Homophobic restaurant comes to Erie

A new Cracker Barrel restaurant is being built on upper Peach Street.

The Cracker Barrel restaurant chain distinguished itself in 1991 by issuing a harsh anti-gay employment policy. After a customer complained about a gay employee, Cracker Barrel issued a statement saying that it stood for "traditional values" and that it was "perceived to be inconsistent with those of our customer base to continue to employ individuals whose sexual preferences fail to demonstrate normal heterosexual values which have been the foundation of families in society." The company fired over 28 employees for being gay.

The most well-known of these firings was Cheryl Summerville, a reliable, award-winning cook. When Summerville learned of the company's new anti-gay policy and the firings, she told her manager she was a lesbian. Her manager reluctantly had to fire her, and Summerville's official termination notice read: "This employee is being terminated due to violation of company policy. The employee is gay."

The negative publicity and picketing caused the company to rescind the policy in some locations. However, although the official policy has been rescinded, Cracker Barrel still continues to fire employees who are gay or lesbian. Also, they have not rehired the employees that were fired in 1991.

The magazine Mother Jones reported that since activists began protesting against Cracker Barrel, their stock has consistently declined. If you want to tell Cracker Barrel what you think of their policy, you can reach them at (800)925-9066.

Hey there! How was everyone's summer? We were extremely busy buying a house and settling in. One advantage of working with the newsletter is being aware of local resources. We were very happy with how Atty. David Baxter handled the closing of our house. We have been quite out (rainbow flag out front, across the street from a Roman Catholic Church) and the neighbors have been quite nice. A straight teacher two doors down was delighted to have a gay male couple in the neighborhood. All of which suggests to me that most people can be cool if you give them half a chance. Often, the only person holding us back and locked in the closet is ...ourselves!

Micheal's older brother Bobby died of AIDS July 5th. The family hadn't seen him for a number of years (not homophobia). Micheal and I drove down with Mike's mom over the Fourth of July to Atlanta. We knew he wasn't doing well and we knew Atlanta was about to become a zoo with the Olympics. We arrived early Friday morning and Bobby died at 10:30 that night. Bobby wasn't really able to speak, but he did obviously recognize his mom and brother. Bobby's lover had a wonderful kind and supportive son (the son's girlfriend was also there.) All too often the radical right loses sight of what family values really mean (being there for folks you care about, and maybe not so much about having divergent genitalia.)

We also lost our oldest cat, Smokey Joe, shortly after the move. Thankfully, he died peacefully of old age. He had been for a number of years the newsletter's unofficial mascot and often helped boost our morale by playing with us late at night when we were trying to finish putting together the next issue of EGCN. We buried him with a container of cream and cheese corn in the backyard. (He dearly loved dairy.)

The big theme that seems to run through all this is to face what needs to be faced. Come out, start a group, write an article, tell someone how much you love them, take that class you always wanted to take. Live, live live! As Auntie Mame says, "Life is a banquet and most poor suckers are starving to death!"

Travel Review

The Dundonald House: Toronto's Premier B & B


Need to get away for a few days? Don't want to spend a lot of money? Want to go somewhere gay? Why not try The Dundonald House in Toronto!

This Bed & Breakfast is situated in the heart of the gay community in Toronto. It is on a quiet side street between Yonge and Church, just south of Bloor. The hosts, Dave and Warren, have created an extremely tasteful and comfortable atmosphere to enjoy a stay away from home. The house is actually their home and it is beautifully maintained. Guests are welcome to use the sauna, hot tub, and touring bikes. Each of the guest rooms have first-class amenities. The second B of B & B is unsurpassed at any B&B worldwide. Such favorites as Belgian Waffles or Eggs Benedict come to mind! There is plenty of information available about the gay and lesbian scene in Toronto as well as other cities.

Prices for the overnight range from \$85 to \$125 (Canadian dollars). As an American traveler, it is a fantastic deal, since the US dollar is worth \$1.35 in Canada. That makes the room rates between \$63 and \$93 in US money! Applicable taxes are in addition to these prices, but non-Canadian residents can get the 7% general Sales Tax back by mail from the Canadian government by simply filling out a form and mailing it in. Parking is available for five dollars a day (Canadian).

