Additions to Time Capsule

In the December issue, which was included in the Bicentennial Time Capsule, I wrote a short history of the LesBiGay community in this area.

There were a number of landmarks that were left out of that history. These additions will also be included in the Bicentennial Time Capsule which will be buried in April (the Capsule's burial was originally scheduled for First Night Erie, but will bewas re-secheduled). Anyone using the first history article from the Bicentennial Time Capsule issue should include add these items.

There are certain terrible things which must be omitted from this article because we simply do not have enough information at this time. For example, a number of people in the Erie area have been killed because they were gay. Research still needs to be done in tallying those lost to homophobic violence. More countless more—have been attacked verbally or physically. Some, filled with a self-hatred instilled in them by a homophobic society, have taken their own lives.

Again I must point out that there are bound to be other omissions to this history, even with the additions I am including here. Also, again, I apologize in advance for anyone who belongs here but was left out. If you feel something should have been included but was not, send the information to EGCN. It will not arrive in time for the Time Capsule, but will be included in an addendum to institutions that will be receiving sets of EGCN for their collections.

Hopefully, others more knowledgeable about local history will improve upon these first attempts, and people will come forth and tell their stories and experiences. I would like to see people coming forward with their own memories of times past, to move beyond this simple outline and bring our histories (and "her" stories) to life.

1974—**Correction: Homophile League (Edinboro)** Ted Goodman and Harry Miller helped to get this organization started (the League would later become Edinboro Gay Organization, then Identity). In the history article that I wrote, Ted was mistakenly referred to as Ted Matthews.

circa 1985-86—Liza's Hideaway For a short time in the mid 1980's Meadville had a gay bar, located near Conneaut Lake Park.

1986—Gay Catholic Conference A conference of lesbian and gay Catholics, and Catholics who support their

inclusion in the Church, was held at Mount St. Benedict. Nationally-known speakers were in attendance.

1987—Leeward Lounge opens in Ashtabula A gay bar, and center of Ashtabula}s gay community, it is still in existence today.

1992 and **1994**—**Pioneers in HIV/AIDS Awareness in Erie County** At this writing, HIV and AIDS still carries with it a stigma, and for people in the Erie area who have the disease, it is still difficult for them to acknowledge their status. At this writing, only two people have acknowledged in the mass media that they have HIV. In 1992, **Walter Kramer** became the first person in Erie County to publicly state that he had HIV. **DonPaul Lucas**, who was infected with the virus by blood products he uses because he has hemophilia, announced on television on World AIDS Day 1994 that he had HIV. He has stayed in Erie and become a tireless HIV/AIDS educator and the first openly HIV-positive "AIDS activist" in this community.

1993

May—Erie Gay Community Newsletter: Lambda Foundation grant In the description of the early days of this publication, omitted was the fact that EGCN received a \$1,500 grant from the Pittsburgh-based Lambda Foundation, which helped the new publication get off the ground.

October—First to come out publicly on "Coming Out Day" Because most lesbigay people are still "in the closet" at this point in time, a yearly event called Coming Out Day (October 11) calls for lesbians, bisexuals, and gays to come out about who they are. In October of 1993, two lesbians, Dee Dee Foll and Kim Manno, bravely appeared on WLKK-radio to come out.

1994

January—Three area college groups meet Perhaps for the first time ever, three LesBiGay college groups meet to discuss networking. They are Allegheny's Committee in Support of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual People, Penn State Behrend's Trigon, and the Edinboro Gay Organization. February—Nick Krayger becomes first out gay student at Mercyhurst Krayger came out in an article in the school paper.

February—Allegheny College observes Stonewall 25 In observance of the 25th anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion, Allegheny College's Committee in Support of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual People brought in historian Martin Duberman, nationally-known gay singing group the Flirtations, plus workshops, videos, lectures, and a production of Cabaret. Also during this time, work was being done to establish a gay and lesbian studies program at Allegheny—making that school one of the few in the country to to so.

April—Edinboro Gay Organization celebrates Stonewall 25 EGO sponsored an art exhibit to celebrate Stonewall 25.

June—First publicly-announced same-sex wedding Micheal Miller and Michael Mahler were married (they also use the term "handfasted", the Pagan term) on June 18 in a ceremony at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Erie.

Summer—Gay-friendly store in Chautauqua Co. Pathways, located in Fredonia NY, was probably the first bookstore in Chautauqua Co. to carry a gay and lesbian books section.

