

HIV CLINICAL TRIAL

Volunteers living with HIV are needed to help evaluate a new investigational medication developed for those with HIV infection. The new medication, 141W94 (a protease inhibitor), will be evaluated alone and in two- and three-drug combinations with AZT (also known as zidovudine and Retrovir®) and 3TC (also known as lamivudine and Epivir®).

Travel Book Reviews

Hot! International/Gay: Love & Sex in 7 Languages, (Babelcom, \$12.50)

This book is a handy guide to words and phrases in six different languages (English, German, Spanish, French, Portuguese, Italian, and Czech) for a variety of situations. The format is really well thought-out: you can find the phrase and pronunciation for all 6 languages if you know any one, so this is really usable by non-English speakers as well.

It covers topics such as negotiating safer sex (a must no matter who or where you are!), dating, sex, compliments, problems, making up, health, emergencies and many others. The book deals with a wide variety of situations.

This is going to sound odd, but not only is the book well-done and useful, but it is also amusing. There's something just funny about seeing phrases as "Please remove the handcuffs" (which would be good to know before you have to use it!) in six languages. I don't think I have ever found a reference book so funny! So, even if you don't quite have the money for that trip to Europe yet, the book is still a fun read.

Oh yeah, they published Hot! Spanish for guys and guys last year and they plan on publishing Hot! International/Lesbian this spring.

If you like to travel at all, the *Women's Traveller* 1996, a paperback guide by Damron, should be your first stop! It's available where lesbian and gay books are sold, and well worth the retail price of \$ 11.95.

Here's a really quick peek at it:

The cover this year looks like a paisley suitcase—very suitable for leaving "out" on the bookcase. First you'll find some sharp ads for clubs, cruises, calendars, magazines, events, the AIDS Memorial Quilt (in Washington, Oct. 11-13), "fun maps," Damron atlases & mail order. Then a brief description of how the guide works, and a request for you to submit a brief 'bio' of your local lesbian scene —to be included in the next edition. A short, fun letter from the editor and then a "National Resource" address/phone list. Next is an explanation of the guide codes and an accurate Table of Contents.

The bulk of the guide is an alphabetic by State listing (broken down by city/county) of: Information lines & services, accommodations, bars, bookstores & retail shops, travel & tour operators, spiritual groups, publications (like EGCN !!!), erotica, gay AA meetings, restaurants & cafes, gyms & health clubs.... it's GREAT!! Even though it's geared mainly to lesbians, there is a ton of valuable & helpful information for any traveler, gay or otherwise! There are biographies for the big cities—weather, events, attractions, transportation, even a "where the girls are" section! These are written by ladies that live there—so it's very accurate.

An "International" section has listings for Canada, the Caribbean, & Mexico. Then more information about the Damron company, next is a "Travel & Tours" section with camping & RV info, Tours & operators, monthly listings for events & festivals. Last, but surely not least, is a "Mail Order" section.

Interspersed are tasteful, very informative ads from listees. The overall quality of the printing and typesetting, etc. is fantastic—lots of information in a small, handy book—but really easy to use and read. All the listings and the ads have addresses, phone numbers, email addresses, etc—just a wealth of fantastic stuff for ladies looking for leisure. I'd love to tell you more, but I gotta go PACK!!! C'mon along!

HIV CLINICAL TRIAL

Volunteers living with HIV are needed to help evaluate the safety, tolerance, and antiviral activity of a new investigational medication for HIV infection. The new medication, *Fozivudine tidoxil*, is being developed as a potential substitute for AZT (also known as zidovudine or Retrovir[®]) in the therapy of individuals infected with HIV. The student ruled out taking a girl, because everyone would know it's a sham. Mr. Delaney told him he could go with friends, and suggested the possibility that another young man might ask him. When the student groaned that being different in high school was rough, Mr. Delaney told him college is great, and that's why he should get to his studies.

School sued for not stopping harassment

A gay Wisconsin man is suing his school for their refusal to stop anti-gay violence against him. Between the 7th-11th grades, Jamie Nabozny was repeatedly attacked by students, with some violence requiring hospitalization. Nabozny's parents repeatedly tried to

And another lawsuit...

