Film & Video

Antonia's Line is a film that tells about the lives of four generations of women in a Dutch family. The portrayal of Antonia's lesbian artist daughter, is treated as a natural part of the story. The film won an Academy Award for Best Foreign Film. It is available at The Movie Stop and will be shown in Jamestown at The Center (November 22 and 26), and in Warren PA at the Library Theatre (November 16 and 20).

First Wives' Club has a well-done lesbian subplot. Goldie Hawn's character has a lesbian daughter, and she takes the three wives to a lesbian bar. The bar scene is handled very well, and speaks somewhat to the fact that older women are more valued among lesbians than among

straight men. (And Lea DeLaria has a cute cameo! Also watch for Gloria Steinem...)

Missed this one last month: **Get On The Bus**, Spike Lee's new film about last year's Million Man March, features two well-developed black gay male characters.

Queen Latifah stars as a sentimental black butch lesbian who robs banks for some interesting reasons in the film **Set It Off**. (Nov. 6 release).

Tilda Swinton, who played male and female roles in Orlando, stars in *Female Perversions*, a story about bisexuality. (November release).

The Associate and **Twelfth Night**, look like fun and interesting takes on gender.

At the Movie Stop: I Shot Andy Warhol (see description in Dec. 18 calendar listing), Mr. Wrong (Ellen DeGeneres' first and last hetero romantic comedy), and "The Outcast" episode of Star Trek: The Next Generation (#116—an allegory of society's oppression of gays), French Twist (very unpredictable French romantic farce about a married woman who falls for a lesbian), and Kids In the Hall: Brain Candy. Maggie from the Movie Stop notes, "VIAAC (Video AIDS Action Committee) started a campaign four years ago called "A Penny for AIDS" where participating video stores donate a penny for every transaction during the week after Thanksgiving. The Movie Stop has proudly participated in this event for all four years. 
LGLV news


Thanksgiving.. they asked me to share what it means to me. (Tough to know where to stop!!) I've



An open letter about hate radio

After last year's bicentennial parade, the issue of hate radio became very prevalent in Erie County. I personally became very frustrated as to what options we as people have against these verbal bullies, that hide behind the first amendment. We organized a boycott effort that had some effect and it at least let the sponsors of talk radio know that the money they spend for advertising on hate

radio does more than promote their business, it helps sponsor messages of hate that hurt members of our community and assist to galvanize fellow hate mongers. I've since done a little research on what other communities have done to address hate radio and thought it would be worthy of sharing with EGCN.

An excerpt of suggestions from "Establish the Climate" by the South-East Uplift Neighborhood program in Portland, Oregon suggests that people call in!

Call in and challenge thoughtless rhetoric especially on issues of conflict and resolution. Support intelligent discussion.

You have the right to express your feelings. When faced with racist or bigoted comments, silence is taken as approval. By not speaking out against it, you are speaking for it. Go public with your commitment to establish the climate where all citizens can live in harmony. Remember by not interrupting racism or bigotry, we allow it to flourish...

Another source came from Milwaukee's Weekly News and Entertainment Voice "City Edition" where a

Mr. Jim Tatnall is being credited for having originated the idea for the talk back workshop. Tatnall envisions the specific goal of recruiting participants in three areas. The first level, volunteers would be sough to monitor talk shows. Secondly, persons are needed to conduct research, and to write position papers on issues for general distribution and for use by a third set of participants, persons who would call the talk show. "They (callers) will

be the hardest group to recruit, because they'll have to confront the host and be quick on the rebuttal," say Tatnall. "They're up against hosts who are paid to represent the conservative point of view."


I thought that this three fold recruitment idea was a great pro-active approach and worth of possibly repeating here in Erie.

Another source worth mentioning was by Jim Naureckas, editor of "Extra", a publication put out by Fairness and Accuracy in Reporting (FAIR). FAIR was formed in 1986 in response to an alleged narrow range of opinion, primarily conservative, being expressed in the media. Naureckas says that talk radio is not just putting out an ideology, but pushing activism. "The goal is not just to hold an audience, but to build a movement." "It's a shrewd move because they're building an audience of people who see themselves almost like an army against the people they've been trained to hate."

In closing, I'll share my thoughts made by the "Milwaukee Mobilizer" published monthly by the Peace Education Project Peace Action Milwaukee, that really captures our need to get involved and that us Demeaning remarks, jokes and language have become accepted in our society—not least because people fail to speak out against them. Some remain silent because they are afraid. Others remain silent because they are uncomfortable speaking up. They feel alone in dissension and uncomfortable with attention.

They become anxious and the anxiety overcomes good intentions. "Why didn't I say something?" Anxiety about expressing oneself is learned and must be unlearned...

So my friends, it is with regret that I tell you that other communities suffer the same problems with hate radio as we do, but in light of hope, my research concludes three blaring solutions to resolve and that is Get involved, get involved, get involved.



