to adopt children.

Stranger at the Gate

Mel White, 1994 (Simon & Schuster. Hardcover. \$23)



Jerry Falwell, Pat Robertson, and Billy Graham are probably trying to pretend this book doesn't exist. Mel White, their ghostwriter, dedicated family man, and Christian conservative has recognized that he's not sick. He's a gay man.

Stranger at the Gate is White's story of growing up in a dominating Christian family, being a loving husband and father, and struggling for fifty years with his homosexuality.

White's discussion of misinterpreted Bible passages is a major public service; so is the text of his "coming-out" letters to Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson.

Mel White is now Dean of the Cathedral of Hope, Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches, in Dallas, Texas.

English Christians and Homosexuality

LONDON—Events in England are heating up the debate over homosexuality and the church.

Early in March, 74-year-old retired Anglican bishop, Rt. Rev. Derek Rawcliff became the highest ranking Anglican clergyman to announce he is gay. Rawcliffe stated that he thought the Church should bless same-sex marriages. On March 18, just one year after the Anglican Church began ordaining women priests, Reverend Ros Hunt of Cambridge decided to announce publicly that she is a lesbian. On March 20, the Anglican Church's third-ranking bishop Rt. Rev. David Hope said his sexuality is "ambiguous" but celibate.

Bishop Hope made the announcement after he received a letter from England's OutRage!, an organization encourages gay men and lesbians to come out publicly, as well as engaging in "outing" of public persons. Last fall, OutRage! outed ten bishops after a newspaper revealed that a man who had been newlyappointed to a top post in the Church had been arrested in 1967 having sex with a man in a public bathroom. The group has promised to out more clergymen, and say they plan to do the same with people holding political posts. Most British gay and lesbian organizations oppose the tactics of OutRage! The Anglican Church doesn't see gay people as sinners, but says that gay people should not have sex.

In the midst of all the debate about religion and homosexuality, England's top Catholic official has made a personal statement in support of tolerance of

and respect for gay and lesbian people. Cardinal Basil Hume, stated that "Love between two persons, whether of the same sex or of a different sex, is to be treasured and respected." He pointed out that the Catholic Church does teach that sex between two people of the same gender is "morally wrong." He added that, "Nothing in the Church's teaching can be said to support or sanction, even implicitly, the victimization of homosexual men and women. Furthermore, homophobia should have no place among Catholics." Rt. Rev. Rawcliffe responded to the cardinal's stance; "We don't say to heterosexual people—God has made you, God has given you this sexuality but you're not to use it."

Mel White Update

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va., March 9-The man who was incarcerated in a protest against Pat Robertson's extensive anti-gay rhetoric was released from jail and has ended his 23-day fast. Robertson and a CBN spokesman finally met with White, who used to be a ghostwriter for Robertson. White asked Robertson to publicly acknowledge the rise in anti- gay and lesbian hate crimes, to publicly condemn people who commit or incite these crimes, and to meet with people from PFLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays). Robertson stated that he would respond within a few days. At the meeting Robertson gave White a letter that said he did not preach hate and that "charges that people were injured by violence incited by anything said by me are baseless." He also dropped charges against White, and White was then released.

Robertson is on record as having made the following statement on his TV program 700 Club: "Many of those involved {with} Adolf Hitler were Satanists, many of them were homosexuals—the two things seem to go together." (People for the American Way has the transcript containing these remarks. You can contact them at 202-467-4999).

Media Watch

Jenny Jones, Journalism & Jabberwocky

"Jabberwocky," says Lewis Carroll, is "meaningless writing." The term is an apt description for much of the so-called reporting on the recent murder of a gay man who appeared on the Jenny Jones talk show. As part of a "Secret Admirers" segment, Scott Amedure---a gay guest---revealed his attraction for another guest (John Schmitz, reported to be heterosexual): three days later, Amedure was shot and killed by the "embarrassed" Schmitz.

Though the horrific murder was widely-reported, virtually none of the mainstream media mentioned the word "homophobia." Remarkably, the hate motivation behind the crime—known to all lesbians and gay men—went unreported. The press focused instead on the issue of whether or not TV talk shows have become "too trashy." As a result, these reports lacked any meaningful context for understanding the killing.