Illinois—A second gay student has joined a \$1 million lawsuit that accuses Riverside-Brookfield High School officials and other students of anti-gay name-calling, physical abuse and threats. The suit was filed last year by a student known as "Mario Doe."

Mario Doe alleges that when he informed a school counselor that he was being harassed, the counselor cold him to "learn karate for self-defense." He also claims that students pinched him, grabbed his genitals and threatened him. Mario Doe dropped out of school and filed a lawsuit in Cook County Circuit Court.

The second student, known as John Doe," claims that the same school counselor told his father John Doe was Gay, despite the fact that John Doe wanted that information kept confidential. He dropped out of whool this year.

League purchases Billboard

A highly visible public service campaign appears to be successfully encouraging lesbigays and others to vote and take note of the League of Gay and Lesbian Voters.

The billboards consist of the slogan "If your vote doesn't count, whose does?" in a red field, with the LGLV logo and the words "League of Gay and Lesbian Voters" beneath. The message subtly urges voters to visit the polls during the April 23 primary election.

According to Kim Bukowski, General Manager of Penn Advertising's Erie Division, the graphics for the posters were designed by Penn Advertising Art Director Paul Glenn, based in Buffalo, NY. The Erie Division of Penn Advertising covers billboards in Erie, Crawford, and Venango Counties.

Winning Bukowski's approval of the project was apparently easy. She sees public service announcements as being important to the general community.

"This really isn't a gay message. Any group has a right to put up a message to the community, as long as that message is not offensive," states Bukowski.

The League purchased the billboards through the Penn Advertising public service program, which offers the advertising at reduced rates. The messages were posted "wherever, whenever" on a space available basis, providing complete market coverage aimed at all age groups and income levels.

The initial billboard appeared on Route 20 in Fairview Township on Thursday, April 11. Subsequent billboards have been posted within the City of Erie: 12th & Liberty Sts., 12th & Camphausen Streets, and 20th & Parade Streets, for a total of four.

The League was prompted to proceed after it was learned that Bukowski was supportive of the plan. The project quickly received approval at the state level by Chris Young, LGLV Chair, and the Erie Chapter was later provided the funding.

League members discussed a possible backlash from right wing conservatives at the regular monthly meeting in April and prepared to defend the project to the Erie media. That opposition, however, failed to materialize according to Bukowski.

The League of Gay and Lesbian Voters is a non-partisan political organization dedicated to achieving equal rights for lesbigays by lobbying, educating and registering voters, and organizing at the grassroots level. In addition to the billboards, the Erie Chapter has distributed nearly 1,000 Voters' Guides for the primary election.

Unprotected oral sex is lower risk, says medical group

It's been a controversial subject for years. And now the Gay and Lesbian Medical Association, in a statement issued March 19, says that male-male oral sex should be considered a low-risk sexual activity.

The international 1,800-member organization, whose members are physicians and medical students, says that while there have been cases of transmission during oral sex, there are only a few. They call for an emphasis on unprotected anal intercourse.

"Prevention education must consistently acknowledge the essential importance of sexual intimacy for gay men," says GLMA Policy Committee Chair Alvin Novick, M.D.. "Rather than attempting to impose an unrealistic zero-risk standard on all people, our prevention efforts should focus on reducing risk overall by helping each individual learn how to maximize fulfillment and minimize risk...Pushing condom usage for oral sex may actually be counterproductive in some cases. It may make some people feel that they have so few options that they don't want to use condoms, period."

The GLMA statement does not mean they are opposed to the use of condoms for male-male oral sex. The statement points out that oral sex without ejaculation and using condoms during oral sex does reduce risk of HIV transmission. It also encourages safer sex programs to try projects that eroticize oral sex with condoms, and it calls for more research on the risks of oral sex.

A number of HIV/AIDS educators and agencies have expressed concern over the GLMA statement.



Elders visit; AIDS invisibility

Former Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders spoke at Edinboro University on April 3, 1996. She proved to be as outspoken as ever.