September—Clarification: First same-sex 2nd partner adoption This appeared in the original article I wrote. However, it seems to indicate that this was the first such adoption in Erie County. In fact, it was probably the first in western Pennsylvania, and was certainly one of the first in the state. **October—Cocoon Opens** October. First store in Erie to carry a sizable amount of merchandise geared to LesBiGay customers. (Rainbow flags, jewelry, buttons, etc.)

October—Gay Psychiatrist comes out in Jamestown On Coming Out Day, Dr. Chris Kaczmarek came out in a guest editorial in the Jamestown *Post Journal*. The editorial discussed the importance of coming out.

November—Jamestown activist receives social justice award Gregory P. Rabb was awarded the T. Richard Parker Award of Social Justice by the First Unitarian Society of Jamestown, for his work in protecting the civil rights and psychological well-being of gays and lesbians.

1995


Spring—Franklin Pa. transsexual runs for office Kristine Holt, a transsexual who had been fighting for the job she said she lost because of a gender change, ran for Venango Co. Commissioner. Although she lost the election (she was about in the middle of the field in terms of votes), but she won national attention.

Fall—Informal LesBiGay Group at Gannon University A group that was not officially recognized by the University began meeting to address the needs of students there. There was some criticism, particularly from some of the priests on the faculty.

November—Hate crimes article appears in *Erie Sunday Times* In a feature on hate crimes, a separate article dealt with. Greg Valiga, head of LGLV-Erie was interviewed. The article was pretty sensitive.

1996

January—Start of Erie area chapter of Gay and Lesbian Parents Coalition International There was a call put out for people to organize this parents support group, which at this writing seems to be generating a lot of interest.

Lesbian "Herstory" at Allegheny

"Reclaiming Lesbian Herstory—The Lesbian Herstory Archives: its vision, its resources, its 20 year herstory," a slide show and lecture, will be presented by Joan Nestle, Archive cofounder and coordinator, at Allegheny College Ford Chapel, 8:00 pm on April 29.

The Lesbian Herstory Archives was founded in 1973 "to gather and preserve records of Lesbian lives and activities so that future generations will have ready access to materials relevant to their lives (Feminist Review 34, Spring 1990)." The slide show has been developed as a tool for bringing the texts of the archives to the public. Images of the great diversity of identities—from lipstick and butch lesbians to separatists and Goddessworshippers—give representation to and engage the entire lesbian community.

In addition to cofounding the Lesbian Herstory Archive, Joan Nestle is a well-established scholar and author, with special emphasis on works of interest to lesbians. Joan Nestle has won such prestigious awards as the 1994 Sappho Award of Literary Distinction, presented by Astraea, National Lesbian Action Foundation. Her books include Sister and Brother: Lesbians and Gay Men Write About Their Lives Together, 1994 Lambda Book Award winner for Best Non-Fiction Anthology, and Worlds Unspoken: A Collection of International Lesbian Short Fiction. Joan Nestle teaches at Queens College, CUNY.

Prior to Nestle's lecture, Manuela Soares and Sara Yager will speak about their work on the Daughters of Bilitis documentary video project at 4:30 pm in Doane Hall Room 104 at the Campus Center. The Daughters of Bilitis, founded in San Francisco, is the oldest Lesbian group in the United States. Soares and Yager will show clips from their soon-to-be-released video and speak about "The Ladder," the group's magazine no longer in existence. Soares will also speak about her newly released book of photographic images documenting butch-femme images in Lesbian culture. Both events are free and open to the public.

Sexual assertiveness training promotes safer sex

A study conducted by a University of Alabama behaviorist finds that African-American women who took sexual assertiveness classes were twice as likely to use condoms consistently as those who had taken a twohour AIDS information course. The classes taught women how to put a condom on their partner, to express their desires more firmly, and to cope with sexual situations in which one or both partners have been drinking.

Just some thoughts

This month I'd like to address a few topics that have been concerning me.

First off, a commercial message for the HIV support group, which is held the second and fourth Tuesday of each month. This is a meeting I try to attend as often as possible. (Because of my educational schedule, I can't always make it). Cheryl Weber and/or Father Mike McGraw make the evenings lively and informational. The support group has taken on a new face recently, so to speak. There are now scheduled topics each meeting. Recent discussions have focused on families, spirituality and a local dermatologist. Future topics are printed under the Calendar section of the EGCN. We're an informal group, so open discussion is always encouraged. Don't be dissuaded from coming just because of a week's topic. And there is ample time before and after the meeting to network or to get any questions answered. For more information, call Cheryl Weber at 825-1085. New people are always welcome.