The DunDonald House opened in May of this year and has already become the leader of B&B's in Toronto. It is also developing international fame, as it has already hosted guests from the Netherlands, Germany, Switzer-

Youth: "Back to school" campaign



What is the Back to School Campaign?

First staged in 1995, the Back to School Campaign is an annual grass roots education and advocacy effort in which lesbian, gay, and bisexual adults and their allies write in to their former schools and use their own experiences there to help school staffs to understand the impact of homophobia on young people.

Why do we need to go Back to School?

It's simple. Many teachers, administrators and community members believe homophobia is someone else's problem, something that doesn't happen in their community. We need to erase that notion once and for all, and can do so with the simplest of actions: writing a letter to a teacher or administrator at a school we attended. We need to tell them what it was like to attend that school as a young gay, lesbian, or bisexual person, or someone who cared about a gay lesbian or bisexual person. We need to make sure that they understand homophobia is damaging to young people, and leads to dispropor-



tionately high rates of violence, dropping out, substance abuse, and suicide in this population. We need to ask them what they are doing to protect the next generation from this kind of bigotry. We need to ask them to make their schools places where all students get the education they deserve—regardless of sexual orientation.

How do I get involved?

- Write a letter to someone at your former school this fall and use your own experience to educate them on what homophobia does to young people.
- 2. Follow up your letter with a phone call, offering to provide resources such as GLSTN's "What You Can DO" packet or even to return to your old school to speak with faculty and students.
- Join GLSTN and become involved in your local chapter's work to end homophobia in your community's schools.



Local UU supports Same-Sex Marriage

On July 28, 1996, the members of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Erie approved the following statement and its distribution to our elected officials, to other religious bodies, and to the local media:

Unitarian Universalists affirm the inherent worth and dignity of every person, and we advocate justice, equity, and compassion in human relations.

Part of the stated mission of the UU Congregation of Erie is to create a loving, joyful, welcoming community to which adults and children can come for spiritual, intellectual, and social fulfillment.

As people of faith, our UU Congregation has a tradition of speaking out on public policy issues involving moral and ethical matters, or where intolerant views of one religion might be imposed by government fiat on people of different religious persuasions.

We are deeply concerned by the recent campaign to hurriedly pass legislation that would ban marriage between two people of the same gender. We are now urging our legislators in Harrisburg and in Washington, DC, to not vote on such legis-

lation without a thoughtful debate about its purpose and justification. There are valid arguments for same-sex marriages, and potential detriment to the state if such marriages are banned.

Marriage is one of society's most fundamental institutions. It starts with either a civil or a religious ceremony; the formalities (age, blood test, etc.) and legal consequences (social security benefits and various laws affecting property rights, taxes, estates, and divorce) of the union are determined by the state. To bar any class of adults from marrying as they choose is a major deprivation, not a trivial disenfranchisement.

We believe no discernible state interest would be served by banning same-sex marriages. Such legislation would be self-righteous and uncharitable at best, hateful and vicious at worst. Excluding homosexuals from the

privileged status of marriage is an exercise in homophobia, infringes on civil rights, and is without any societal justification.

What are the legitimate interests of the state in the institution of marriage? We believe they are: (1) children; (2) stability; and (3) caregiving.

(1) Traditionally, most married couples conceived and nurtured children, and the state had a self-interest in encouraging population growth. In modern times many couples have no children, either by choice or because one of the partners is sterile. There are more than 6,000,000

childless heterosexual marriages in the U.S., far more than the potential number of same-sex marriages. Neither a promise to procreate nor the ability to do so has ever been a prerequisite to obtaining a license to marry in any of the 50 states.

There is growing awareness that unabated population growth has adverse environmental impact and leads to problems of hunger, poor health and child poverty, and these matters should also be concerns of the state. The prospect of being childless is no reason to withhold the benefits of marriage to a committed

couple.

(2) Marriage can have a stabilizing or settling effect on the partners.

Married men are more likely than unmarried men to stay at home and out of trouble—a goal desired by the state. One of the main benefits of publicly recognized marriage is that it binds couples together not only in their own eyes but also in the eyes of society at large. Around the partners is woven a web of expectations that they will spend their lives together—off the streets and at home. The domesticating effect that marriage brings to both parties in a loving, committed relationship, whether straight or gay, should be encouraged by the state. It is certainly better than the closet-gay culture and courting a series of different partners.




