

The movie actually focuses a lot on the reactions of their mothers (Julie Andrews and Ann-Margaret).

Serving in Silence: The Margarethe Cammermeyer Story garnered a number of important Emmy nominations, including for best movie, best actress in a miniseries or special (Glenn Close), best supporting actress (Judy Davis). Also, gay friendly sitcoms Frasier and Friends were nominated for best comedy series. Frasier's Dan Butler will join Candace Gingrich as spokesperson for 1995 National Coming Out Day. Butler plays the macho, very het "Bulldog" on the NBC sitcom . . . Openlygay Scott Thompson (Kids in the Hall) is now playing Hank's gay assistant on The Larry Sanders Show on HBO (Wed. nites) . . . Jessica Savitch was a national anchorwoman on NBC who led the way for many women in broadcasting, and met an untimely death in an automobile accident. In September, Lifetime television will air two programs about her: Almost Golden: The Jessica Savitch Story and Intimate Portrait: Jessica Savitch. We have no broadcast dates at this time, nor do we have information on how the shows will treat Savitch's relationships with women.

Open Letter to Three Heroes

I feel very strongly that Larry LeVasseur, Heidi Streich and Greg Valiga be honored and recognized for their unbelievable stand and bravery in the heat of controversy in regards to the float in the parade. I wonder if the folks in the lesbigay population understand the position that these three people were placed in and what heroes and leaders they are. Not only in the days before the parade, but during the actual event.

It was estimated that anywhere from 80 to 90,000 people showed up to the actual parade. In the days before the parade there were a series of very serious threats, ranging from the float being rushed, to stoned, and even death threats. The threats became realized by the float being trashed on the day preceding the parade.

I defy anyone to describe with any accuracy the terror of feelings that must have overcome these brave souls as they faced the crowd of 80-90,000 people, not knowing what way they were going to be received. The lesbigay community is in the thousands and even though these people might have only been three in total, they represented Erie county's lesbigay community in its entirety. They should be embraced and acknowledged as today's civic leaders, as the people who have furthered the cause of acceptance. The community owes these three people this acknowledgment in this lifetime, for they will certainly be seen as the Martin Luther Kings of the next.

Newsweek Discovers "New Sex"

On June 21, 1993, an embracing lesbian couple filled the ubiquitous cover of *Newsweek* magazine. "Lesbians have always been the invisible homosexuals, "the caption announced, "now these women are stepping front and center." This week, the magazine has similarly discovered bisexuals. *Newsweek*'s July 17 cover story declares: "A new sexuality emerges... Now it's coming out in the open—in pop culture, in cyberspace and on campus."

Of course, bisexuality is hardly a "new sexuality." But it IS news to much of the mainstream press and—consequently—to much of the public. In that regard, this cover story is a particularly selcome (and long overdue) contribution to bi visibility.

Across seven, well-illustrated pages, Newsweek paints a fairly affirmative portrait of bisexual identities. Significantly, the authors manage to avoid much of the sexnegativity and "voyeuristic" style that has marred similar attempts. And while the article touches upon a broad range of subjects—myths, history, media, sex, love—not a single bigot was quoted for "balance."

Newsweek's coverage is not perfect, of course. In contrast to (or perhaps because of) the article's emphasis on bisexual identity, there is relatively little said, directly, about bisexual politics. The authors gloss over

such concepts as "community" and "movement," though these are fundamental to the very "emergence" announced on the magazine's cover.

Nevertheless, the article is still a groundbreaking achievement for a mainstream medium . . . especially one of this stature. This issue of *Newsweek*—vivid, unapologetic and (literally) covered with bisexuality—will reach several MILLION readers.

There's No Place like Home

July 19 marks the season premiere of *The Larry Sanders Show*, which is entering its fourth year on the Home Box Office Network. In the season's second episode, scheduled for July 26, the cast will be joined by a continuing gay character. The new addition will be played by the (VERY) out gay actor, Scott Thompson (formerly of *Kids in the Hall*).

Scott Thompson's appearance should continue HBO's good record on lesbian and gay representation. Last year, the network made a positive contribution to lesbian visibility with More Than Friends: The Coming Out of Heidi Leiter, which portrayed the story of a high school senior who comes out to herself and her parents, falls in love, and takes her girlfriend to the senior prom. This year, HBO's Sports Division hired Martina Navratilova as a Wimbledon commentator; such high-profile positions are rarely given to lesbian or gay athletes (unless they are closeted). And next year, in February, HBO will debut The Celluloid Closet, a documentary film based on author/activist Vito Russo's seminal history of homosexuality in the movies.

