

From December 10 - 12, 1998 the Erie, PA was treated to the World Premiere of "Passion For Life: A Journey From Tragedy to Hope", an original collection of theatrical works by Rita Louise Kilbane. Since a young age, Rita Kilbane has been involved in some shape or form of theatrics. Having attended and graduated from Gannon University with a degree in theatre, Rita spent her educational years pursuing her goal of creating plays that provoke thought and action. During the time she attended Gannon, Rita wrote several one act plays for the AIDS Action Team—a student organization that promotes HIV/AIDS education—one for World AIDS Day every year on December 1st. Erie World AIDS Day events

The fourth observance of World AIDS Day was commemorated on December 1, 1998. Locally, the events for World AIDS Day took place in East Park, Perry Square and at the Cathedral of Saint Paul as coordinated by the HIV/AIDS Education & Training team of Erie County Department of Health (ECDH), the Cathedral of Saint Paul and the HIV/AIDS Service Network.

Special thanks go out to the following for helping: Quality Markets, Shout Outreach, Tops Markets, Media Play, Erie Playhouse, Harborcreek High School, Father Mike McGraw, Wanda Habas, Jerry McCumber, Hispanic American Council, Minority Health Education Delivery System, Northwest PA Rural AIDS Alliance, Tom Lee, Visiting Nurses Association, American Red Cross, Gannon AIDS Action Team, Hospice of Erie and the Cathedral of Saint Paul.

This year's World AIDS Day theme was "Be a Force for Change." The purpose of this theme was to recognize the millions of young adults worldwide affected—directly and indirectly—by HIV/AIDS.

World AIDS Day this year served to increase understanding of the magnitude of the HIV/AIDS epidemic globally and the fact that the epidemic continues despite new hopes in treatment. Worldwide implementation of the theme promotes action and sound policies to prevent HIV transmission and minimizes the epidemic's impact on teenagers and young adults.

The AIDS pandemic has already resulted in the deaths of almost 11.7 million people worldwide. AIDS results from the last stage of infection with HIV. In adults, the onset can take up to 10 or more years. HIV is transmitted through the exchange of any HIV-infected body fluids. Transfer can occur during all stages of the disease.

HIV testing is available at the Eric County Department of Health – call 451- 6700 to arrange an appointment. Confidentiality is assured, and privacy is available for discussion.

Young adults are quickly becoming the most at-risk age group, now accounting for an estimated 50% of all new infections in the U.S. Keeping that in mind, the HIV/

AIDS Education & Training decided to hold a poster contest entitled "Draw the Face of AIDS"



1998: the year in review

Our local GLBT community can look back on 1998 as a quite eventful year.

Beginning in February, local ecumenical Christian group Be Ye Kind One To Another (BYKOTA) began actively meeting. There had not been an active group serving the needs of Christians in our community since Integrity became dormant. In January, many local people gathered together to begin work on several projects. The group eventually chose the name Erie Community Pride Organization (ECPO) and they went on to take over organizing the annual Pride Picnic (which has been around since 1992) and Erie's very first Pride Rally on October 10. The group also organized some more modest social events. The kick-off meeting for the upcoming year, which is open to anyone interested in working on a project/projects, will be on Saturday, February 6th at Blasco Memorial Library at 2 PM. For the first time, Erie has a local GLBT Pride store to call its own! Ross and his partner Jeff opened Scapers ar 2508 Peach Street in late February. The store is open Thursdays and Fridays from 5 - 9 PM and Saturdays and Sundays from noon to 5 PM. Their web site is http://www.scapers.com, email is scapers@scapers.com and their phone is 456-7002. They are currently exploring a community resource center, and are looking for materials the centers and a PC and printer have already been donated.

In late March, local gay bar Lizzie Bordon's closed its doors and reopened as the Village at 18th and State on April 1. The site of the former bar is now a showroom for Munn's furniture. The other Erie bar, Embers was sold to new owner Bob Regan the end of November who renamed the bar the Zone. Ashtabula's gay bar, The Leeward Lounge was sold by its owners, the parents of Ellen Beitel. The bar seems to no longer be gay.

The Mercyhurst Gay Straight Alliance (GSA) was organized as an official student group by student government. The vote was about 40 in support with 4 ab-

staining. They had a very successful panel discussion in April as part of Mercyhurst's Academic Festival. Mercyhurst had an unofficial student group about 5 years before that for a year and a half. This leaves Gannon University as the only area college/university with no officially recognized student group.

Long time gay favotite testaurant la bella bistro closed its doors at the end of February, but owner Harry Miller was able to have one last Gay Valentines Day Dinner for our community. Tapas Bodega was considering continuing this fine tradition as of this writing.

Local entertainment magazine Pure Entertainment began running an anonymous columnist "Big Mo Freakey" in February, who wrote supposedly humorously-intended off-the-wall hateful comments, many of them anti-gay. An example: "...the only thing equal to the number of fags in Erie is the number of whores." After many people protested, several local distributors ceased carrying the publication. Pure Entertainment has recently begun carrying the column again. Big Mo Freakey is still being his rude self, but he has not specifically targeted gay people. He has continued to target women and other groups.

