



Breast Cancer News

In conjunction with the Hamot Women's Health Connection, the center will be providing educational programs, counseling and support groups. The Center will be open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m., and some evenings. A physician prescription is required for a mammogram. For more information about the new center, call 877-5386.

Satellite Technology

Recent research has found that satellite technology can be very useful in detecting breast tumors.

Free Mammograms

Once again, the Mother's Day Mammogram program is offering reduced-cost and free mammograms to women who meet American Cancer Society Guidelines. These guidelines

are: Women 40 and up who have not had a mammogram in the past 12-24 months; Women 50 and over who have not had a mammogram in the past 12-24 months; Women with no apparent signs of breast cancer; Women who are not pregnant or nursing.



My father, Peter Mahler, has been diagnosed with ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease). My father came out to me as a bisexual when I was about 10. I was rather nonplussed. I basically came out to my father when I was on the front page of the Erie Times-News Sunday paper 3 summers ago. As you can guess, there are certain aspects of this situation that are probably rather nonstandard. We have been estranged for years due to other circumstances. As a matter of fact, my biggest worry about Dad finding out about me was having to talk with him.

My mom and I have really worked on reconciling with him and I really feel like there has been some real communication, maybe the first in our lives. As a side note, I recently got e-mailed from a cousin who gave me some of the genealogy for my Dad's side of the family (who had been virtual strangers.) Oh yeah, and this cousin is gay too. Micheal and I are going up to visit

him and his hubby in May. This kinda sparked me to work on this genealogy project, because I already knew about the gays on my Mom's side (a cousin, a greatuncle and a great-grandfather—Tell me sexual orientation doesn't have a genetic component!) The thing that I really took away from all of this was how important it is to speak out to the people you care about, and to be honest about who you are. Hungary Grants Common-Law Marriage Rights to Same-Sex Couples

BUDAPEST, March 8-Hungary has given samesex couples common-law marriage rights, becoming the fourth nation to recognize same-sex couples, and the first Eastern European nation to do so. The law had formerly stated that common-law marriages could only exist "between adult men and women." In striking down that law, Hungary's Constitutional Court said "It is arbitrary and contrary to human dignity...that the law [on commonlaw marriages] withholds recognition from couples living in an economic and emotional union simply because they are same-sex." However, the court ruled that civil marriage may only take place between a man and woman. Common-law marriage rights are the same as formal marriage rights in Hungary. People are considered to be in a common-law marriage when they live together permanently and are sexual partners.

Lesbian Mom Loses Custody of Son

RICHMOND, Va. April 21—The Virginia Supreme Court denied custody to lesbian mother Sharon Bottoms. The court ruling said that Bottoms was an unfit mother whose relationship with another woman would subject her son to "social condemnation." The court also ruled that Bottoms was an unfit mother in other ways, based on allegations that apparently were never substantiated.

Bottoms lost custody of her son two years ago when a Virginia judge ruled that she was an unfit mother because she and her lover had oral sex, which is a felony in Virginia. That ruling was reversed last year by the Virginia Court of Appeals, which ruled that a parent's private sexual conduct, illegal or not, was not grounds for denying custody to one's own child.

The Virginia Supreme Court was far from unanimous in its decision, with the court bitterly divided 4-3. Justice Barbara M. Keenan in a dissenting opinion wrote that she supported the earlier court ruling that "adverse effects of a parent's homosexuality on a child cannot be assumed without proof."

The ruling has outraged gay rights and civil liberties organizations around the country.

Bottoms' lawyer, Donald K. Butler, said "This is 1995. None of the prejudices people have against gay and lesbian parents have any basis whatsoever." Butler had been retained for the case by the American Civil Liberties Union. He says he will ask the court to reconsider their decision.

Local Camp That Teaches Diversity

There'll be a camp at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Erie for kids going into grades 1 through 4. The Great Kids Camp '95 will run from June 19-23 and will be held 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the church, 7180 New Perry Highway. The organizers of the camp wish to bring together children from diverse racial, cultural and religious backgrounds. Activities include weaving, skits, fabric dyeing, cooking, nature prints, making scrapbooks, cooperative games and more. The camp organizers will help appreciate the diversity of the human race, and so this first camp will have activities that focus on the people who live in grasslands societies (African savanna, American Great Plains, Argentinian pampas).

Kelly Armor and David Sturtevant will be the camp's artists in residence. Kelly and David are musicians and recording artists who have performed in virtually every school in Erie County. They will be there every day, most of the time and they do a lot of audience participation music. They have been to Tanzania and Kenya and will bring this experience to the camp.

The camp is \$30, with a \$10 nonrefundable deposit that must be sent by June 1, 1995. The children should bring their own lunch, but beverages will be provided. Tidbits

▼ Timbuk 3's new album *A Hundred Lovers* (on the High Street Label) features "Legalize Our Love," a song about giving same-sex couples marriage rights. Another song, called "Prey" attacks the religious right.

♥ The Štreisand Foundation recently gave a \$25,000 grant to the national Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) for Project Open Mind. The Project will be a multimedia presentation to fight negative attitudes about lesbians and gays. Barbra Streisand formed the foundation nine years ago.