Robert Hofler of the Reuters news service reports: "Amy Heckerling, who directed *Fast Times at Ridgemont High*\ in 1982, brings back the much-maligned teen genre with one of the best cornedies ever made about pretwentysomethings. *Clueless* stars Alicia Silverstone (*The Crush*) as a 90210 babe with the heart of a Gold Card, and newcomer Justin Walker, who plays the screen's first gay 16-year-old heartthrob." Freestyles has since premiered, on July 16 and 17. VH-1 even placed an ad for the program in TV Guide (July 15-21, San Francisco Metropolitan edition p. 87). However, the Freestyles ad avoids every using the words "gay" or "lesbian," simply describing the program as "A Show About Freedom...With Style." A friend died today. We were more than acquaintances, but not yet best pals. Can i share some thoughts & feelings? He was 32, i'm 36. i've already had 4 years more...a reminder that we rarely know how much time any of us has, and a question - how well have I lived those 36? We've got to, once in a while, just STOP. Look around you, look at you. (No, don't "check your look"). What do you see, do you like it? Is it who, where, & what you want to be-is it as much as it could be? Are your relationships (family, friends, partnerships) what you want them to be? Do they know you—and how you feel? How about work..is it you? Do you remember those dreams you had.. are you working towards them, or have they been forgotten, forsaken, or given up on? Go outside & look—at birds, flowers, bugs, sunshine, rain don't ignore the beauty that surrounds us. He

hadn't wanted to suffer, wither away, or have his loved ones watch a slow, painful demise—so there's relief & joy for him—that his pain & suffering were ended quickly, gently. But the sorrow and senselessness remain, for it wasn't his wish to die yet. My friend and his partner shared a very loving, laughing, compassionate & beautiful life. i smile at his partner now, rub his back, hug

him, tell him i love him & am there if he needs anything. As families & friends gather, i'm thankful he's blessed with loved ones who say it & show it, and pray we never stop saying & showing it...not just at our saddest or happiest occasions, but always. As we grow & learn & experience more, i find myself & friends saying 'i love u' before we hang up, or when we hug goodbye..it started some time ago, the bonds & support & genuine love have become a visible, vocal part of our lives. Walking into the funeral home-the sounds, sights, smells, emotions always the same. It never fails to bring memories of all loved ones who've gone beyond this life. A rush of loss, remembrance, sadness, acceptance. Mom once said dealing with death doesn't get easier simply because we age—more because the more we experience it, the more we realize death is as much a part of life as birth is. We learn to accept it easier & we learn that for the departed,

life is simply changed, & the spirit goes on forever. What was my friend's favorite color? Was it green? Does it matter? Maybe not, but there were questions i never asked, thoughts we never shared, that now it's "too late" for, i'm reminded to listen more, ask more real questions, and care more about what matters to those who matter to me. Cancer took this friend. How's your health? When was the last time you checked? Are you doing all you can to stay healthy—are you treating your body with the respect it deserves? How about exercise, rest, & eating right.. all that stuff we so easily let slip by? This friend had helped deliver his sister's baby, and spoke to an adult church group about disease and prejudice..what compassion and courage!! i feel compassion & conviction for family, friends, & causes—but do i actively act? Do you? Shouldn't we? This friend had AIDS. He said of a doctors

office visit..half the people there would've run & cringed if they'd known they were "exposed" to him..but how much more

posed to him. but how much more potentially, realistically dangerous they were to him - with their colds, uncovered coughs, & other contagious, (and for him, life-threatening), diseases? Do i pay enough attention to health safety? Do i remember that the ill-mannered, slow, or irritating stranger may have troubles far worse than mine? What

have i done lately to help in the battle against deadly, deadly ills? Do i promote education-have I donated time, money, or help to a local/national care organization? Do i go the extra mile for those i know have AIDS, or cancer, or...? Do i have insurance and a will? Have i made plans so that if the next statistic is me, i'll be prepared? How about mentally —do I say 'it can't/won't happen to me'? if so, i better wake up and smell those roses—cause we never know what's around the bend. Bottom line? Its my life. i alone am responsible for who i am, how i treat myself & others, for how i live, & speak, & act. What happens may be acts of fate, or God's plan-but how i react, how prepared i am, my legacy, & my attitude are up to me. i feel my friend's presence, and am warmed by his eternal friendship. May i honor his memory by living the lessons he, and so many others, have taught...may i start now, and continue until he & i meet again.

