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



Lesbians and Breast Cancer

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Many studies have found that there is a somewhat higher incidence of breast cancer among lesbians. One study conducted by the Lesbian Health Project of Los Angeles contradicts that finding and finds no discernible difference.

In the meantime, breast cancer remains a real concern for all women, and wise women will stay informed of new findings and the standard precautions.

Diet

Study after study, a diet high in fat seems to raise the risk of certain cancers, including breast cancer. Women who live in countries where the traditional diet is low in fat tend to have lower incidence of breast cancer. Other dietary changes involve lowering your intake of red meat, eating five servings daily of fruits and vegetables, and taking antioxidants like Vitamins A, C, E and selenium.

Location

The environmental organization Greenpeace recently released findings that women living along the Great Lakes seem to be at somewhat higher risk of developing breast cancer. They suggested that it might be due to the number of nuclear power plants and industrial facilities in the Great Lakes region.

Exercise

Studies are beginning to show that exercise and physical activity seem to reduce women's chances of developing breast cancer, as well as other diseases, such as osteoporosis.

Guide for Preventing Breast Cancer

How to Prevent Breast Cancer, by Ross Pelton R.Ph., Ph.D., C.C.N., Taffy Clarke Pelton, M.A., Vinton C. Vint, M.D. (Fireside, \$13.00)

Much of the advice women hear about breast cancer is to check for lumps, get mammograms, and get physical exams. The emphasis is on what to do when you have already developed cancer, and not on what can be done to prevent it.

The authors of *How to Prevent Breast Cancer* have provided a guide for the woman who wants to know what she can do in her life to reduce the risk of ever getting this disease. They point out that the incidence of breast cancer in this country has been dramatically rising. If the incidence is rising, then something is causing the rise, and if something is causing the rise, then something can be done to prevent it.

The authors spend a lot of time discussing problems with the standard American diet. A major culprit is high fat intake, and fat encourages hormonal activity in the body, increasing the activity of estrogen, which makes the body friendlier to cancer cells. They recommend that women try to bring their fat intake down to 20 percent of calories.

Other dietary changes include increasing dietary fiber, eating more fruits and vegetables, using more soy bean products and cruciferous vegetables (i.e., cabbage family) because they are particularly beneficial, and avoiding red meat.

Other preventative activities are discussed and explained: exercise, stress management, nonsexual breast massage, nutritional supplements, breast-feeding and mind/body health. Other possible risks are also discussed, like pesticides, occupational hazards, electromagnetic fields, hormone replacement therapy, smoking and alcohol. Various procedures and treatments are also discussed at length.

How to Prevent Breast Cancer is an empowering, upbeat approach to a subject that terrifies most women. Whether or not lesbians are at higher risk of breast cancer, any woman—of any age—will benefit from the information contained in its pages.

Violence Survey

The League of Gay and Lesbian Voters is conducting a study of violence and discrimination and its impact on our lives here in Northwestern PA. Not counting previous statewide studies sponsored by the Philadelphia Lesbian and Gay Task Force (of which Erie was poorly represented), it is the first survey that focuses on the eight county region covered by the Erie Chapter.

The questionnaires for the study are divided into three parts—personal (anonymous) information, discrimination, and violence. The survey provides space for the participant to give details of any personal experience with violence relating to their sexual orientation.

League volunteers have been seeking participants since June. In July, surveys were sent to all of the area groups and organizations. Last month, the questionnaires were inserted in *EGCN*. In the coming weeks, we will focus on League members. Sexual minorities of any gender can participate, regardless of your experience with violence or discrimination—and we strongly urge you to do so.

This study is very important for our community. The League predicts it will show the overwhelming majority of individuals in our area have been the victim of violence. The completed study will be widely distributed to the media in our region, and the data will be presented to our elected officials to support our call for legislative protection. Regardless of the results, we feel any amount of violence and discrimination is unacceptable.

LGLV Mexican Dinner

The League will hold a Mexican Dinner at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Erie on Saturday, November 11th. This year's dinner will again feature live entertainment, at the low cost of \$5 for adults and \$4 for students. Details will be published in next month's EGCN. Proceeds benefit the League of Gay and Lesbian Voters and its projects.