 Two Cambodian Women were legally wed in a ceremony in Kro Bao Kok village on March 12.
 The Canadian province of British Columbia has granted adoption rights to lesbians and gay men, while in Denver same-sex couples and unmarried heterosexual couples may now take sick leave if their partner needs care.

Gay Male Couples and Unsafe Sex

Studies are finding that most of the risky sex that goes on between gay men isn't with casual or anonymous partners. It's going on between partners who love each other. And people are getting sick and dying because of it.

The January 31 issue of *The Village Voice* carried an article called "Can You Trust Your Lover: Gay Couples Weigh the Risk of Unprotected Sex." Author Mark Schools points out that couples abandon condoms for different reasons. Some, he says, see the decision to have unprotected sex as a symbol of a couple's love, affection, commitment and/or trust for one another. Some are lured by the illusion of safety and security that being in love can create. Some just get a kick out of crossing the line. And then again, if you believe your lover is negative, why not?

Schoofs tells about a couple named Eric and William, who told each other they were negative. They began their relationship using condoms, then, eventually did away with them. Finally, they decided it was okay to go all the way, and during one lovemaking session, William ejaculated into Eric. Two weeks later, Eric was sick with the flu-like symptoms that signal infection by HIV. When Eric was tested, his worst fears were proven: he was now HIV+. William was tested, and he also was positive. "I've had at least a thousand sexual partners in my life, and I remained negative," said Eric. "I had gotten away with it for so long, and in the sleaziest circumstances. And then in a relationship with someone I cared about, I got infected."

Much sex education directed toward gay male couples advises them to keep using condoms, even if they're in a monogamous relationship, because there is an assumption that gay men can't be faithful to one partner. Australian safer sex educators have developed something of an alternative approach, called "negotiated safety." This talks about the steps a couple can take to safely have unprotected sex within a committed, long-term, monogamous relationship. The approach is extremely controversial, but deserves being looked at. First of all, it involves the couple being willing to talk with one another, and to be open and honest with their partner and themselves. It requires that both partners be tested together, and then tested again six months later. It means talking honestly about sex outside the relationship-if it's acceptable, and if so, what is allowed. It means that if one of them has unsafe sex outside the relationship, the other partner won't punish the transgressor for their honesty, but the couple would deal with it responsibly. It means talking about anal intercourse and how important it is to each partner. It means talking about the nature of their relationship.

But there are a lot of people who think negotiated safety is a dangerous idea; in fact, negotiated safety has sometimes been called "negotiated danger," because there is a lot of potential for failure, and the whole process can be pretty tricky. It's all very nice to promise that you won't punish your partner when he says he has had unsafe sex outside the relationship. The reality is that such news is likely to upset a lot of partners. Because of that, the partner who slipped may be reluctant to tell his lover what happened-not necessarily because he's a creep, but because he is afraid of losing his partner's love. It would probably be helpful to talk about a lot of this with a qualified counselor or sex educator, but a lot of counselors and AIDS educators are not comfortable with the concept of negotiated safety.

It's not just gay men who are having these problems. In a recent survey of women who were in relationships of less than a year, researchers found that

the women are much more likely to use condoms with a casual partner than with a main partner. And like gay men, they are having unprotected sex with their main partners without the couple getting tested for HIV.

These findings clearly indicate that HIV educators need to develop an approach specific to couples. This has been lacking until recently.

Couples need to use some common sense, too. The AIDS virus couldn't care less about whether you're in a wonderful committed monogamous relationship or doing it in some backroom with a stranger. Unless you and your partner have been tested (together), and unless you absolutely know you're both 100% faithful, you'll probably live longer if you "play safe."

Alicia Manus at the Erie County Health Department says she will be happy to talk to couples about getting tested together. Call her at 451-6700. Alicia is also preparing an article on the subject, which we hope to run next month.

New, More Aggressive HIV Strains on the Way to US

BOSTON, April 6—Four even-more-dangerous strains of HIV are headed to the U.S., and they are much more easily transmitted through heterosexual sex. That was the warning from Harvard AIDS Institute Chairman Max Essex. These strains have already infected 15-30 million people, mostly in Africa and Asia, says Essex.

The HIV strain that has struck Europe and North America is the B strain. According to Essex, heterosexuals are infected with the B strain of HIV an average of once per every 500 to 1,000 sex acts. The four aggressive strains—called the A, C, D, and E strains are much more infectious for heterosexuals, being transmitted once every 10 to 40 sex acts.

Essex is a virologist who helped develop the blood test for HIV. He called for action to be taken now, before a full-blown epidemic develops.

AIDS Programs Cut

The US House of Representatives has eliminated from its budget proposal funding for the Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA) program in December. The issue is currently in the hands of the US Senate. This House decision sent out a stark signal about the instability of AIDS funding as this Republican Congress flexes its muscle in Washington.

Angry demonstrations have taken place in New York, Philadelphia, and other cities. These cities were to be hardest hit by Housing and Urban Development (HUD) cutbacks. Although President Clinton decided to spare HUD from the wrecking ball, the agency will still undergo a drastic change. Possibly, many of the programs under HUD would be rolled into block grants to be administered by the states receiving them.