Proposed Law: No Adoption Rights for Right-wing Fundamentalists

OLYMPIA, Wash.—Should right-wing fundamentalists have the right to adopt children? William Humphries decided to turn the tables on the same religious conservatives who have been creating anti-gay initiatives in various states around the country. Humphries' proposed law used exactly the same wording of an anti-gay adoptions law currently on Washington's ballot (Initiative 167) but substituted "right-wing fundamentalists" everywhere that the words "gay and lesbian" appeared.

Humphries, who writes for Seattle's alternative paper, The Stranger, came up with the idea of a counter-initiative while writing an article about the how easy it was to get an initiative on the ballot. These groups can pay just \$5.00 to file to get on the ballot, and then they get their name and hate messages all over the media," says Humphries.



Humphries' initiative won't go on the ballot for this election, though. By the time the state gave him the legal go-ahead to proceed, he had only one week in which to collect 181,000 signatures. Still he thinks the response was good, with many people calling to volunteer and 5,000 signatures being collected in that one week. He also notes that people in other locales have noticed and may do the same thing, and doesn't rule out the possibility of trying it again for a future election.

Conservative Coors Gives Same-Sex Benefits

GOLDEN, Colo., July 7—The Adolph Coors brewing company has long been criticized and boycotted because it has given generously to conservative groups which, among other things, oppose gay civil rights. Now the care offering full benefits to partners of gay and lesbian employees. They also have a gay and lesbian employee association, and a nondiscrimination policy for gay employees. In response to the puzzlement this has caused, Coors says that the foundations and the company are two separate entities.

U.S. Survey: One-third Support Same-Sex Marriage

LANSING, Mich., July 5—A third of American voters support same-sex marriage, according to a new poll. Higher educated and more affluent respondents were the strongest supporters, as were younger people.

Canadian Retired Benefits Decision

OTTAWA, May 25—Canada's Supreme Court has ruled that the partner of a gay man is not entitled to his retirement benefits. Jim Egan, 73, and Jack Nesbit, 64, have been together since 1948. The Court stated that the Old Age Security Act was developed to help low-income elderly women who had stayed home to raise children rather than to work outside the home. The Court did, however, affirm that Canada's Charter and Freedoms prohibits sexual orientation discrimination. Gay and lesbian rights activists say that they will use this affirmation of gay civil rights in numerous other discrimination cases throughout the country.

Liberal Dutch

The Netherlands parliament is considering giving same-sex couples the right to legally marry. According to a recent survey, almost three-quarters of the Dutch support the right of same-sex couples to marry. At present, 70 cities and towns allow same-sex couples to register their relationship. In September, The Netherlands parliament will consider extending marriages rights to same-sex couples.

Australian Gains

June 23—Governor General Bill Hayden came out in support of legal recognition of same-sex marriage and adoption rights for same-sex couples.

July 20—A gay male couple and their son have won recognition as a family for health insurance. The government ordered NIB Health Funds to insure them at the family rate. Gay activists say the decision opens the way for requiring other insurance companies to do the same.

Briefs

Toronto, May 11—An Ontario provincial judge granted adoption orders for four lesbian couples. The decision sets a legal precedent.

Buffalo, May 11—A lesbian has been granted joint custody of her dead lover's children. Pamela Hennessy will share custody with the children's maternal grandmother. Attorneys say it is the first ruling of its kind in the nation.

London: June 22—The makers of Guiness stout are producing the first TV ad in the United Kingdom featuring a gay couple. The ad starts with a couple having a fight and later reveals they are both men. The slogan used is "Guiness: Life isn't always black and white," with Tammy Wynette wailing "Stand By Your Man" in the background.

Chapel Hill, N.C. April 25—The Town Council of Chapel Hill, North Carolina voted unanimously to grant some benefits to same-sex couples and heterosexual domestic partners.