Out-of-town bus trips

Our first bus trip on September 17th was an unexpected success; 20 people traveled with the League to view the movie *Jeffrey* playing at the Cedar Lee Theatre in Cleveland. We hope to make the trips a monthly, affordable event to promote community and allow individuals an opportunity to experience lesbigay life and culture in larger metro areas.

LGLV is planning another bus trip for October. Details have not yet been worked out, but the trip will be similar to our first—a movie, a bite to eat, and perhaps some shopping. Considering the nature of events and entertainment (the length of a movie's stay is determined by its popularity), it is difficult to provide information more than a few weeks in advance. The League will do its best to publish our trips in the pages of this newsletter when we have the itinerary set.

The trips are meant to be fund-raisers, with an eye toward low-cost entertainment. Pricing for the first trip was \$5 for adults, and \$1 for students. The price only included the actual trip, and each individual is responsible for any additional (movie, food and drinks, and shopping) costs. Our tickets to see "Jeffrey" were \$4 each with our group discount. Some college students actually spent less than \$10 for the entire trip, including a bite to eat

100%, for their unflinching dedication to Coalition-supported legislation.

The Coalition's 1995 "Congressional Scorecard" tracks the voting records of every legislator on issues "identified by the Christian Coalition as having an important impact on our families and our nation". Those issues mostly included "Contract with America" items in addition to legislation dealing with lesbigay equality (such as lifting the ban on lesbigays in the military), which the Coalition virulently opposes.

Neither English nor Santorum were in office for the gay-related votes. However, English accepted campaign contributions from both the Christian Coalition and the Eagle Forum, but denied knowledge of the contributions during his 1994 congressional run. English's campaign manager, Jerry Knight, waged an all-out media war in opposition to opponent Linda Bebko-Jones outspoken support for the Erie lesbigay community during his unsuccessful bid for 1st District Assembly.

Senator Santorum has cultivated support from the Christian Coalition and has spoken to the anti-gay rightwing Pennsylvania Family Institute as a guest of honor. While in Congress, Santorum opposed implementation of Washington, DC's domestic partners ordinance, voted to codify the ban against gays in the military, and voted to prohibit schools from having programs designed to help lesbigays.

Other ratings included Senators D'Amato (NY), 63%; Moynihan (NY), 0%; Glenn (OH), 14%; Dewine (OH), 66%; Specter (PA), 63%; and Representatives Latourette (OH-19), 82%; and Houghton (NY-31), 79%.

TV Station Apologizes for Remark

During WICU's 11:00 news on September 5, the movie *To Wong Foo* was reviewed. Renee Phillips, one of the anchors, remarked that the movie looked enjoyable. When she asked the other newscasters if they wouldn't enjoy it, Chris Knowles seemed uncomfortable, and muttered, "If I wanted to see freaks, I'd watch *Jerry Springer*."

Many LesBiGay and transgendered people who heard it were offended by the remark, and after the broadcast the station received a lot of calls protesting what Knowles had said.

I had not seen the broadcast, but received a call from an irate Harry Miller, who told me about it. I then registered my protest by faxing a letter to the station. I also sent it out over email where it was read by LesBiGay people across the country. Some of these people then sent faxes and phoned the station.

The next day, Assistant Station Manager Bill Knupp faxed a letter to myself and others. Knupp expressed regret that people were offended by the remark. He stated that the station "is committed to presenting the news in an accurate, ethical and unbiased manner," and that this was the first time such a complaint had been made about Knowles. Knupp said Knowles did not mean to offend anyone, and that he would speak to me about it in person or by telephone.

Mr. Knupp seemed sincere, but I was angry because Mr. Knowles had said he hadn't meant to demean anyone by referring to them as "freaks". I just didn't see how anyone could call people "freaks" and mean it in anything other than a negative way. This really made me feel like our community was due a public on-air apology. Sure, the people who wrote in were getting replies from the station, but what about others who had been offended by this? I faxed another letter to Mr. Knupp telling him how I felt about it.

At this point, the station was getting deluged with faxes and phone calls from across the country.

