

Fright Night (1985) Mainly of interest to fans of out lesbian Amanda Bearse. In it, she helps to investigate a suspected vampire. (Chris Sarandon). Sarandon and his gay servant pose as lovers.

Heaven's a Drag (To Die For) (1994) Referred to as a sort of a gay Ghost, this British comedy revolves around a drag queen who dies of AIDS and comes back to offer his lover advice of life.

The Hunger (1983) Lusty lesbian vampire tale with Catherine Deneuve, Susan Sarandon and David Bowie. Contains very steamy sex between Sarandon and Deneuve. (Lesbian comic Suzanne Westenhoeffer credits the film with bringing her out!).

Interview With the Vampire (1994) Film adaptation of the homoerotic Anne Rice novel, starring Tom Cruise as Lestat.

Love Bites (1988) A sexy vampire love story featuring the 437-year-old West Hollywood Count who seduces the novice vampire stalker (*Advocate Men* called it "The best soft-core film of 1989."). Stars porn stars Christopher Ladd and Kevin Glover.

Red Ribbons The home video release of this Quentin Crisp compilation features *Aunt Fannie*, in which Crisp plays the ghost of a 90-year-old lesbian.

Slumber Party Massacre (1982) A slasher movie mainly of interest to fans of lesbian author Rita Mae Brown, who says she wrote it to take on the anti-female slasher movies that were all the rage at the time. The cast and crew are all female, except for one male killer, and a male victim.

Tenderness of the Wolves (1973) Produced by gay filmmaker Werner Fassbinder, this black comedy about a gay blood-sucker is actually based on the life a real person (Fritz Haarman).

Television

Check out our rundown of the **new fall season** (Story on page 8).

THE biggest news of the TV season (making front page news!) is that Ellen DeGeneres' character on her hit sitcom Ellen may come out as a lesbian this season. According to TV Guide, DeGeneres and the show's producers are pushing for the change, which would make her character the first prime time network series with a lesbian or gay male as the central character. In one of this season's episodes (entitled "Splitsville, Man"), Ellen is standing behind a closet door, and when she comes out she says, "Yeah, there's plenty of room, but it's not very comfortable." When her parents later tell her they are planning to be divorced, she says, "How do you think I feel What if I said something shocking to you-like my whole life has been a lie and I'm really...left handed." Walt Disney Co., which produces and owns Ellen, is a little nervous about the idea in light of the Baptist boycott against their company (because they supposedly support "the gay agenda"). Rev. Donald Wildmon of the American Family Association has threatened a boycott

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

of the show's sponsors if Ellen's character comes out. So far, no advertisers have left, and companies involved with television advertising seem to think there's not much to worry about, and they know that LesBiGay viewers have a lot of economic clout as a group. Even if Disney doesn't give the go-ahead for Ellen to completely come out, the viewing audience will not be able to see her character as straight anymore, particularly after all the publicity, and with the numerous hints and subtexts being sprinkled into episodes. No word on whether DeGeneres plans to come out herself. Ellen is on ABC Wednesdays.

Have you ever attended a Féis Samhain? I know what you're thinking... "Attend it? I can't even pronounce it!" A Féis Samhain (pronounced Fesh Saw-in) is an Irish Halloween celebration. On Oct 25th, CILBGO (Cleveland Irish LesBiGay Organization) will sponsor a Féis Samhain at the Lesbian/Gay Center at 1418 W 29th St, Cleveland.

CILBGO was founded in June of 1995 and consists for gay, lesbian and bisexual Irish-Americans (and other ethnic backgrounds) who have an affinity for things Irish, and who long to celebrate their Irish heritage and deep love of Irish culture with others in the gay community. The group shares a commitment to keeping the Irish spirit above, while also claiming and honoring our place in the gay community. The slogan, "Double Pride" exemplifies this.

