



Each day's segment dealt with a different aspect: the young male prostitutes, the men who use the services of male prostitutes, and programs designed to help boys who want to get off the streets.

Speaker reveals Christian Coalition deceit

Speaking before a group of about 100 concerned citizens, Paula Xanthopoulou shed light on the tactics and agenda of the national right-wing organization that calls itself the Christian Coalition.

Xanthopoulou is the founder, editor and publisher of the Miami-based electronic news service called "c.c. watch". The national service tracks and reports Christian Coalition activity via e-mail subscriptions.

The talk was held May 19 at Temple Anshe Hesed in Erie and was sponsored by numerous organizations and individuals, including the League of Gay and Lesbian Voters.

Xanthopoulou provided her views that the organization, whose members have control of the Republican Party in 18 states, has never been granted tax-exempt status; is under the control of Pat Robertson and not Ralph Reed; is guided by partisan politics as opposed to a religious agenda; is not held accountable for its comments to the media; and is not nearly as large at it has led the nation to believe.

Prior to the actual talk, LGLV-Erie members had the chance to meet with Xanthopoulou and discuss the state of the Keystone Christian Coalition. The Keystone Christian Coalition (KC) was formed after the former

Executive PA CC Director and President, Richard Schenker, decided to break away from the national organization because of the limits placed on supporting political candidates. The KC is currently reorganizing locally and at the state level, and seems to be in shambles.

The League learned that Pennsylvania members are advised to directly influence County Republican parties and "never mention the name Christian Coalition in Republican circles". Committee people are taught such tactics as scanning neighborhood driveways for "profamily" bumper stickers to find like minded individuals in their voting precincts. In Erie, a "Family Forum Roundtable" is held monthly at Metro Health Center. These meetings seem to be a cover for the CC; the real discussion begins an hour before the roundtable, and a secret satellite transmission from the national organization is beamed directly following the roundtable.

After the meeting, Xanthopoulou was approached by Schenker, County Council member Bob Okicki (whose election-winning campaign was headed by Schenker), and Keystone Coalition member Sam Zeisloft, all of whom attended the speech. No confrontation occurred.

Little legitimate media coverage was provided about the event, which marked the Citizens Interfaith Council for Democracy's first year in existence. A radio show on WFLP-AM, a bottom-dweller in the local ratings, aired distorted views on the talk and vilified the sponsors as "anti-Christian" and "anti-Catholic".

The Hate Crimes Bill, SB701, unanimously passed the PS Senate Judiciary Committee on April 30, 1996. The League has been actively lobbying for this bill and wishes to thank Senator Andrezeski for his vote. If passed into law, this bill will provide greater penalties for crimes that are motivated by a victim's sexual orientation.

One of the League's public service billboards was vandalized sometime during the night of April 25. The location of the damaged billboard is Rt 20 in Fairview. "Abomination of God" was scrawled across the face of the billboard in black paint. The damage was repaired in about a week's time. Fortunately this was the only negative response to the league's bold advertisements. We feel that the backlash shows a growing acceptance of our community by the community of Erie.

The League of Gay and Lesbian Voters was very pleased to co-sponsor a speech by Paula Xanthopolou at Temple Anshe Hesed, On May 19. Xanthopolou is the director of C. C. Watch, an electronic news service that monitors the activities of Pat Robertson and his Christian Coalition. For more information about C. C. Watch, call (305) 751-5991. The League urges everyone to inform themselves about the dangers of the Christian Coalition.



FDA refused to approve anal condom

The Food and Drug Administration refused to approve an anal condom, says Gabriel Rotello in the April 16 issue of *The Advocate*. Rotello writes that the so-called "female condom" could have been adapted and marketed to gay men for anal sex. But when the company that produces the female condom went to the FDA for approval of an anal condom, the FDA adamantly refused. According to the company, the FDA told them that because sodomy was illegal in almost half the states, the government couldn't approve a device that was designed to be used for an illegal act.

The female condom, which is inserted into the vagina, has a lot to recommend it. It is made of polyure-thane rather than latex, so it can be used with oil-based lubricants, is thinner, more sensitive, and doesn't interfere with the sensation of the penis. Most importantly, it allows the receptive partner to have control over whether or not protection will be worn.

The female condom was tested on gay men for anal sex in 1991, with good results. None of the condoms broke or dislodged. Although half of the men using the female condom did report some discomfort, the people conducting the test believed the female condom's design could be easily adapted to anal sex.

Until the FDA wises up, men can get the female condom (in pharmacies, usually stocked near condoms or with birth control items).

Condoms and the Church

The Bishops Conference of the French Catholic Church have gone against Vatican doctrine and encouraged the use of condoms for protection against HIV. They stated "Many competent doctors state that a viable condom is today the sole means of [HIV] prevention. In this respect, it is necessary. The condom is...understandable for cases in which a person who already engages in sexual activity needs to avoid a serious risk."

