

Dressing Room Divas Sister Mary Ignatius Explains it All for You.

Directors Circle Theatre is presenting a delightful evening of two 1 act comedies through Saturday, February 15. Micheal and I saw them and laughed out loud.

The first play, Dressing Room Divas, features 5 divas (Meryl Streep, Julie Andrews, Bette Midler, Elizabeth Taylor and Joan Collins) sharing a dressing room with two florists and (eventually a hunky gunman.) Suffice to say that with two gay characters and at least 4 of the 5 divas being relatively major gay icons, that there are loads of gay references. The play was energetic, funny and campy. The actors were all talented and seemed to have a lot of fun with this wonderful bitchfest.

The second play, Sister Mary Ignatius Explains it All for You, was written by openly gay playwright, Christopher Durang. Jo Laurie, who played Elizabeth Taylor in the first play, was wonderful as the apparently psychotic nun. She presents a rather unique interpretation of Catholic dogma and is confronted by 4 former students. (One of them a gay man who was seduced in a seminary and is now in a relationship.) There are some rather surreal moments and lots of laughs. I won't spoil the ending by revealing it, so you'll have to catch it yourself.

So, why not spend an evening out with your sweetie or friends and enjoy some excellent local theatre?

We are going to try to have entertainment but there is nothing lined up yet. Remember BYOB. Guests can feel free to hold hands, kiss, etc., without feeling like they are under scrutiny."

Buying rings together is a special moment in a relationship. Unfortunately, many same-sex couples have that moment marred by jewelers who are weirded out by their love. Well, if you don't mind driving a little way, let me tell you about a couple of jewelers that will be very happy for you. Aurum Precious Metals and Jewelry, 487 Elmwood Avenue in Buffalo, is gay-owned and operated. Owner Paul Michaels tells us that the store is very happy to be a part of honoring a same-sex couple's relationship, and they offer the couple a glass of champagne to celebrate that relationship. Michaels says, "Our jewelry is handmade, one-of-a-kind pieces in gold, silver and platinum. We specialize in antique jewelry and do a fairly good business in commitment rings." Their hours are Tuesday through Thursday 10 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday till 11 p.m. by appointment. Phone 716-886-1300. (Don't set yourself up for disappointment: there is a jeweler with a similar name in James town and they are not connected with these Buffalo people in any way.) If you are closer to Cleveland, check out Rinaldi Jewelers, 2028 East 9th Street. They advertise in the Gay People's Chronicle, and sell commitment rings and rainbow jewelry. Lesbianism is not here offered as a radical alternative to established society, it is shown functioning comfortably within that society. 

Gannon's New Policy towards Gays

"The Catholic Church and Gannon University deplore violence, harassment and ill treatment of gays and lesbians, and call for society in general, and the Gannon community in particular, to demonstrate respect and compassion... We are challenged to examine our prejudices regarding sexual orientation, including homophobia, and in doing so, to develop a climate reflective of a Christian community where all individuals accept, respect, and value others."

The above statements are part of a two page release issued by Gannon University in December entitled, "Pastoral Statement to Gannon Community: Sexuality as God's Gift and Our Response to Gay and Lesbian Student Concerns"

This statement, endorsed by Bishop Trautman, was written by an ad hoc committee that had been appointed by University President, Msgr. David Rubino.

The statement was one awaited eagerly by many gay students on campus who had met with committee members earlier last year in hopes of attaining a gay-friendly policy statement from the University. It includes a statement of commitment saying that the University intends to "provide a secure and appropriately supportive environment where gay and lesbian students can pursue their education," and "develop programs to heighten awareness of and sensitivity to issues of sexual identity."

This statement has been almost two years in the making. Some who read it may criticize it as not going far enough, or as saying just enough to hopefully con-

tent those who have been calling for its incarnation, but being a Gannon student I disagree. I believe that this statement has the potential to have a far reaching effect on campus. Whereas before gay students had nothing, we now have something official that speaks out against homophobia and violence against gay persons. And with this, our concerns and complaints must begin to be taken seriously by the University staff.