The major television networks (NBC, CBS, and ABC) emphasized the talk-show "sleaze" factor. Their news divisions failed to account for the homophobia so endemic to our society—which should have been this story's lead. In fact, by focusing on whether or not Schmitz had been deceived or "abused" by Jenny Jones producers, the networks actually managed to portray the murderer as the victim!

The print media did an even worse job. The Associated Press report on the murder (March 11), written by Frazier Moore, also sidestepped homophobia. For Moore, the centralissue was the morality of the talk show's producers. The article was written as if contrary to all logic—the murder resulted from the mere fact of the talk-show "deception." The likelihood of the crime, this AP reporter suggested, would have been the same whether Amedure had been a gay man or a straight woman.

The New York Times first reported the story in a small article on March 12th, which NEVER men-

tioned the words "gay" or "homophobia." On March 14th, The Times ran a front page article that made a brief reference to the murder and then went on to question the integrity of talk shows in general.

The Reuters news syndicate began their story with this sentence: "Prosecutors alleged Friday that a nationally syndicated talk show is partly to blame for a murder-committed by a male guest angered after being introduced on-camera to a secret admirer who turned out to be another man." The reuters article then describes how the murderer-Schmitz--"kept his composure" during the taping, but was ultimately "shocked" and "unable to control his anger." Quoted extensively is Michigan prosecutor Richard Thompson, who not only "partly"-but FULLY-blames the murder "on the Jenny Jones Show which ambushed this defendant with humiliation." Nowhere in this article is any mention made of homophobia, and NOT ONE expert on lesbian/gay hate violence is quoted. In fact, not one openly-lesbian or -gay person is quoted by Reuters!

In every case, journalists completely missed the story. The story here, of course, isn't Jenny Jones or "guests' rights," or even talk-show "sleaze."

The story is hate. The story is homophobia. The story is, as Marlon Riggs once wrote, "the queer blood that runs loose and wild along the curbsides" of our streets...in every city and town.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, lesbians and gay men are probably THE MOST FRE-QUENT victims of hate violence in this country. The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force reports that, in 1994 alone, at least 59 lesbian and gay individuals lost their lives in bias-motivated murders. It is unacceptable for the mainstream media to brush these and similar facts aside. It is unprofessional—and unconscionable—for journalists to ignore homophobia when reporting on the hate crimes committed against our community.

Widening Madison Avenue

Writing for Variety, ("Bucking Pressure, TV Ad Buyers Return to Adult Shows"), J. Max Robins reports: "One year after Madison Avenue gave thumbs down to lesbian lip locks, bare butts and bondage, advertisers are returning in droves to some of broadcast television's racier shows." According to Robins: "A year ago, advertisers pulled out of a *Roseanne* episode featuring the star kissing Mariel Hemingway in a gay [sic] bar. But last month, advertisers paid full market value for NBC's telefilm *Serving in Silence: The Margarethe Cammermeyer Story*, based on the true story of an Army lesbian. In the film, Glenn Close shared a kiss with her significant other, Judy Davis.

"Meanwhile," Robins reports, "many companies now believe that complaints from far-right religious groups have had little effect on their business...While they are loathe to admit it publicly, there's a sense both at the networks and in the advertising community that the clout of pressure groups, such as the Rev. Donald Wildmon's American Family Association, is on the wane."

The news is encouraging, of course, since ad prices have often plummeted for so-called "controversial" (i.e., lesbian/gay/bisexual) television shows. If the trend persists, it will no longer take "courage" but simply good business sense to advertise on programs with lesbian, gay or bisexual themes. "Advertiser tolerance has increase because many of the adult shows are ratings and critical hits," says Robins. "The mores of the country have changed and advertisers have begun to recognize it," adds Bill Croasdale of Western International media.

Certainly, Madison Avenue's broadening consciousness has much to do with consumer response. It is vital that lesbians and gays let companies know that they appreciate (or resent) sponsorship of particular broadcasts. For too long, that strategy has been left wholly to the "Religious Right." Unfortunately, however, Robins' article examines only the waning influence of homophobes. He fails to report on the rising effectiveness of lesbian/gay media watchdogs.