I was very concerned by the information released by the President's Commission on AIDS a few weeks ago. 80,000 new HIV infections a year predicted, one-half under the age of 25, one-fourth under the age of 19. 40,000 new infections a year in people under the age of 25. And school districts are afraid to let anybody talk to their preteens about HIV/AIDS. When are people going to wake up?

A second protease inhibitor was approved by the FDA on March 1, 1996. The newest studies indicate that the triple drug combination (AZT, 3TC, and one of the protease inhibitors) is very effective at controlling HIV disease. A third protease inhibitor is expected to be approved in the next few weeks. Many doctors now feel that HIV disease may become a chronic but manageable condition. Some good news for a change.

As was mentioned last month the entire Names Project AIDS Memorial Quilt will be displayed in Wash-

What makes a family?

I work at a local nursing home, and for a year or so my aunt was a resident there. Most of my co-workers knew this, although some were unsure.

One night, my aunt's granddaughter (my cousin's daughter) came in to visit. After passing a few pleasantries with me at the desk, she went back to see my aunt.

"That's your cousin, right?" a co-worker asked.

"That's right," I affirmed. She nodded. "Nice girl. I knew she was your cousin."

"Oh?"

"Yep. I could tell. It's in the eyes. She looks just like you around the eyes."

"The eyes," I smiled.

"The eyes," my co-worker stressed, then returned to her duties.

I was reminded of this incident while reading the Advocate recently. The article discusses the nation's "10 Worst Congressman." Two of the congressmen profiled make remarks about families. One refutes domestic partnerships with the idea that it is "not the definition of family" that he grew up with. The other wants only to "honor traditional families."

But what, after all, is a family? My cousin and I may resemble each other about the eyes, but we are not connected in any biological way. Her mother, my aunt's daughter, and my first cousin, was adopted over 40 years ago. We share no genetic history, just family history.

We share traditions, such as the big family picnic in July at my uncle's house. We share memories, such as

visits to Florida, past holidays, and family tragedies. We share my aunt.

I think the one thing the congressmen (and others) forget is that family is not made of genetics, it is made of love. If the person I love is of the same sex, so what? Through the years, we will share traditions, build new ones, and (if we choose) raise a child. That sounds like the definition of any family I know of.

People don't become "family" because of any convention of society. Instead, they become family because they choose to love another person unselfishly, making that person's happiness a primary goal in life.

My eyes are blue. My cousin's daughter has hazel eyes. But we've seen the summer heat shimmer off the water at my uncle's picnic. We've laughed with delight at my aunt's jokes. We've smiled in joy watching the youngest members of the family as they've taken their first steps. Our eyes have shared a lot. Take a close look at the person you love most—I'll bet you see a resemblance around the eyes, too.

Same-sex marriage update

The Hawaiian State Senate passed the nation's first domestic partner bill that would cover same-sex couples. Commentators noted that the action, was taken because of legislators' nervousness over a court ruling that could legalize same-sex marriage in Hawaii.

The Hawaiian Supreme Court will rule on a case involving three gay couples who wish to be legally married. If the Court rules in their favor, it would set a precedent, and other states might have to recognize those marriages.

Reacting to concerns over same-sex marriage, almost half of all states are considering or have passed legislation banning same-sex marriages. Utah and South Dakota have already passed such laws, but they were defeated in Alaska and Virginia. No such legislation has come up in the state legislatures of Pennsylvania, New York or Ohio.

Study: Sibling order may determine sexual orientation

A recent study indicates that the more older brothers a male has, the more likely he is to be gay. The study was published in the January issue of the American Journal of Psychiatry.

PFLAG News

The national office of Parents, Families & Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) has warned Pat Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network to stop trying to prevent PFLAG's ads off the air. The ads make the connection between anti-gay violence and Robertson's anti-gay message. PFLAG alleges that Robertson and CBN have applied enormous pressure on broadcasters that might air the ads. PFLAG has hired a legal firm to see their threat through.

PFLAG is also testifying before congress about the Employment Non-Discrimination Act.