When we, the seemingly few, decided to speak out about the problems that gay students were facing on our campus, Gannon chose not to close its ears and eyes to student concerns, but rather it chose to listen, and to take action to address those concerns. This statement is something positive for the benefit of not only the gay and lesbian students, but for the entire Gannon community.

Okay-I'm not ashamed to admit it—not really. I'm a Monkee fan. And last July, while they were on their 30th anniversary tour, I went to the Warner to relive some good old days.

Oh, those good old days. When the only gay characters on TV or in the movies were "happy" ones. How bleak those days were. Back then, I knew I was different, I just didn't have a name for it. I didn't even know, in the very early days, that I was physically attracted to women. I just knew—somehow—I was an outsider. I was the Indian to everyone else's cowboy, the misunderstood, troubled youth on police shows, the only brunette in a sea of blondes—different.

Searching the screen in those days, it was only the underdog, the sidekick, the "different one"—Tonto, for instance—that I could identify with. Then came the 60's and the Beatles and Star Trek (with its ultimate outsider, Spock) and the Monkees.

A manufactured musical group, put together for the teeny boppers of America, a mad marketing grasp for youthful dollars—and it worked—for a few years.

Their music was okay—I liked it well enough, and their TV show was entertaining enough for a fourteen year old. And, oh, the fourteen year olds who were in love with Davy—with those dreamy starry eyes—innumerable. But I wasn't one of them. And while I admired Mike's cool head in any crisis, and though he had the best singing voice of the bunch, I didn't dream of dating him. And Micky. Funny. I wished I had his energy. And, always being a fan of drums, I played air drums many times in front of the TV—and, while I dreamed of writing a song that Micky would sing, I didn't dream of being kissed by him.

But, oh, Peter. Peter. The quiet one. Seldom sang solos. Rarely got the girl. A part of the group, but not. No, I didn't dream of being Peter's date, either. But I identified with him. He didn't quite know how to get girls—well, neither did I. Back then, he was the closest thing I had to a gay role model on TV—a shy person, wanting love, but not sure how to get it. And he epitomized all my teenage angst—wanting to belong, join-

ing in, playing along with the group, yet not quite with them, a person who looked like everyone else and acted like everyone else, but inside, was quite different from everyone else.

I work the evening shift, so I don't get to watch much TV, and right now I'm unsure if Ellen's character has come out, as the hype early in the season hinted she might. If so, great! I believe all of us who are gay—preteens, teens, adults—need to see positive gay characters on TV and in the movies. People, just like us, who struggle with relationships, stumble, yet triumph in the end. I know that seeing someone like that on TV when I was growing up would have helped me tremendously.

But we also need acceptance from straight stars whose fans we are. I have occasionally read reports of straight stars who get a bit touchy when interviewers remind them of their strong gay following (usually these are males, women tend to be less upset by gay fans, it seems). But, hey, we buy your records, read your books, watch your shows—please respect us. And accept us.

So there I was, on a hot July night, front row center at the Warner—with Micky, Davy, and Peter right in front of me—so close, I could almost touch them. And, oh, I could almost touch all those old feelings, too—the fear, the wondering, the denial, the doubt, and finally, the self-acceptance. And yes, Peter was one of the people who helped me get there.

He moved to the left of the stage and spoke. The girls screamed, the crowd roared; on stage, someone strummed a guitar.

"I love you, Pete," I shouted, in gratitude for all he'd helped me through.

He surveyed the front row—and smiled. With the thunderous noise it was impossible to tell who had shouted out to him—me, or the young man sitting next to me. He looked out over our heads, scanning the rest of the crowd, then saying a few words, bringing laughter and cheers. Then he looked down at us again—me, the young man. "And whoever said 'I love you," he said, "I love you, too." Whoever you are."

I hope he meant that.

Shades: A Lesbians of Color Organization

A Historical Perspective

In a well-established gay community, such as that present in a city the size of Buffalo, why would there be a need for an organization such as Shades? Well, sometimes in a room full of people, one can feel isolated and alone if one is the only person of color there. Despite the degree of acceptance and welcome by the white gay community, there is nothing like having one's own support group and/or network. Self-definition is essential for any ethnic group regardless of its sexuality. Thus the need for a lesbians of color organization became evident in June 1992, the groundwork was laid.