The group offers a wide variety of events and activities, with the intent of satisfying various interests and individual tastes. In the first year since its inception, CIL-BGO has already sponsored several cultural/social events, such as Attending the Irish Cultural festival, doing a presentation on gay Irish patriot, Roger Casement, A Féis

Samhain last October and hosting a St. Patrick's Day party at the center. Group members spoke and performed on Buck Harris' radio show on St. Patrick's Day and also did traditional music and dance at Pride '96, as well as marching in the parade.







The six person cast did a fabulous job of bringing this funny and moving play to life. The play was directed by Randy Trapper and Rob Santos and produced by Michael Weiss

Hugh Rial did a fantastic job as Arnold Beckoff, a Brooklyn drag queen who falls in love with a bisexual (Ed, played by Dan Curry) and later a young model (Alan, played by Jeff Rodland) Alan marries and later separates from Laurel (played by Carolin Prichard, who also sings a few torch songs as Lady Blues) Arnold later adopts a son, David, who is also gay (Justin Fischer, who also plays piano.) Arnold's mother is played by Sue Hansen.



Cup-A-Ccino's under new ownership

Six years after opening Cup-A-Ccino's, Jerri Quigley has sold the popular coffeehouse.

"I wanted to take time for myself," says Quigley. "Right now I am on the Board of Directors of the YWCA and I would like to do more volunteer work. I'd like to put a lot of energy into educating Erie about racism and discrimination in all forms."

The new owner is Kurt Sahlman. Sahlman is from Erie, and has worked in health care since 1982.

Will the coffeehouse change?

"I don't want to tamper with a winning formula," says Sahlman. "When Jerri and I were talking about my buying the business, she was concerned that her vision of the coffeehouse stay the same. If there are changes they will be gradual. The coffeehouse will still have performers and art. And I don't plan to change the staff."

Quigley was so concerned about her vision of Cup-A-Ccino's being maintained that her contract stipulated she be a consultant to the business for a year after its

Asked whether Cups will remain gay-friendly, Sahlman states emphatically, "I want to make this place welcome to all. Whether gay or straight, rich or poor, black or white. I want to make this a really cool place to meet to help promote constructive dialog between people."

Although he doesn't see changing Cup-A-Ccino's in any fundamental way, Sahlman does have some ideas for changes that reflect his own interests and slant on things.

Because of his long history in the health field, (e.g., he helped set up the HealthPLACE program), he hopes

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to bring an emphasis on good health to Cup-A-Ccino's. For example, Tai Chi Classes are held there from 7:30-8:30 a.m., free of charge. Also, the healthy food menu will also be emphasized more.

Sahlman plans to bring in a computer, fax machine, and copier for customers to use. He may bring in a newsstand, where customers can buy publications (free publications would still be available).

An idea he is presently working on is the Cup-A-Ccino's Club. Members would have certain privileges, like being able to take out books and games, being able to come to the coffeehouse afterhours, etc.

The coffeehouse will be open on Sundays now, from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Also, people who have attended a concert downtown are invited to bring in the stub to receive a free cup of regular coffee.

Forum: What Is Marriage?

A public forum for reasoned discussion of same-sex marriage

What are the defining attributes of a "marriage?" Are they present or absent in a union between two committed people of the same gender? What are the pros and cons of legislation that would deny legal recognition to same-sex marriages? What are the threats to opposite-sex marriages in contemporary society? What issues of justice, civil rights, human rights, public good, and free exercise of religion need to be considered?

These questions and more will be addressed at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Erie on Thursday evening, October 24, at 7:30 p.m. Five panelists will offer diverse views on the wisdom or fallacy of laws banning same-sex marriage. There will be ample time for comments and questions from the audience. This is your opportunity to become better informed on a timely but not often discussed societal issue.