In the meantime, Father Tom Connolly, director of the Scottish Catholic Media Office, told Scots Gay magazine, "You are not meant to use condoms at all, at all, at all. Even if in marriage one partner has HIV, the use of a condom is still wrong."

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

Setting an example

Over Christmas, two co-workers of mine fell in love and have since moved in together. One of them, Bob (not his real name), has worked at this place for several years and is well-known and well-liked. The other, Tom (also not a real name), has only worked there for a few months and is a bit more unknown. After she heard they moved in together, a co-worker confessed to me, "I don't know what to do. What should I say to Bob?" "Congratulations," I suggested. To my surprise, Bob told me that she took him aside and said exactly that.

Remember when you were a kid and you'd do something you weren't supposed to do, like give the leftover pizza to the dog, or say a "bad" word? Of course, your Mom or Dad would correct you. "But Dad," you'd protest, "You do it." And sagely, he'd reply, "Do as I say, not as I do." Chastised, you'd stalk off to your room muttering about the unfairness of it all.

Despite your parents' best intentions with the "Do as I say" instructions, you know, as children, we more often "Do as we see." The same is true even as we age. At 10, me may call the school outcast cruel names just

because "everyone else" does. Or, if we have a good example in a teacher or classmate, we may treat him kindly.

Often others look to us for cues on how to behave

Often, others look to us for cues on how to behave and respond—our children, our peers, our co-workers. If we criticize, condemn, or ridicule, the others will too.

On the other hand, if we accept, tolerate, and offer compassion, then others, seeing our example, may be inspired to do the same. What America really needs are strong political leaders to encourage equal rights and tolerance for all people. But, for now, you may have to be that leader—at work, in school, in the community. You don't even have to be "out" to show compassion. I never told the woman who asked what to say to Bob that I was gay. Instead I offered her a simple answer to a simple question—how do I treat someone I don't understand? With respect—the same way you want to be treated.

We may not be able to change the world, but we can change misconceptions, and help to end intolerance. If someone is out where you work, treat him/her with respect—encourage him/her to talk about his/her partner. When others see it's no big deal, they may be more accepting, more tolerant. And it will have been by your example.

Supreme Court strikes down Colorado Amendment 2; historic victory

WASHINGTON, May 20—In a decision that has been called "historic" and "a striking victory for gay rights advocates," the United States Supreme Court decided 6-3 to strike down Colorado's anti-gay law, called Amendment 2,

Amendment 2 was a state constitutional amendment that banned communities from giving civil rights to gay and lesbian people. Colorado was then sued by a group of individuals and three cities with gay rights protection laws (Denver, Aspen, and Boulder), claiming the amendment violated the constitutional rights of gays.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force said, "The Supreme Court decision...on Colorado's Amendment 2 is a profound victory for all who believe in basic equal rights and the fundamental principle that all Americans deserve to live free from discrimination. It [Amendment 2] would have created special barriers to basic equal rights. It would have blocked the open and free participation in our democratic process for gays, lesbians and bisexuals."

Elizabeth Birch, director of the Human Rights Campaign, said, "The highest court in the land has said that no state can make its gay and lesbian citizens unequal to everyone else 'or a stranger to its laws.' This is all we have ever asked for."

Amendment 2 is the only state anti-gay ballot measure that has ever been passed by voters. In 1994, voters in Idaho and Oregon defeated anti-gay initiatives in the midst of the Republican sweep. And last year, voters in Maine rejected a similar effort.

Obituary

Michael Hardwick, who was a plaintiff in the U.S. Supreme Court landmark anti-gay case known as *Bowers vs. Hardwick*. Hardwick's death from AIDS complications was only recently discovered; he had in fact died June 13, 1991. He was 37. Hardwick had been arrested and convicted under Georgia's anti-sodomy law, and took his case to the U.S. Supreme Court in 1986. In strongly homophobic language, the Court upheld the law, stating that there is no constitutional right for adults of the same gender to have consensual sex.

However, it is evident that as a community, we need to respect and accept ourselves, all aspects of ourselves, before we expect anyone else to respect us."

DROPPING OUT?

Dispatches, a publication of the Western Journalism Center, has reported that the National Education Association intends to drop a resolution supporting the concept of observing "Lesbian and Gay History Month" in public schools. The NEA adopted the statement (Resolution B-9) last July.

The March 13 Dispatches cites a source on the NEA's Resolutions Committee, who claims the teacher's union is bowing to pressure from Right Wing advocacy groups. According to Dispatches, state and local NEA affiliates have been "inundated" with protest letters.