The genesis of Shades was at a breakfast given by an activist white woman for five lesbians of color. The women of color that came to the breakfast were women who were in relationships with white women and lived mostly in a white world. The host decided it would be a good idea to get them together after she'd attended a workshop with two of the women in Washington DC about diversity in the gay community.

It turned out that one or two of the women knew each other but no one knew everyone. That in itself was interesting since it was such a small group and they were in the same community. The women talked about wanting to connect with other lesbians of color and how that could be done.

Thereafter, the women had meetings in each other's homes practically every Sunday afternoon for the next five months and realized that they needed to expand this interest and energy into the community. They decided to make and hand out flyers, call old contacts, and just in general pass the word that a lesbians of color meeting would be held in the upper room at the Unitarian Universalist Church on Elmwood and Ferry Streets in December 1992.

To their surprise and delight, 25 lesbians of color showed up at that first meeting. Some were old friends, some were new faces. What was apparent was that there definitely was a need for a lesbians of color organization in Buffalo. Everyone in the room took turns telling a little about themselves and why they were there. The responses were as varied as the people. It was as though the women had been waiting for something to bring them together.

A few more meetings were held, but it soon became obvious that the group lacked direction. In May of 1993 it was finally decided that officers should be elected to get this thing going. A president, treasurer, and secretary were elected. After that, things began to fall into place. Some time later a name was chosen.

With the creation of Shades came the task of forming an agenda diverse enough to include and work for lesbians of color from all walks of life. To be successful we did not want a 'clique' but a club representative of our lesbianism and the same time be an extension of the community, and family of lesbians of color.

Shades first major event was a dance for all lesbians and gay men. It was a huge success, in part, because previous dances had been women only dances and we think that the community was ready for a non-exclusionary affair. We've also had a baseball team, a bowling league, a bus trip to Toronto's gay pride parade/festival, book club, potluck dinners, and social events for our non-drinking, non-smoking members. Some of these events have worked and some haven't. As with any organization, it takes a lot of work to keep a group viable and responsive to our members' needs. Even though our president recently resigned due to relocation for employment, Shades has a core group of members that are determined to keep it going because we know that it fills the needs for a lot of women who would not otherwise be involved in the gay community.

To this end we are still going strong, have plans for many events and activities for the coming year, and have a bi-monthly newsletter.

Sex & Health

Almost from the beginning of the AIDS epidemic, people were told that being in a monogamous relationship was the best way to avoid being infected with HIV.

Although educators thought it was a simple and easy piece of advice to follow, it turns out that it's not that simple. Many people who have been faithful to their partner end up being infected by them. The World Health Organization says that the major risk factor for women getting AIDS is being married. Why?

In the case of many women in the world, the problem is that they live in societies where men may have other partners, and wives must submit to their husbands' sexual demands and cannot insist on condoms.

There are a number of other issues in our society complicating the whole issue of monogamy and safer sex.

In our society, there are indeed some people who are subordinate to their partners and do not feel free to insist on safer sex.

This is not the only complication of the monogamy issue, though. Some partners may feel that if they insist

on safet sex, the other partner will be insulted and may leave them.

Some people simply toss out common sense when they fall in love, thinking (if you can call it that) that their love will protect them. These couples stop using condoms without getting tested together. They think that their beloved is so wonderful that they would never do anything like knowingly expose them to the HIV virus. The key word here is "knowingly," because many people infected with HIV do not know they have it, and some will be surprised when they finally learn they do.

Some people simply are not made for monogamy and invent all sorts of rationalizations for having sex outside of a supposedly monogamous relationship. Recently a study found that a number of gay men who say they are in monogamous relationships have multiple sex partners. Probably the best thing for these people to do is be honest with the fact that they are not monogamous, cannot or don't wish to be faithful to one person, and to not lie to themselves or others about being some-

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
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thing they are not. The gay community, and the general population, needs to stop making value judgements about people who are honest about not wanting to be in a monogamous relationship. As long as these people are honest about what they want, their partners will know what they need to do to keep uninfected.