(3) If marriage has any meaning at all, it is that, when you are beset with a physical, emotional or mental problem, there will be someone to care for and comfort you. The caregiving rationale for marriage applies equally to homosexuals. One of the first things many people worry about when coming to terms with their homosexuality is: Who will take care of me when I'm ailing or old? Society needs to care about this, too, as the AIDS crisis has made horribly clear. If that crisis has shown anything, it is that no institution can begin to match the care of a devoted partner. Legally speaking, marriage creates kin. Surely society's interest in kin-creation is strongest of all for people who are unlikely to be supported by children in old age and who may well be rejected by their own parents in youth. Caregiving is much better served by marriage—that is, by one-to-one lifelong commitment—than by any other institution.

The power of marriage is not just legal but social. It seals its promise with the smiles and tears of family and friends. The marriage ceremony and investment tend to deter casual commitment and to make bailing out embarrassing. Marriage is a compact between a couple and society, not just between two people: society recognizes the sanctity and autonomy of the pair-bond, and in exchange each spouse commits to being the other's nurse, social worker, and policeman of first resort.

The so-called "Defense of Marriage Act" (S.1740) introduced by Senator Nickles is a reactive piece of legislation that utterly fails its stated purpose "to protect the institution of marriage." How can same-sex marriages be a threat to traditional two-sex marriages? The real purposes of this bill are to protect prejudice and to gain political ground by playing on fear and ignorance. It

would be shameful for our government to sanction such an intolerant, partisan agenda by enacting this ill-conceived legislation. [See below for PA]

If two adults of the same gender are committed to one another and prepared to abide by the marriage compact, and if a ceremony of marriage were duly conducted by an authorized clergy or state official, it is wrong for the state to either forbid or refuse recognition of such a marriage. The Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Erie supports legal recognition for marriage between two consenting, committed people of the same gender. For the reasons expressed above, the government would be wise to do so also.

The bills that would ban same-sex marriages in Pennsylvania (S.1558 and HB.2604) are reactive pieces of legislation. How can such marriages be a threat to traditional two-sex marriages? The real purposes of these bills are to engender prejudice and to gain political ground by playing on fear and ignorance. It would be shameful for our state government to sanction such an intolerant, partisan agenda by enacting this ill-conceived legislation.

"What I Did on My Summer Vacation"

This summer was a very busy time for me. I was in Detroit, Chicago, Pittsburgh, Latrobe, Clarion, Boston, Springfield, MA and of course Erie.

I guess the most interesting part of the summer was my trip to Chicago.

I arrived at Erie International Airport at 7:00 a.m. for a 7:30 flight.

As I was turning in my ticket and checking my luggage I heard the CNN morning report about the crash of TWA flight 800. I tried to talk the person behind the desk into giving my ticket back, but she said too late.

So there I was waiting for my flight as CNN detailed the crash. Well, I boarded my flight and clenched my teeth. My flight arrived in Chicago with just a delay in Detroit because of rain.

After a four day weekend of meetings with he National Hemophilia Foundation, I arrived at O'Hare International for a 5:30 p.m. flight back to Erie. It was a pleasant flight, but we had to fly low because of turbulent weather.

I was scheduled to be in Clarion at 8:00 a.m. Monday morning, so I left the house at 6:00 a.m. When I got to Clarion, Charlene Bushyager from Northwest Alliance said, "You made it!" I said, "Of course. Why wouldn't I have?" She then went on to tell me that they had found a pipe bomb on one of the tarmacs at O'Hare Sunday night. On CNN later that night they reported that there were two bomb scares and then the bomb was found. All this happening just 30 minutes after my flight left.

So, how was everybody else's summer?

It's also been an exciting time as far as information about HIV/AIDS is concerned. The International Conference in Vancouver gave a lot of new hope.

Triple combination therapy, viral load reporting, and other new drugs on the horizon are all reasons to be hopeful. A report from Dr. Ho suggested that triple combination therapy may actually be able to eliminate the virus from some people's systems. I was able to download and print over 200 pages of synopses from the conference.