Tallahassee, Fl. April 27—The Florida Supreme Court order a new hearing for a gay man who wants to overturn the law banning gays from adopting. Florida and New Hampshire are the only states that specifically prohibit adoptions by gay and lesbian people.

New York: April 26—A woman can't legally adopt her partner's child because the two women can't legally marry. The family court report recommended the adoption be approved, but the family court judge wouldn't allow it. The state appellate court ruled that such an adoption would be contrary to New York family law, even though such adoptions have been allowed elsewhere in the state.

Los Angeles: June 27—In a case that will probably certainly be cited by foes of gay and lesbian parents, a lesbian mother was sentenced to 25 years to life for the abuse, torture and murder of her infant daughter. The mother's partner was convicted of involuntary manslaughter. The 20-month-old child had old and new scars, and was emaciated. Cause of death was blunt force trauma.

Washington DC: July 3—Same-sex couples in committed relationships are now permitted to legally adopt children in the nation's capital.

Atlanta: June 23—About 80 same-sex couples were married in a ceremony during the 25th Atlanta gay pride celebration.

DonPaul Lucas To Become Regular EGCN Contributor

EGCN is happy to announce that Erie area AIDS activist DonPaul Lucas will be contributing to our publication on a regular basis.

Lucas is a heterosexual man who was infected with HIV in 1985 because of contaminated blood products he used because of his hemophilia. He is the first Erie person with HIV to come out publicly about his status, lending his voice to local TV, radio and newspaper media. (Recently he appeared on the front page on the Erie Daily Times in an article about the number of AIDS cases in Erie County.) Congressman Phil English recently recommended Lucas for a Congressional Medal of Honor for his activism.

Last but not least, Lucas is a strong ally of the gay community. Many in the area know Lucas as the co-owner, with Tina Loomis, of the store called Cocoon, which supplied the gay and lesbian community with rainbow rings and other les/bi/gay stuff. We think his writing will be very much in touch with gay sensibilities.

HIV/AIDS News US/World

Helms Remarks Attacked, Anti-PWA Stand Rejected By Congress

WASHINGTON, July 27—The Senate voted to renew assistance to people with AIDS (Ryan White Act) but rejected mandatory HIV testing of babies and pregnant women. Senator Jesse Helms, predictably, decried the approval as a sign of giving in to the "homosexual lobby." Earlier in the battle, Sen. Jesse Helms said that AIDS funding should be cut because gays become infected with HIV through "deliberate, disgusting, revolt-

ing conduct," he was condemned by AIDS activists, gay rights activists, some Democrats, and President Clinton. Even Gingrich disagreed with Helms' remarks. In response to Helms' contention that AIDS gets more funding than other diseases, Clinton pointed out that during this fiscal year, AIDS funding amounted to less than \$6 billion, cancer \$17.5 billion, and heart disease \$38 billion.

Test Ánimals Mistreated, Die

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., July 11—Monkeys and chimps in a lab doing HIV research were crowded into cages that were too small, kept them in areas that were too hot, and not provided with enough water. Seven primates died from being kept in heat that reached 140 degrees or receiving too little water. The allegations were made by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's complaint against The Coulston Foundation. The violations are expected to add fuel to the already heated debate about using animals for AIDS research.

Postal Carrier Refuses To Deliver To HIV+ Couple

CHARLESTON, W.V.—A postal worker refused to deliver the mail to a heterosexual couple with HIV. He was convinced that he might catch HIV from the metal mailbox or the envelopes and postage stamps they had licked. He went through a two-week training period with local health officials and still refused to deliver their mail, and was put on paid leave. At this writing, he has been fired. The union is appealing this decision.

National AIDS Advisory Council

WASHINGTON—President Clinton has issued an executive order creating a national AIDS Advisory Council with 23 members on it. The council will be chaired by R. Scott Hitt, a California physician and board member of AIDS Project Los Angeles.

Concerns About Condom Ratings

Let me start by clarifying something. I participate in "safer sexual" practices, not safe sex.

Safe sex is mutually monogamous sex between two uninfected people. Since my wife and I are a discordant couple (I'm infected, she's not) by definition we can't have safe sex. This may seem like trivial semantics, but as an AIDS educator, I'm a little concerned that we use the proper terms. (One other term that comes to mind is the constant use of AIDS virus. AIDS is a group of symptoms that define the end stage: of a disease—HIV disease. HIV, human immunodeficiency virus, is the actual cause of the illness. AIDS is simply the definition given to one of the stages of that illness. Once again, it may seem like semantics but I feel it's important to use proper terminology for educational purposes.)