On the September 8 11 p.m. broadcast, Mr. Knupp made a sincere apology about Knowles' remark. It went as follows:

It happened Tuesday night in the closing minutes of our late evening news.

Anchor Chris Knowles in an extemporaneous ad-lib remark in reference to a preview of the movie *To Wong Foo, Thanks for Everything, Julie Newmar* used a word that was offensive to some viewers. Some of those offended have communicated their indignation by phone and by fax

WICU-TV's policy is to present the news in an accurate, ethical and unbiased manner, We have been doing that for more than 46 years. We agree that Mr. Knowles comment was inappropriate and insensitive, and we have discussed the matter with him. WICU-TV has expressed our regrets fir the comment through written communication with local representatives of the offended parties and Mr. Knowles has expressed a willingness to meet with these representatives.

In an effort to put an end to the issue, WICU-TV management now expresses that regret publicly, on the air, with the assurance that we will continue our effort to serve all the community with fairness and equity.

I spoke with Mr. Knupp about this afterward, and I have to say that one part of me feels bad for putting him through this, because he wasn't really the offending party, and he truly does seem committed to ethical and unbiased treatment of news (and people). At one point he implored me to put out an email message that the remark had been apologized for, because the faxes and such were getting unmanageable.

One of the topics I talked about with Mr. Knupp was that I felt that one shouldn't pitch a hissy fit lightly. I said that, for example, I preferred that gay people are referred to as gay and not as homosexual (which suggests a diagnosis for mentally-ill people), but I certainly don't think we should go jumping angrily all over anyone who uses the term homosexual. If you fly into a rage over every little thing, no one will take you seriously and you'll end up tiring yourself out. But it is worth standing up for justice and dignity.

And, I think I speak for most of us who registered protests, that we think the station has dealt with this matter in a very acceptable manner, and in writing this

The Latest from Letterman

The September 6 broadcast of The Late Show with David Letterman (CBS) featured yet another indication that the talk-show is veering toward a routine of defamation-as-comedy. For his regular -Top 10" lest, Letterman presented the "Top 10 Horrifying Secrets about professional baseball player Cal Ripken. The Number One Horrifying secret was: "Two Words—Switch Hitter." This moldy epithet for bisexual people contains no remnant of humor in 1995, particularly when presented as the MOST HORRIFYING SECRET a sports hero could ever keep.

In late July, Letterman's "Top 10" list delineated "ways to discourage your teen from smoking cigarettes." Reason Number Two: "Tell them they'll end up like that fruity ass bastard in the Montclair ad."

The Late Show production staff have acknowledged that they desperately need new concepts in order to compete with rival Jay Leno's Tonight Show (NBC), which recently beat out Letterman for an Emmy. Apparently, however, Late Show staffers have confused fresh material with stale homophobia.

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What's Your Excuse?

For almost 11 years, I had many excuses. I had children in grade school. How would they be treated? What would their friends think? Would they still have friends? What about school? Administrators? Teachers? Other students?

What about my wife, Jackie? Her co-workers? Employees? Friends?

Self doubt reared its ugly head. Was I up to the possible challenge? Would anybody listen? Would anybody care? Who was I anyway? No credentials. No letters after my name. Only a high school education. Why should/would anyone care?

But there it was, gnawing away at me. I was living a lie. I was hiding from life.

Slowly, I started testing the waters, letting the people who knew about my HIV status grow like the ripples of a stone dropped in a still pond.

Logically, I had reason to be concerned. Ryan White, the Ray family, countless men, women and children, unfairly and callously treated, threatened discriminated against, shunned.

But were these valid reasons, or just excuses? How often do we allow our lives to be run by the myriad of excuses that self-doubt raises? Lack of education, poverty, physical impairment or limitation. The ever popular "I was abused, neglected, unwanted, or unloved as a child." Although there may be some truth in any of these statements, which are valid reasons and which are excuses? Self-doubt, fear, will take any truth, no matter

how small, and blow it out of proportion until it becomes unmanageable.

At some point, we have to test the limits that we have permitted fear to place on us.

My good friend, John, has a simple two rule system that I've found helpful in making decisions in my life.