Other advances have also been made in HIV/AIDS research are also reason for optimism. A group of researchers from the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center reported that there is a rare gene that some people have that protect them from HIV infection. This gene produces a protein, CKR-5, that does not allow HIV to enter into CD4 cells. This information has renewed the hope that a vaccine can be found.

So, there seems to be a glimmer of light on the horizon. But until more information is gleaned from this mountain of figures and statistics, I would once again ask everybody to be careful. Keep yourselves safe and enjoy life. Nobody ever expects to get on a TWA Flight 800.

Government sues Christian Coalition

WASHINGTON, July 30—Four members of the Federal Election Coalition voted to sue Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition for illegally acting as a political action committee. The organization, which is supposed to be nonpartisan, distributed voters guides and supported certain Republican candidates.

Gay activists denounce Kemp

(From the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force)
Former Senator Dole's selection of Jack Kemp as his
running mate is one more attempt to pacify the Christian Coalition and the ultra-right wing Council for Narional Policy.

Over the last fifteen years, Kemp has been part of the leadership of the hard Right, whose agenda is antithetical to democracy. His voting record brands him as a right-winger on such issues as abortion, discrimination against gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgenders, and people living with HIV and AIDS...

[Kemp opposes gays and lesbians as teachers and opposed the Supreme Court's recent decision to overturn Colorado's Amendment 2. Both Kemp and Dole have sided time and time again with arch-conservative, notorious anti-gay lawmakers Jesse Helms and William Dannemeyer on numerous hostile amendments, including one to cut off all funding to gay community health organizations, mandatory HIV reporting and others. Kemp has made an about face on his more moderate opinions on affirmative action and immigration since being named to the ticket.

Not one of our prouder moments

The International Lesbian and Gay Organization has taken back its ultimatum making all member organizations sign a letter that they do not support pedophilia. Members who did not sign the statement were to have faced expulsion.

In 1993, the ILGA was granted "consultative" status at the United Nations. When some anti-gay members of Congress pointed out that some of ILGA's mem-

ber organizations supported sex between adults and persons under the age of consent, and Congress threatened to cut off funding to the UN until the ILGA was free of organizations it saw as condoning pedophilia. The North American Man-Boy Love Association and two European pedophile organizations were thrown out of ILGA, and the ILGA directed member organizations to sign the antipedophilia statement or face expulsion. When less than half of the statements were returned signed, the ILGA Secretariats' Committee suspended the decision until the next general membership meeting.

Debate coverage

The Unitarian Universalist Association has signed on as a sponsor of "DebateWatch 96" a nonpartisan (truly!!) project of the Commission on Presidential Debates, which offers materials to organizations to sponsor community discussion right after the presidential debates which air Sept 25 through Oct 9. They provide discussion guides and suggestions for civil, non-inflammatory discussion, and then ask for information on what the various focus groups thought about the debates. Make your opinions count! They'll publicize all of the responses to the media afterwards. For more information, email them at presdeb@falcon.cc.ukans.edu, or visit their website at Debates96.org.

No statewide ballot measures

Washington—For the first time since 1992, there will not be a single antigay initiative on any statewide ballot in the US.

"This marks a political sea change, and the well-deserved death of an extremist tactic," said Cathy Woolard from the Human Rights Campaign.

Statewide anti-gay initiatives haven't really enjoyed much success. Although they have appeared in Maine, Colorado, and Idaho, and twice in Oregon, only Colorado's Amendment 2 had passed.

In May, the US Supreme ruled Amendment 2 to be unconstitutional, demonstrating that anti-gay measures would have a hard time holding up.

HRC's Woolard sees anti-gay groups shifting efforts to other arenas, like state legislatures.

Spirituality

Dignity organizes "Solidarity Sunday"

Dignity USA has selected Sunday, October 6th (the Sunday before National Coming Out Day) as the second observance of Solidarity Sunday.