AIDS Memorial Quilt Display in Washington

October 10-13, 1996

My family and I traveled to Washington, D.C. this past weekend to see my brother's panel for the first time since it was incorporated into the Quilt. The trip, as usual for any family excursion, was an adventure. We decided to use Jackie's car for two reasons:

1) we had just put almost \$400 in repairs into the engine

2) mine has over 160,000 miles on it and an oil leak The scenery was beautiful through Western PA with the leaves changing and a bright autumn sun shining. The kids were in the back seat listening to their CD players and enjoying the sights. It was the perfect day for a trip.

Then it happened. There was a loud crunch and the sound of metal scraping concrete (a really unpleasant sound at 65 miles per hour). Fortunately we were only half a mile from a service plaza.

Unfortunately, we had blown the muffler almost completely off the car. A few minor adjustments elimi-

nated the now hanging and dragging muffler. Fortunately, we were only fifteen miles from Breezewood. Unfortunately, no one in Breezewood could repair the damage. So we drove the rest of the way to Baltimore, where we stayed, sounding like a muscle machine.

The final piece of good news was a Midas Shop only a mile from the motel we stayed in. I was in and out in about an hour.

Saturday morning we got an early start for Washington. In the city we were able to find a parking garage that only charged \$4 for all day. It was a fair walk down to the Mall area, but on a brisk morning, quite enjoyable. With the Washington Monument to our backs, the enormity of the Quilt lay before us. As we looked across 14th Street it covered the Mall area all the way to 3rd Street. The 12X12 foot sections were lettered from A to H going left to right and numbered 1 to 135 away from the Washington Monument towards the Capitol. Over 40,000 individual panels, representing more than 70,000 names, covering 24 acres. It was all at once an overwhelming, awe-inspiring, chilling experience. To

think that this was just a fraction of the number dead. To envision the passion, anger, grief, happy memories, and most of all, love that went into this giant memorial is hard to put into words. We started the long journey through this beautiful and moving tribute.

My brother's panel was in row 105, section B. We took the easy route emotionally, going up the perimeter to the right of the display. We would stop and view panels as emotion would permit. At the possibility of repeating myself, it is hard to describe this experience. Some panels you can feel the grief "To All Those Who Have Died To All Those Who Will Die, We Care About You, We Will Miss You", others the joy that was the person's life, a panel with the outfit the male stripper wore. The anger in those like the panel that reads "For Those With AIDS Murdered in WV".

When we finally got to row 105, I was not sure how I felt. On the corner was a panel for Freddie Mercury. I got a picture. The boys had walked ahead of us (you know, it's not cool to be seen with mom and dad).

We caught up with them at the section with my brother's panel. One of the boys was sitting by the section and the other two were staring off towards the Capitol. I was able to get a picture of my brother's panel without any problem.

We completed the walk towards the end of the quilt and stopped to rest and listen as they read names from the main stage. Before we started the trek back down the Mall, I looked over the families, friends, lovers that were a living sea among the sections of the Quilt. It was a moving sight. The epidemic was again made real to me. An article in *USA Today*, Monday Oct. 14, 1996, related the story of one panel that is truly telling. The Panel was made by a group of 50 students at the Technical Career Institute in New York.

The teacher who presented the panel to the Names Project said he was shocked to learn that 46 of the 3500 students at the school had lost a parent to AIDS. And personally, I'm encouraged, because there are battles that have been won. I'm also aware that the war is not over. Be safe, be well, take care.

P.S. Got the results from my latest CD4 test. My count has gone up from 218 to 341. Still trying to figure out the puzzle, but as my son's girlfriend said, "if it ain't broke, don't fix it".



Proper care and cleaning of sex toys is important in reducing the risk for exposures to body fluids. When using a plastic, metal or rubber dildo be sure to always dress/cover it with a condom. You can wear gloves to complement a condom covered dildo. Be careful to change condoms between vaginal/rectal or partner penetration and wash dildos after ever use. Leather dildos are nearly impossible to wash/clean thoroughly and should always be used with a condom and never shared.

When using butt plugs cover them completely with a condom. Use plenty of oil free lubrication to reduce the risk of rectal tearing. Always wash plugs between use and change condoms for each partner.

For vibrators use non-lubricated condoms and change the condom for each partner. Wash the vibrator after each use before putting it away.

Properly clean all sex toys to prevent exposures to body fluids by washing and disinfecting in a bleach solution. (1 part bleach to 10 parts water.) Remove the ball of hand held vibrators and immerse in the bleach solution. To disinfect leather goods, use the bleach solution with soapy water. It is recommended t use saddle soap and Neats Foot Oil compound in order to prevent cracking.

Finally, when using any other creative items for sex toys, remember to cover them with a condom, use lubrication and wear gloves. For more information, call 451-6727



HIV+ individuals who are at least 18 years old are needed to participate in a research study that will evaluate a new experimental treatment for HIV.