Rule #1: Just show up!

No matter what the limitation, obstacle, fear or challenge, being present is 90% of the battle. It may be cliche, but this is not a dress rehearsal. Being honest with yourself and separating "reasons" from "excuses" is a first step.

Rule #2: Try to have fun!



Glorianne, a gay rights leader on the local and state level, was the first female member of People of all Colors Together (PACT)—Youngstown. Susan is also an outspoken advocate of gay rights. The couple have been devoted friends for more than twelve years. We share their joy.

Lesbian and gay parents are shown on three shows this fall: *Courthouse* (Wed. 10:30 p.m. on CBS), *Party of Five* (Wed. 9 p.m.) and *Friends* (Thurs. 8 p.m. NBC).

Same-sex marriage okay with many French Canadians

A survey in Quebec showed 53 percent of respondents support same-sex marriage rights. In the Canadian House of Commons, gay House member Real Menard, backed by the opposition Bloc Quebecois proposed to establish these rights. The House rejected it by a vote of 124-52.

Briefs

New Zealand: A gay couple is fighting to be able to marry here, claiming their lack of marriage rights are a violation of the 1993 Human Rights Act and New Zealand's marriage act, which makes no reference to gender.

Canada: A Brazilian man can stay with his Canadian partner, because immigration officials here ruled that requiring the Brazilian to leave the country would cause "undo" hardship to the male couple.

Oklahoma: The Oklahoma Supreme Court has ruled that gay and lesbian parents should not be considered unfit because of their sexual orientation.

National/World News

Anti-Gay Actions in Education

Washington: A House subcommittee will conduct a hearing regarding how public schools will teach about homosexuality. The hearing is scheduled tentatively to begin October 13. Lou Sheldon, of the anti-gay Traditional Values Coalition, has claimed credit for initiating the hearings. Gay rights activists condemn the hearings as providing a platform for Sheldon's hate message.

Merrimack, N.H.: The school board here has voted 3-2 to bar teachers and guidance counselors from presenting homosexuality in any sort of positive light. More than 150 people held a candlelight vigil in protest outside the school board meeting on August 14.

Des Moines, lowa: An openly gay incumbent school director was defeated in his bid for re-election after national radical Right organizations targeted the race. In the record-breaking election, the two top vote-getters were candidates endorsed by the Christian Coalition.

Dole snubs gay Republicans

The campaign of Republican presidential candidate Bob Dole solicited and gladly accepted \$1,000 from the Log Cabin Club, a gay Republican organization. But when a columnist revealed the contribution, the Dole campaign returned the contribution, saying that Dole disagrees with the group's goals.

Attorney General Janet Reno meets with gay groups

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13—The U.S. Attorney General and Department of Justice officials met with representatives of organizations working for gay civil rights. The meeting was requested after Reno decided not to file an amicus ("friend of the court") brief in the U.S. Supreme case regarding Colorado's Amendment 2.

Pizza Hut: No more Limbaugh

After many, many people across the country complained about Pizza Hut using Rush Limbaugh in their ads, the ads were discontinued, and Rush was shown the door

Toronto school for g/l/b teens

Gay and lesbian teens who quit school because of homophobia now have a school for other kids like them. The Toronto school district started up their Triangle program this fall. It is the first such program in the country.

Lesbians at U.N. Conference on Women: win some, lose some

Lesbians from around the world made their presence known at the U.N. Conference on Women held in Beijing last month. The platform for action originally had language that affirmed the rights of women to express their sexuality regardless of sexual orientation, but that was struck down after several countries protested. However, for the first time, lesbians were discussed in a U.N. body, and many lesbian activists say this has offered them an unprecedented opportunity to bring lesbian issues into international debate.

Briefs

Romania: Anti-gay laws here have been eased, with gay sex being a crime only if it creates a "public scandal" or involves an underage person.

Austria: A leading Austrian gay activist has outed four bishops here, in an effort to push gay rights legislation.

Costa Rica: For the first time, the government has registered a gay organization.

Argentina: The conservative governor of Buenos Aires province condemned anti-gay discrimination, calling it "absurd" and "outdated."