The forum, hosted by Unitarian-Universalists in Community, will begin at 7:30 p.m. on Oct. 24 at 7180 New Perry Highway (about 0.3 mile north of I-90 on PA Route 97). It is free and open to the public; seating is limited. The panelists are:

Try, if you will, to envision a sea of 45,000 rainbow-colored panels covering 15 city blocks. Then, imagine that each of these 3" by 6' panels represents the life of at least one person who died of AIDS. Each of these AIDS people (I refuse to call them victims because, to me, that connotes an image of someone who has been cowered, has given up. But the opposite was true of my son Mark and each of the other AIDS patients I've known. All have shown great dignity and valor in the face of their dire circumstances.)—These people—most in their peak years of creativity and productivity, many even younger—have suffered physical, mental and emotional pain beyond description. All have left behind partners, families and friends who loved them and still miss them every day regardless of the time elapsed. Now

realize this is not an exercise of your imagination, it is a fact just too immense to really get your mind around.

That is the purpose of the AIDS Memorial Quilt—to help you get past the statistics of over 300,000 AIDS related deaths and understand the enormity of the loss in terms of the individuals involved. Each panel tells a story—the story of

the life of a person, or the impression he made on those who knew him or how they saw him—each story as individual as the person it represents.

You will have the opportunity to see and feel the impact of those stories this October 11-13 when the NAMES Project Foundation take the entire Quilt (most probably, for the last time) to the nation's capital, Washington DC. At the Inaugural Quilt display October 11, 198 in Washington there were 1,920 panels. The last time the entire quilt was displayed was in the fall of 1992 when it contained 22,128 panels. At that time, because of the enormity of the undertaking, it was thought that the quilt would never again be displayed as a whole. But,

in 1994, after a poll of the membership, the NAMES project decided to do it one more time.

I planned to attend the Quilt display as soon as I knew one was planned. Then I discovered the PFLAG Annual Conference, which I also planned to attend, was also scheduled for the same time. As a matter of fact, PFLAG members will be caretakers and read the roll of names for a time on Saturday. (In all, over 10,000 volunteers will be needed to caretake the Quilt over the weekend.) A Candlelight Mach Against AIDS across Memorial Bridge to a Quilt Vigil at Lincoln Memorial is scheduled for Saturday evening.

I'm glad the NAMES Project decided to exhibit the entire Quilt again because it gave me the opportunity to

have my son Mark's panel as part of the display. Mark died on July 28, 1992 but for one reason or another, mostly because I just wasn't ready, I have never completed a panel for him. When I knew the entire Quilt would be in DC this fall, that gave me the motivation I needed to get busy. I was surprised at the emotional

jolt I felt just on buying the material. It was as if, somehow, that little bag of sailcloth represented all that was left to me of Mark here on earth—a little crazy—but, nevertheless, my feeling at the time.

Finishing the panel was yet another catharsis of sorts on the way to healing. To me, there is so much symbolism and love in each little detail of Mark's panel. He was a no-nonsense, modern "less is more" kind of person with an unsentimental veneer. I tried to respect and convey that in his panel. I chose black sailcloth for the background to combine the somberness I felt with his appreciation of austerity. The centerpiece of the panel is one of his photographic panoramas. The one I chose was taken



in an opulent hotel lobby in Monaco, his only panorama in which he appears because of the mirrored wall. This particular panorama holds special significance because it was the last one Mark completed as his sight was failing. In fact he washed the glue off after he was completely blind and just before he was admitted to the hospital having suffered bilateral collapsed lungs. The colors of the material for his name and the dates were chosen not only to coordinate with the colors of the panorama but also to represent the many shadings and varied facets of his personality. Since the rest of the panel was so spare and in keeping with Mark's philosophy, I indulged my sentimentality in the green leaf which, of course, represents his unrealized youthful potential. But it also represents a special childhood memory of Mark's. The broken heart is obviously that of those who loved him and the tears are only two of the many that were shed.

I hope as many of you as possible will be able to travel to DC this October to see the Quilt in person. And, when you do, remember, each panel embodies the story of a life that was precious to those who loved him.

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A tribute to Kelvin C Wheeler

On August 29, 1996 Erie lost a very good friend and person who was very active in the fight against HIV and AIDS. Kelvin was and still remains always in the hearts of those who know him and loved him.