Robins' blanket characterization of lesbian/gay programs as "racy" fare is also off the mark. Still, he succeeds in pointing out some important ground that has yet to be broken. "Gay characters are now common in prime time, but they don't get to bed-hop like their straight counterparts," Robins writes.

Well, "common is hardly accurate (perhaps "less scarce"?). And, in fact, mainstream television does not simply censor lesbian/gay "bed hopping." The medium, for the most part, has refused to portray lesbians and gays in ANY of the loving (and human) relationships that form our lives and our community.

However awkward, Robins' point is well-taken. And, all-in-all, his article sheds some welcome light on a welcome trend.

HIV/AIDS - US & World Hemophiliac Suit Dismissed

CHICAGO, March 19—A federal appeals court has ruled that the thousands of hemophiliacs who were infected with HIV from blood-clotting products can't join in a lawsuit against four blood companies and the National Hemophilia Foundation. The suit charges that the defendants ignored advice from the CDC on how to protect the blood supply from contamination by HIV. Judge Richard A. Posner of the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals wrote that the class action would allow a jury to "hold the fate of an industry in the palm of its hand," and could "hurl the industry into bankruptcy." The leading attorney for the hemophiliacs is seeking a rehearing.

No HIV+ Olympic Athletes?

WASHINGTON, DC, Feb. 28—Pointing to HIV-positive diver Greg Louganis, a county commissioner in Georgia is calling for HIV-positive athletes to be barred from the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta. The International Olympic Committee has stated they will not conduct HIV tests on Olympic athletes in the 1996 games.

More Proof that Kaposi's is Sexually Transmitted

LONDON, March 24—Two separate studies in the medical journal Lancet have found that Kaposi's

sarcoma is caused by a sexually-transmitted virus. The deadly cancer is most prevalent in gay men.

Weird Stuff

ROME, March 3—A man in Italy who contracted HIV after being stabbed by a hypodermic needle with HIV-infected blood has died. The incident happened eight years ago when the man, who worked for an insurance firm, was attacked by a drug addict when he refused to pay on a false insurance claim.

KINGSTON, Ontario, Feb. 9—A serial murderer injected himself with HIV-positive blood to carry out a self-inflicted death penalty on himself. "I knew society wouldn't be satisfied with this [prison] sentence," said Terry Fitzsimmons, who pleaded guilty to three murders," so I thought I'd give them the capital punishment they always wanted." Fitzsimmons had injected himself with the blood of an HIV-positive man, and is now HIV-positive.

Gay Navy Poster

SAN FRANCISCO, March 8—The Navy has decided to allow a media company to use a 1972 recruiting poster that featured a black man who was later discharged for being gay. The poster will be used by Apollo Media in a CD-ROM version of *Conduct Unbecoming*, Randy Shilts' book on gays in the military. The CD-ROM package should be on store shelves now. The Navy had originally refused to give permission to use the poster.

Rolling Stone Founder Outed

NEW YORK—Jann Wenner, founder of *Rolling* Stone and several other magazines, left his wife and children and moved in with another man. Several publications, from the tabloids to the *Wall Street Journal* participated in the outing. The incident has sparked debate about the ethics of outing. Some gay rights activists say that the idea of suppressing the story shows an anti-gay bias, because. as Michael Musto wrote in the *Village Voice*, "It's a form of catering to potential bigotry by withholding information—only doing so for gay stuff!"

Buchanan in '96?

MANCHESTER, N.H.—Pat Buchanan, who delivered an anti-gay speech at the 1992 Republican National Convention, has announced he will run for president in the 1996 campaign. He is looking to the religious right for support.

Those Gingrich Kids

WASHINGTON, March 8—On March 7, Candace Gingrich, Newt's lesbian half-sister, was on Capitol Hill with numerous other gay rights activists, lobbying in favor of lesbian and gay rights. Candace, who lives in Harrisburg, met with her representatives, all Republicans: Sen. Arlen Specter and Congressman George Gekas, and one of Sen. Rick Santorum's staff members. She also met with brother Newt.

The next day, at a news conference, Newt Gingrich explained his positions on those same rights. He criticized gay counseling and pro-tolerance teachings

in the schools, because they amount to "recruitment" of children; indicated that he was opposed to a federal protecting gay people from anti-gay discrimination; and remarked that transvestites should not think they have the right to work as transvestites. He tempered his remarks by saying that the U.S. should not return to "repression" of gays and lesbians, and that employers shouldn't ask employees about sexual orientation.