Dr. Elders was asked to resign her position after a remark made about masturbation being a part of normal human sexuality. Conservatives accused her of wanting to teach masturbation as a part of health education in schools.

"Well, anybody with any sense would know that nobody needs to teach anybody how to masturbate," she said

She also pointed out the need for health education. Stating that 45% of sixth graders think there is more fat in watermelon than in cheese, Elders said, "Not sex education, health education."

Giving the figure of 1 out of every 33 high school students in Washington DC as already being HIV positive, she called for the need to be open and honest with our young people. "People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care!"

"I feel that the women of America should stand up for their reproduction rights," she contended. "We need to make sure every child born in the United States is a wanted child."

"If we would stop trying to legislate morals and start trying to prevent unwanted, unplanned pregnancies, we would be a lot further down the road. Abortion is an issue between a woman her doctor and her God."

I wonder

It seemed like good news. Four of the blood companies were offering a \$600,000 settlement to the hemophilia community who were infected through the use of clotting factor during the early 1980's. *USA Today* reported that this was the largest product liability in U.S. history.

I excitedly watched the evening news to get more information. One hour of WSEE-TV news...nothing. One half hour of CBS Evening News...nothing. Most of both newscasts dealt with the Oklahoma City bombing anniversary.

I was as moved as anybody by the photographs that came out of Oklahoma one year ago. I cried when I saw the front page picture of the fireman carrying the baby. My heart went our to the families of the 168 people who were brutally murdered. But I wondered, what about the families of the 242 hemophiliacs who have died of AIDS since January 1 of this year? Combine that with the 3,000 plus who have died previously and I wonder, where are the stories, where is the sorrow, where is the outrage?

Then I started thinking... What about all those who died of AIDS? Nationwide, 43,000 people died of AIDS in 1994. USA Today had a story on automobile fatalities over the last five years. During 1994, 40,000 people died in auto accidents. Almost daily reports about fatal car crashes, yet those who die of AIDS go unnoticed. Except by their families and friends.

I wonder, has the discrimination, fear and hatred of the early days of this epidemic turned into a more subtle form of discrimination—apathy? Has the HIV/AIDS community become non-persons, non-entities, therefore nonexistent? Has our desire for confidentiality to insure non-discrimination relegated us to a position of non-being? How many Pedro Zamoras, Ryan Whites, and Elizabeth Glasers have to die to make people realize this is really happening? How many Greg Louganis' Mary Fishers, Magic Johnsons do we need to speak out to make people realize there are so many living with HIV infection.

Since 1981, over 330,000 people have died, five times the number of Americans killed in the Vietnam conflict. The challenge is: How do we get people to understand the reality of HIV? Until next time.

No Olympics in homophobic Cobb Co.

WASHINGTON, April 19—Cobb County, Georgia made news in 1993 when it passed an anti-gay resolution. When preliminary volleyball games were scheduled for Cobb County, a group of gay activists (Olympics Out of Cobb County) and the NGLTF, pressured the Olympic committee to move the events, which it did. When it was announced that the Torch Relay would run through the country, pressure was again brought to bear and the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games re-routed the relay, citing the county's anti-gay resolution.

Conservative Christian politician caught with prostitute

Florida state Rep. Marvin Couch (R-Oveido), was charged with having sex with a prostitute. Couch, a supporter of the religious right who received a perfect rating from the state's Christian Coalition, paid \$22 for the prostitute to perform oral sex on him. He has stated he will not seek reelection.

Netherlands offers international gay support

The government of the Netherlands will fund gay civil rights organizations in developing nations. In announcing their plans, the government said that gay and lesbian rights are human rights.

Obituary

Perry Watkins, first openly-gay person man to challenge the military ban on gays, died March 17 of AIDS complications. He was 48. After serving with distinction in the Army for 16 years, he was not allowed to reenlist in 1984. A court ruling in 1989 allowed him to reenlist, but he decided not to go back, instead accepting a settlement, with honorable discharge, and retroactive promotion. Watkins' case was written about in Randy Shilts' Conduct Unbecoming: Gays and Lesbians in the U.S. Military.