I will always remember the joy in his life at being able to bring a smile to anyone no matter what the circumstances. He always had a positive attitude and a great love of life. The silly grin, the sly smile, and the constant need to be involved were his trademark, At anytime you could find him at the Episcopalian Cathedral, the Alliance, or doing a presentation at one of the many college campuses in the area which he always complained about but loved to do. I will never forget the beautiful man that was and shall remain forever in my heart. And to say thank you Kelvin for the time we spent together and the patience you taught me. I can only try to emulate your memory and continue your life's work in your absence, Sleep well, my friend you earned it, and now it is time for the rest of us to take up your torch and do all we can to continue the fight.

Of T-cells and Viral Loads

I thought I would use my article to update everybody on the recent developments on my physical condition. As the Grateful Dead said, "What a long strange trip it's been."

First, a little explanation about what has been the "buzz" this summer in the news about HIV/AIDS, viral loads. There have been numerous articles talking about viral loads and their importance in tracking the progression of this disease. The other day I heard an explanation that helped me understand it better. Think of this disease in the context of a car crash test, where a car is heading towards a wall. The T-cell count tells you how close to the wall you are, the viral load tells you how fast you are going. So, an initial high viral load means a person will progress through HIV disease rather quickly. The lower the load, the slower the progression. When taken together, the two results give a very reliable indication of how a person will deal with HIV infection.

I had my first viral load done just prior to starting the new protease inhibitor, Crixivan. The test results came back undetectable.

That meant that there was a very low level of virus in my system. But my T-cell count was also fairly low, 218. This is just above the limit set for an AIDS diagnosis. It seemed odd to me that my viral load would be so low after 13 years of infection. I decided it was time to try to get some answers. Through an unusual set of circumstances, I was able to get a virologist from Cleveland Clinic to look at the particular strain of the virus that I was infected with. After two attempts, he was unable to culture the virus from my samples because it was so low. It seems that I was at a dead end. Three more viral load test have been preformed and they have all come back the same, undetectable levels of virus.

I am currently waiting on the results of the fourth test. This is going to be the most telling one because I went off all medication the weekend I was in Chicago. One of the side effect of Crixivan is kidney stones. After a bout when I was 600 miles from home, I decided I didn't want to go through that again. Well, anyway, I stopped all meds and I feel fine. Still no symptoms. If my

viral load hasn't changed and my T-cell count is stable, I'm going to make another attempt to get one of the researchers to look at my blood and try to figure out what's going on.

One of the interesting sidelights on this whole situation was a miscommunication between my doctor and I. We have a very good working relationship, something that's of the utmost importance in this disease.

She respects my opinions and we talk about the latest research that either one of us has read. But in communication, what someone says is not always what we hear. We were talking about my test results that I got for my baseline (the tests that were done before I started Crixivan) and I heard her say that my T-cell count was at 48 in January, and jumped to 60 in May. That meant that I had an AIDS diagnosis. Since I was still asymptomatic, I would have had one of the rare asymptomatic AIDS diagnosis'. I was concerned, because that's the second biggest step a person takes in this illness. (The first being going from HIV- to HIV+).

But it seemed really strange that my T-cells were so low, when my viral load was undetectable. It didn't make sense. That's what started the whole situation with Cleveland Clinic.

When I got to talk to my doctor in person, I asked about my T-cells and she said, "What? Your count isn't that low. Your still at just above 200." When I asked what the 48 and 60 were she informed me that that was my T4-T8 ratio (another test done to determine how a person is dealing with HIV).

I guess the moral of the story is, if something doesn't seem right, it probably isn't. If you have a question about something make sure you ask that question.

Finally, just one question about DOMA? Since a marriage is defined as "a partnership between one man and one woman", how long will it be before there are other restrictions put on that partnership? Will the next step be a partnership of one man and one woman of the same race? Or religion? Or nationality? Or age? I don't know, just asking.

Well, that's it for this month. I'll keep you posted about the results of my current viral load and T-cell in next months issue.