Solidarity Sunday is an invitation for members of the Christian community to show support for their gay, lesbian, transgender, and bisexual brothers and sisters by wearing a sign of support. As last year, this sign will be a swath of rainbow colored ribbon pinned to one's clothing

Secular, as well as religious organizations, are encouraged to work with members of their local clergy to invite entire congregations to join in the observation of Solidarity Sunday. Ribbons are handed out on a piece of card containing the Solidarity Pledge, as well as the Solidarity Prayer.

Perhaps this could be a tool to open discussions with churches we do not normally approach in our human dignity work.

One side of the card reads:

I wear this ribbon in Solidarity with my Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgendered Sisters and Brothers.

Solidarity Prayer:

God, You are the Creator and Lover of all, regardless of race, religion, sexual orientation or gender identity. We pray that verbal and physical violence against our lesbian gay, bisexual, and transgendered brothers and sisters cease. We pray in the name of Jesus, who welcomed all to his circle of friends. Amen.

We must end verbal & physical gay bashing!

The flip side reads: Pledge: I pledge

- 1. I will work for civil and human rights for all people, including gays, lesbians, bisexuals and the transgendered. *Civil rights are not special rights.*
- 2. I will seek to stop jokes and unkind language about anyone, including gays, lesbians,

bisexuals and the transgendered when spoken in my presence *Words hurt and bigotry is not funny.*

- 3. I will speak out against slander, debasement, lies or dehumanization of anyone, including gays, lesbians, bisexuals and the transgendered, including when spoken by political or religious leaders *Violent speech leads to physical violence.*
- 4. I will work to stop physical violence against anyone, including gays, lesbians, bisexuals and the transgendered. *Violence against any person is violence against all people.



Vitamin E in lube formulas

We recently contacted the makers of Wet brand lubricant, and asked about their water-based lube, which contains Vitamin E. We were curious, because Vitamin E commonly comes in oil form. The company wrote back, "Wet Original and Wet Light Formulas contain a powder form of Vitamin E which does not contain any oil."

More on plastic wrap dams

A common bit of advice regarding lesbian safer sex is to use *nonmicrowaveable* Saran Wrap or plastic wrap as a dam. The reasoning: that microwaveable plastic wrap is porous. But can you even get nonmicrowaveable plastic wrap anymore? A couple of determined lesbian shoppers searched local grocery store shelves and couldn't find any. But is the nonmicrowaveable stuff even necessary? According to one source on lesbian safer sex, the plastic wrap only becomes porous when heated to very high temperatures. If the regular stuff is actually okay, then it means you get to use that neat colored wrap.

Poppers and safety

Q: It seems to me lately that I require the use of poppers more and more to really enjoy sex. What I'm not sure about is how safe are they?

A: Well, according to the National Institute of Health in the USA, using poppers even once or twice a week is sufficient to produce sustained alteration to the immune system. This was concluded based on a study among HIV-negative men. Other, larger studies have found a correlation (though not a cause effect relation) between nitrate inhalation and unsafe sex (Gee, go figure). Poppers might make you feel good during sex, but don't become a slave to them, and don't be stupid. Condom first, then poppers, should be the rule of thumb. And don't spill any on your skin, it burns!

"A small group of us have been supporting gifted gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and questioning youth for a year now, by providing a web space where they can publish poetry, art, photography, graphics, commentary, etc. and actually be part of the publishing process," Warren explains. "We have workshops where local kids can learn about the Web, html and graphics programs, and be part of designing and posting their own pages."

In addition to Warren, the nonprofit project is copublished by John Waiblinger and Darin Weeks. Currently, YAP exists in two editions — "YouthArts East" (http://dolphin.upenn.edu/~lgba/youtharts) and "YouthArts West" (http://www.qcc.org/yap).

Recent additions to "YouthArts West" include a section for African-American poets, excerpts from significant youth publications (e.g., Hillary Carlip's bestselling book, "Girl Power"), and a column devoted to queercore music

Meanwhile, "YouthArts East" has "moved into cutting-edge investigative reporting" (e.g., Paul Lukasiak's report on the horrors of school-based ROTC programs).

YAP has also gotten "in the face of the Justice Department about CDA censorship on the Internet." According to the publishers: "Three of the four youth affidavits filed with the federal district court, in this case affecting millions of young people, were YouthArts voices.... Their affidavits, posted on 'YouthArts West,' are searing statements of the need for youth free speech."