Okay, let's get down to the business at hand...

Condom ratings, how effective are they? Does it really matter if a condom ranks high on a test, if people don't use them? Or if people don't use them correctly and consistently?

The way I feel about condom ratings is to use them as a guide. Read the *Consumer Report* on condoms, check which ones did well in their study and then do some testing of your own. If a particular brand ranks high and you don't like the feel of that brand, you're not going to use them. Take it from me, I know. I personally don't like most of the top of the ratings list brands.

Two brands which I prefer—Class Act and Beyond Seven—fall 24th and 27th on the list respectively. In a report released by the Center for Disease Control, (Condoms and STD/HIV Prevention, January, 1995) two studies were referred to. In one study 124 discordant couples

were studied over a two year period that were using condoms correctly and consistently. In this study, none of the uninfected partners became infected. In contrast, 121 couples who used condoms inconsistently had an infection rate of 10% or 12 infections.

In the other study, 12% or 16 partners became infected due to inconsistent or no condom use in 134 couples. Among couples who used condoms studied, only 3 partners (2%) became infected over a 2 year period.

No particular brands were named in the CDC studies as better or more effective. What was shown was that correct and consistent use of condoms is effective.

So have fun, experiment—a lot. Different styles, textures, colors. Lubricated-nonlubricated (this way you have the option of all sorts of different water-soluble choices which leads to more experimentation.) The more experimentation the better, I always say.

Most New Gay-Related Laws Are Pro-

WASHINGTON, July 12-Almost two-thirds (sixty percent) of the laws enacted by state governments are supportive of lesbian and gay rights. This encouraging finding was revealed by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, which surveyed 97 gay-related bills.

Republican "Wanted" Poster Condemned

WASHINGTON, July 11-Republicans issued a mock "Wanted" poster targeting 28 House Democrats for defeat in upcoming elections. Democrats condemned the poster, because 22 of the 28 congressmembers targeted for defeat are either women or members of minority groups. Among those targeted on the poster were openlygay congressmembers Barney Frank of Massachusetts, Pat Schroeder of Colorado, and Charles Rangel of New York. The poster was being used for Republican fundraising purposes.

Judge: Government Must Pay Gay Sailor's Legal Costs

LOS ANGELES, July 19-A U.S. District Judge ordered the government to pay \$440,000 in court costs for to a sailor who sued the navy after they discharged him for being gay. Petty Officer Keith Meinhold was discharged when he revealed on national television that he was gay. After a two year legal battle, he was reinstated.

Obituaries

May Sarton, of breast cancer, on July 16. She was 83. Sarton was a prolific poet and author. She came out in 1965, with the publication of Mrs. Stevens Hears the Mermaids Singing, which was a novel about a lesbian love affair. Another recent lesbian novel was The Education of Harriet Hatfield. She also liked to write about independent women and about being a feminist. A significant contributor to contemporary literature, many believe that Sarton did not receive the honors due her because of her sexual orientation. In her 66 years of writing, she wrote 30 novels, journals, children's books, and poetry.

Jonas Salk, 80, on June 23. Salk helped develop the vaccines for polio and influenza, and since 1987 had been working on a vaccine for AIDS.

Esther Rome, coauthor (with the Boston Women's Health Collective) of the women's health guide Our Bodies, Ourselves, of breast cancer, on June 26. She was 49. When Our Bodies, Ourselves (now called The new Our Bodies Ourselves) was written 25 years ago, it broke new ground in the way it dealt with women's health issues and in how affirming it was of lesbians and bisexual women. At the time of her death, Rome was collaborating with another woman on a book called Risking Health for

Warren Burger, former Supreme Court Justice. on June 25. He was 87. When the Supreme Court ruled in the now infamous Bowers v. Hardwick decision (1986) that gays did not have the right to "engage in consensual sodomy, even in the privacy of home," Burger took the opportunity to author a separate, and very homophobic opinion, citing old or ancient sources that harshly condemn homosexual acts. "To hold that the act of homosexual sodomy is somehow protected as a fundamental right," he wrote, "would be to cast aside millennia of moral teaching.'