Anti-intellectual and pro-censorship capitulation would be uncharacteristic of the NEA. The 2.1 million member teacher's union has previously encouraged schools to "acknowledge the diversity of the student body,

including the presence of gay as well as non-gay students" (1994), defended the right of lesbian and gay students "to positive role models, both in person and the curriculum" (1994), and promoted the "accurate portrayal of the roles and contributions of gay, lesbian, and bisexual people throughout history, with acknowledgment of their sexual orientation" (1988).

Utah bans gay school clubs

SALT LAKE CITY, April 17—Utah legislators passed a bill banning three kinds of school clubs. Banned clubs include those that "encourage criminal or delinquent conduct, promote bigotry, or involve human sexuality." The bill's sponsor is State Senator Craig Taylor (R), who stated that the bill was specifically designed to stop gay clubs. Taylor stated that the gay clubs were being pushed by "adult homosexual organizations...Since [gays and lesbians] can't reproduce, they have basically said, 'We will seduce and sodomize your children.'" The law will be the only one of its kind in the nation, and civil rights groups have promised the bill will be litigated.

Federal same-sex marriage bill

The first federal bill to ban same-sex marriage has been unveiled in Congress. The "Defense of Marriage Act,", as it is called, was sponsored by Reps. Bob Barr, R-Ga. and Steve Largent, R-Oklahoma. Now-former Senator Bob Dole was the first to sign on to the bill,

The legislation would, for the first time, create a federal definition of marriage. According to this federal definition, marriage would only include heterosexual couples. The Federal government would not recognize legally married same-gender couples. Currently, civil same-gender marriage is not permitted anywhere in the United States, This federal legislation, like over 30 antimarriage measures introduced on the state level, is in anticipation of an upcoming Hawaii court decision that could legalize same-gender marriage in that state.

President Clinton has stated that he will sign the bill, a statement that has drawn much criticism from gay rights activists. Melinda Paras, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, said, "The Rightwing groups behind this measure are as shrewd as they are pernicious. Along with doing real damage to real families, this is a blatant ploy to alienate gay voters from President Clinton. The Right is forcing Clinton's hand on the issue of gay marriage because they know his opposition to this hot button issue could alienate one of his most important constituencies."

Ban on same-sex marriage proposed A pair of Republican lawmakers have proposed legislation to bar legal recognition of same-sex marriages in Pennsylvania. The bill, proposed by Representatives Allen Egolf of Perry County and Stephen Maitland of Adams County, would allow the state to only recognize marriages between men and women. The lawmakers say a court case now pending in Hawaii could force states without such laws on their books to recognize homosexual marriages.

New York state couple sues for marriage rights

A gay male couple in Ithaca, New York has sued New York State for the right to a marriage license. In May 1994, Toshav and Philip Storrs applied for a marriage license at the city clerk's office. The clerk said she wanted to give the couple a license, but stated that New York state law would not allow it. In July, Ithaca's Common Council gave unanimous approval to a resolution that encouraged the state to legalize same-sex marriage. In December the city noted that the city clerk had no other choice, because a Health Department directive said that city clerks should not issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples. Some advocates of same-sex marriage have asked the couple not to go through with this suit for fear of having an effect on a similar case in Hawaii. The couple has said they intend to pursue it.

SF mayor marries 165 same-sex couples

San Francisco mayor Willie Brown officiated at a mass wedding for 165 gay and lesbian couples on March 25. "We're leading the way here in San Francisco for the rest of the state and the rest of the nation, Brown said at the ceremony, "to fully embrace the diversity and legitimacy of people in love regardless of their gender or sexual orientation."

Reform rabbi group endorses samesex marriage

March 28—The 1,750-member Central Conference of American Rabbis endorsed same-sex civil marriage. The group did not recommend that rabbis perform such weddings; that issue is expected to be voted on at next year's meeting.

Reform Judaism is the largest of the three branches of Judaism. They are not the only branch to take a stand on same-sex marriage however: the Reconstructionist branch has accepted same-sex marriages for years, but the Orthodox rabbis say the Bible forbids marriage between people of the same gender.

Sweden's top female rocker weds girlfriend

Eva Dahlgren, Sweden's top female rock star, was legally married to her girlfriend Efva Attling. The wedding was a major news story in Sweden, where same-sex weddings are recognized. The gay publication QX called for making the couple's January 25 wedding date Sweden's coming-out day.

Hawaii marriage ban derailed

A state constitutional amendment that would have defined marriage as "reserved exclusively for the lawful union of man and woman" has been defeated by the Hawaiian state legislature. Conservative Christian groups lobbied for the bill. If the lawmakers had approved it, the measure would have been put before the electorate in November. Many other religious leaders have signed a statement in favor of same-sex marriage.

Netherlands: House passes promarriage resolution

April 16—The House of Representatives here passed a resolution encouraging marriage rights for same-sex couples. A second vote supported equal adoption rights for gay/lesbian people and single heterosexuals. The resolutions encouraged the government to take action.