The three year old HOPWA program has allocated almost \$500 million so far, including money to the Northwest Pennsylvania Rural AIDS Alliance (NWPRAA), which supplies services to the thirteen county area of northwest PA. Services through HOPWA have been supplied to over eighty consumers in this area and they consist of monthly rental assistance, short term rent, mortgages, utility payments, and supportive service. Under existing programs, the access of funds for rental assistance are delivered to persons who are low income and live in facilities that meet housing quality standards. These requirements eliminate the majority of applicants that can benefit from this funding. The NWPRAA is working to help find funding to help people upgrade their residences to pass HUD's inspections and qualify for these funds. The HOPWA program was established because the needs of people with AIDS were not being met by existing programs. It is deadly and cruel to force people with AIDS, the elderly and people with disabilities, who need federally supported housing, to compete for dwindling resources when the system already exists to assure that special needs are able to be addressed.

The federal government has put all of the programs that deliver services to people with AIDS in jeopardy. The Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Act has been in committee since February. Four weeks ago, Senators Kassebaum and Kennedy introduced S.641 and it was unanimously reported out of the Labor and Human Resources Committee with no amendments the next day. The Ryan White CARE Act supplies the majority of funds for the operation of the NWPRAA. With a grant in 1994 of more than \$200,000, the NWPRAA supplies four case managers to the region, as well as grants for physician, pharmaceutical, dental, and emergency needs to benefit people

with HIV infection. With more than 3 months left in the 94-95 fiscal year, the NWPRAA has already received and granted more than 200 individual requests for assistance. This assistance totals more than \$76,000. The Ryan White CARE Act enables thousands of individuals living with AIDS, access to services that would normally not be available to them.

The remainder of operating funds for the NWPRAA are state AIDS 106 funds through the PA Department of Health, Bureau of HIV/AIDS. These funds supply monies for AIDS education, support to local AIDS Service Organizations, and something new to the region, a Rural Health Care Clinic. The funds supplied through the state are a bit more secure than those supplied by the federal government, however, problems with the state system are bountiful as well. Clarion University, fiscal agent for the NWPRAA, has carried the AIDS programs through each fiscal year. Problems in state contractual processes sometimes continue on through 11 months of the fiscal year.

The funding which supplies services to persons with AIDS is by no means assured, and it will be a fight to keep it in line. Individuals need to make a concerted effort to relay their feelings to their legislators about the need to continue funding for these programs. The following individuals need to hear from you:

Gay Rights Group Hires Candace

WASHINGTON, April 18—The nation's largest lesbian and gay rights organization has hired Newt Gingrich's sister Candace as a spokeswoman. Candace Gingrich, 28, was hired by the Human Rights Campaign Fund to be spokeswoman for their National Coming Out Project. The Human Rights Campaign Fund coordinates National Coming Out Day. Earlier in the month, Candace accepted an invitation to be one of for grand marshal's of the San Francisco Lesbian-Gay Freedom Day Parade in June.

Press Agency Wrongly Fired Reporter

WASHINGTON, April 14—A judge ruled that the United Press International illegally fired a reporter after learning she was a lesbian and ordered the UPI to clear the reporter's employment record. The reporter's attorneys claimed that UPI buckled to pressure from a national religious broadcaster (Rev. Vic Eliason) who urged listeners to flood the UPI with complaints about reporter Julie Brienza. In a separate suit against Rev. Eliason, Eliason agreed to pay \$225,000 to Brienza and to acknowledge publicly that gay men and lesbians don't have equal rights in the media.

Polish Constitution Bans Anti-Gay Discrimination

WARSAW, April 11—Under the new Polish constitution, discrimination against people because of sexual orientation would be illegal. The left-wingdominated commission voted in favor of the provision, although a spokesman for President Lech Walesa argued against it. The new constitution will be approved by parliament and voted on in a referendum.

Contract With America Protest

A national protest against the Contract with America is scheduled to take place May 6 in Washington DC. The event involves a great number of organizations and individuals with different complaints against the Contract with America. The Contract was developed by the Republican Party and presents a wide-ranging approach to changing America. The lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered community is being asked to participate because of the anti-gay thetoric and actions that have become a part of the

March 8—Cincinnati's City Council removed sexual orientation from their antidiscrimination policy.

March 17—New Mexico passed a hate crimes bill that covers lesbians and gay men.

April 12—Two artists have created Contract With America underpants for men and women, with House Speaker Newt Gingrich on the front. Artist Marshall Reese said, "There is a personal threat here to our personal lives and liberties, to reproductive rights and sexual orientation. So we thought, let's make this really ridiculous, absurd product."

April 13—Over half of the nation's U.S. senators and congressmembers have policies in their offices that prohibit sexual orientation discrimination, according to a study conducted by the Human Rights Campaign Fund.

April 14—Roberta Achtenberg, the highest-ranking lesbian in the Clinton administration will resign April 30 to run in the race for mayor of San Francisco.