For couples who really do want a one on one relationship, and want to dispense with condoms, it is recommended that they get tested together. The Erie County Health Department can counsel and test couples together, as can some other sites.

A wise plan for dispensing with condoms in a relationship is to keep having safer sex until the *second* test comes back negative. If the second test comes back negative, you will both have reason to celebrate and have some great unprotected sex. If one or both of you turns out to be positive, it is still good to know, so that you can both take steps that will protect your health.

It also isn't a bad idea for couples to get checked out for other STDs ...especially hepatitis B, syphilis, and herpes.

NEWS NOTES

The tenth installment of "MTV News: UNFiltered" premiered December 22, and has been re-broadcast on several dates since. Once again the show prominently includes queer content.

According to MTV, this series "turns the cameras around and puts viewers in control of the content, pictures and words that make the news." The latest "UNFiltered" episode opened with a segment on Portland's "City Nightclub," which has come under fire from local authorities.

According to club patron Patrick Hill, the harassment is utterly homophobic "as most of the clubgoers are gay, lesbian or bisexual." Hill's segment effectively argues the urgent need for places — other than the street — where queer youth can gather affirmatively.

"UNFiltered" debuted in 1995, and the series "invites viewers around the country to call a special toll free number (1-800-296-2445) with their story ideas;" selected viewers are provided with a camera to document their story on tape. Previous episodes of "MTV News: UNFiltered" have covered such issues as teenage suicide, squatters' rights, sexual harassment and gay drag.

"UNFiltered" is a production of MTV News. According to "TV Guide" (Dec. 27), the music network's news division — which has "tackled subject matter hard and soft in its 15 years" — is currently undergoing "an extensive overhaul." Reportedly, \$10.5 million will be slashed from the MTV News budget in the coming year. However, MTV president Judy McGrath insists that "the network's commitment to news remains as strong as ever."

"We will actually be upping the amount of news on the network," McGrath promises. "Normally, we do 16 half-hour specials. This year we're adding another 10 to that number as part of a regular Sunday night 'MTV News Presents...', show."

"MTV News: UNFiltered" aired seven times in 1996, but will be cut to four installments in '97. The series will be merged with "MTV News Presents..."

MTV is a unit of Viacom Inc., which also owns and operates VH1, Nickelodeon/Nick at Nite, and TV Land.

Other network programs that offer affirmative lesbian or gay content include VH1's "RuPaul" show (hosted by the gay drag diva/singer of the same name), and MTV's "Loveline" (a nightly sex advice/talk show), "The Real World" (documentary series) and "Rodman World Tour" (celebrity interview/talk show). In addition, a recent (December 29) episode of the VH1 biography series — "Storytellers" — featured lesbian rocker Melissa Etheridge.

*** QUALITY PRODUCE? . . . The MSNBC network has renewed its contract with "Imus In The Morning," a New York based radio show. Each weekday MSNBC simulcasts the nationally-syndicated series, which is hosted by Don Imus.

Unfortunately, the radio series — and now, the TV network — also provide a platform for snide on-air comments from "Bernie," the show's producer.

Acting as something of a side-kick for Imus, Bernie regularly interjects homophobic asides.

In recent MSNBC simulcasts, for example, Bernie suggested that homosexual marriages will only "pave the way for man-boy weddings. That's coming next!" Following a news report on IBM's decision to extend domestic partnership benefits to lesbian and gay employees, he remarked: "Instead of a mouse, you can have a gerbil on the pad. Go all the way with it!" By contrast, host Imus has been more supportive — or at least less hateful — than his producer.

*** COSTLY FREEDOM ... "Journalists around the world found themselves under increasing threats of both violent and legislative assaults in 1996," according to the Canadian Committee to Protect Journalists (CCPJ). In its recently-released annual report, CCPJ notes: "In 1996 alone, 163 journalists were charged and brought to trial for their work, 79 were sentenced, and 8 were handed suspended sentences. These numbers show a marked increase over 1995." "While scores of journalists are murdered every year for their work, the more common threat for journalists, is the courtroom, and the enemy, more often than not, is their own government," said Wayne Sharpe, executive director of CCPJ.