Montana Decides Against Registering Gays

HELENA, Montana, March 23–After a national public outcry, the Montanastate Senate decided against a law that would require police registration of people who are convicted of homosexual acts. The Senate had originally approved registering not only convicted sex offenders, rapists and murderers, but also people who had had consensual sex with someone of the same gender. The reason for including homosexual sex in the police registration is that homosexual acts are illegal in Montana. Sen. Al Bishop R-Billings, had said that gay sex is "even worse than a violent sex act." Sandra Hale, executive director of Montana Pride, remarked that Bishop's statement was "an insult to women who have been raped, children who have been molested and any victim of a truly violent crime-let alone lesbians, gay men, and bisexuals who are in loving, committed relationships."

Fred Phelps Keeps Maya Out of Kansas

EMPORIA, Kan., March 7—Her strong voice has inspired millions, but a hate-crazed religious bigot succeeded in intimidating Maya Angelou into canceling an appearance at Emporia State University. After the homophobic Rev. Fred Phelps and several followers taunted her at a speaking engagement in Topeka, Angelou postponed her reading at the University.

Gay Talk Show Guest Killed By Another Guest

DETROIT, March 9—A gay man, Scott Amedure, was shot and killed three days after appearing on the *Jenny Jones* show to proclaim his love for another man.

Charged with the murder is John Schmitz, 24, who appeared with Amedure on a *Jenny Jones* episode dealing with secret admirers. Schmitz said he was led to believe his secret admirer was a woman, and was humiliated and shocked to learn it was a man. He stated that the incident had "eaten away" at him, and when Schmitz found a suggestive note that Amedure admitted writing, he shot Amedure. Gay rights groups have criticized coverage of the incident, claiming the emphasis has been on "trashy talk shows" and the killer's "humiliation" rather than on the fact that this was homophobic violence. [Read "Media Watch" in this issue for a discussion of this issue].

Australian Boy Sues School Over Anti-Gay Remarks

SYDNEY, March 1— A 17-year-old Australian boy sued his former school after the school captain announced at a school assembly that he could "sniff out a poofter [gay man] at 50 metres." The school's principal and several teachers were seen laughing at the remark, and he received abuse from students and had to leave school. The boy is suing under new antivilification laws protecting people from statements that incite hatred or contempt.

St. Patrick's Parade Updates

NEW YORK, March 17—Police arrested 88 people who were protesting the exclusion of gays in New York's annual St. Patrick's Day parade. Two hours before the march, the Irish Lesbian and Gay Organization tried to hold their own march, chanting, "We're Irish, We're Queer, We'll Be Here Every Year!" Police blocked the gay march, because a federal judge had denied the ILGO's request for a separate march, citing a city ordinance that doesn't allow two marches on the same day. When the protesters were blocked, many of them sat down to block traffic, and that's when the arrests began. City Councilman Tom Duane, an openly-gay man, participated in the protest and promised to do so every year until the ILGO is included in the parade.

BOSTON—Boston's Mayor Tom Menino issued an order barring on-duty city workers from participating in the city's St. Patrick's parade in any official

capacity. Merino supports gay rights, and issued the order because the parade organizers barred gay participation and registered the parade as a gay protest. In the meantime, organizers of Cambridge's St. Patrick's parade offered a hearty welcome to Irish lesbian and gay men who wanted to march with them.

Here's Your Medal, Now Get Out

WASHINGTON, March 1—Lt. Tracy Thorne was awarded the Navy Achievement Medal in a ceremony on February 28. The gay aviator is a little taken aback, because the Navy has been trying to throw him out since he came out on national television in 1992. His commanding officer was also surprised, saying, "What are we doing here? On the one hand, we're kicking you out; on the other, we're giving you a medal."

Gores Entertain Gay Activists

WASINGTON, March 4—Vice President Al Gore and wife Tipper Gore had 150 gay and lesbian activists over to a party in their home. It was an attempt to reconnect with the gay community, many of whose members have felt let down by President Clinton.