Sharon Bottoms denied custody again

Once again, lesbian mother Sharon Bottoms has been denied custody of her son, Tyler. Two years ago, Bottoms lost custody of her son because Judge William G. Boice considered her "lesbian lifestyle" rendered her an unfit mother. Bottoms lost a series of appeals, and then ended up in front of Boice again, who again denied her custody. Boice was particularly critical of the fact that Bottoms and her partner April Wade had been involved in the making of an ABC made-for-TV movie about the case, called *For the Love of Tyler*.

Tyler, now four years old will remain with Bottoms mother Kay Bottoms, who sued Sharon for custody of the boy.

Judge Boice's decision contradicts the advice of Torrence Harman, the guardian appointed to monitor Tyler. Harman said she felt that Kay Bottoms was doing a poor job of raising the boy, and told Boice, "This child



is not doing well...Unless there is some radical change, my gut feeling says the child is going to be an abusive young boy."

Earth Day Notes

If you want to support an environmental organization that supports gay rights, note that the Sierra Club last year gave domestic partners benefits to same-sex partners of employees.

Judge: Killer dad gets custody, not lesbian mom

PENSACOLA, Fla., January 31—Circuit Court Joseph Tarbuck, a Florida judge has ruled that an 11year-old girl would be better off with her killer father than her lesbian mom. In discussing his decision, Tarbuck did not mention the fact that the father, John Ward, is a convicted murderer who served eight years in prison for killing his first wife. He did cite the fact that Mary Ward lives with her partner, and that "R" rated movies are watched in the household. The decision will be appealed and, Ward's 24-year-old daughter plans to testify that he tried to sexually molest her when she was 14 years old.

Does the gay marriage issue matter to Republican voters?

The issue of same-sex marriage has been thrown around during this campaign year, especially in the Republican primaries. But does a candidates stand on that issue affect how people will vote? According to a Human Rights Campaign survey of New Hampshire Republicans, only a minority would support a candidate who came out against same-sex marriage. Here's how the numbers broke down.


49% The issue of legal makes no difference.

32% Somewhat or much less supportive of a candidate who signed a pledge opposing "gay marriage."

18% Much more supportive of a candidate who signed a pledge opposing "gay marriage."

62% Strongly disapprove or feel it is wrong to use gay to score political points.

20% Were glad the politicians were raising the antimarriage issue.


The **Kids in the Hall**'s new movie **Brain Candy**, will be in theatres April 12.

Birdcage began its first week of release at #1 on the movie charts, and continued that in its second week (the only weeks we have info for). Although **Nathan Lane** (who

played the flamboyant Albert in the movie) dodged the question of his own sexual orientation in an interview with *The Advocate*, in an article in the March 25 *Newsweek*, reviewer Jack Krul basically outed him. In explaining why Lane would have such a feel for the role of Albert, Krul wrote, "As a gay man he would know."

The Movie Stop reports "lots of 'Girlfriend' movies this month": *Moonlight and Valentino* ("a bittersweet talkfest"), *Now and Then*(4/16), and *Waiting to Exhale* (4/23). Some other recent acquisitions: *Belle du Jour* (re-release of the sensuous Catherine Deneuve film), *Unzipped* (humorous documentary about gay fashion designer Isaac Mizrahi), *Just Like a Woman* (straight drag comedy), *Goodnight Sweet Marilyn* (about Marilyn Monroe's death), *Safe* and *Prelude to a Kiss* (both have been called an AIDS allegories), and *Rocky Horror Picture Show* (uhhh, defies short descriptions).

He turned to his sister and told her she was the only one he wanted as coach. Still struggling (he didn't have the

Rights & wrongs... Homophobes are especially fond the claiming "gays want SPECIAL rights." Because homosexuals suffer from no extraordinary discrimination, they argue, we deserve no "extraordinary protections." Unfortunately, this argument has been repeated regularly — often without serious challenge — in the mainstream press.

Yet, the anti-gay legislative efforts orchestrated by various Religious Right cabals clearly reveal the truth behind this lie. Across the country, professional homophobes are seeking the SPECIAL RIGHT TO DIS-CRIMINATE against lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender citizens; at the local, state and federal levels, antigay legislation hopes to secure and advance THE EX-TRAORDINARY PROTECTIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF HETEROSEXUALITY.

People For The American Way (PFAW) recently issued a "State and Local Anti-Gay Initiatives & Legislation Report" (February 1996).