The Times-News began including same sex personals in their Rendez-Vous ads in May. This was not technically prompted by an organized action at that time period, but it may possibly have been the result of people making requests and complaining about the previous policy of not publishing same-sex personals. Long time WFLP 1330-FM right wing talk show host Pat Campbell had his show cancelled in late April. Station manager said the cancellation was due to talk radio moving away from "conservative shtick" Pat Campbell had ridiculed the float sponsored by the GLBT community in Erie's 1995 Bicentennial Parade for about a week. He also continued to insult specific members of the gay community as well as the GLBT community as a whole during his on-air stint at WFLP.

ECPO did a pretty good job of running the annual Pride Picnic the 2nd Saturday in June at Presque Isle Beach 11. There was a great turnout and folks had a good time playing volleyball, having a cook out and participating in the annual Family Portrait. New to this year was a contest to choose a logo for ECPO, which was se-

lected by anonymous vote by attendees. The winner was none other than *EGN* co-editor Micheal Miller, who promptly donated the \$200 prize money back to ECPO and the dinner for 4 to the first runner up. Both prizes were generously donated by Tapas Bodega. The annual family portrait had even more people than the previous year. Jeff Hill made a very nice banner with the new logo and a contingent from Erie marched with it in the Cleveland Pride Parade a few weeks later. The banner was also displayed at the Pride Rally in October.

For the second time, an Interfaith Pride Service was held the day after the picnic at the UU. Participating were Rev. Terry Kime, Sue Beats, Jan, Lisa, Sr. Mary Louise St. John and Elaine Hill.

In mid-September, a local man's scheme to put on a fraudulent "Cruise for Life" was discovered and charges were filed with the police. The 2 HIV/AIDS organizations that were supposed to have been the beneficiaries were as much the victims of this scheme as were the people who purchased tickets. Gladly, they continue to do excellent work for the HIV/AIDS affected community. A warrant has been issued for the man's arrest and he was last heard of in the Cleveland area.

Erie's first Pride Rally, held on Saturday, October 10 in Perry Square from noon to 4 PM was a smashing success! Over 300 people attended an uplifting and positive event. All 3 local TV news outlets and the Erie paper covered the event. There were many speakers representing a number of viewpoints. President Clinton sent an openly gay Presidential appointee from Washington DC to read an address. Erie City Councilwoman Rubye Jenkins-Husband spoke to TV-24 news to express her support for diversity at the Rally. Also speaking were a representative from US Congressmember Phil English, and Erie County Councilwoman Joy Greco. Among the legislators sending in letters of greeting or otherwise recognizing the event were Gov. Tom Ridge, US Sen. Arlen Specter, State Sen. Jane Earll, State Rep. Italo Cappabianca, and State Rep. Linda Bebko Jones (who also sent a Legislative Acknowledgment.)

In response to the tragic murder of Matthew Shepard, local student group Identity organized a candlelight vigil. BYKOTA organizer Sue Laurie spoke and her partner Julie performed on the guitar. It was a deeply human reaction to a senseless tragedy. About 70 people attended.

A support group for the Catholic parents of gay children called "Always Our Children" began meeting in the

fall. They are named for the recent Bishop's pastoral letter. They meet the 1st & 3rd Wednesdays from 7 to 9 PM at Catholic Charities. Call (814) 456-2091 for more info

Local theatre troupe the Roadhouse Theatre for Contemporary Arts put on a production of *The Rocky Horror Show*, which contains many GLBT themes and characters. Our community went as a semiofficial group on November 20 and were welcomed by theatre manager Scott McClelland.

The KKK came to Erie and held at rally on the Courthouse steps the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Citizens Against Racism in Erie (CARE) held a peaceful alternative called "Unity in Our Community" the same day at Mercyhurst College. Among the speakers was local gay man Michael Mahler.

Local playwright Rita Kilbane compiled 5 of her one act plays dealing with HIV/AIDS, from which a cutting was performed at the Erie Pride Rally, into a fund-raising performance entitled "Passion for Life." The play benefited Friends from the Heart and was performed at Directors Circle Theatre, who donated the space. Co-directing were Gary Snyder and Heather Malobisky, Rita's partner.

Here's to 1998 and looking forward to 1999!

Since his arrest and outing, the pop singer/songwriter has enjoyed more *radio* exposure, anyway, than he has in years.

Awards, awards...

Elton John is one of the nominees this year for alltime favorite musical performer for The People's Choice Awards airing January 10th on CBS. The following night you can watch Whitney Houston open the 26th annual American Music Awards on ABC, which will include performances by Garth Brooks, the Backstreet Boys and Cher, among a host of others.

Word is that out British actor **Sir lan McKellan** is a favorite for the Oscars this March for his role in **Gods and Monsters**. He's already received best actor nods by the National Board of Review, (which also picked G&M as best film), and the Los Angeles Film Critics Association. Both McKellan and the film have been nominated for Golden Globe Awards which will air January 24 on NBC. If you haven't seen the film, McKellan gives a fascinating if slightly mad portrayal of *Frankenstein* director James Whales' relationship with his gardener (played by hunky **Brendan Frasier**). Co-star **Lynn Redgrave** is also up for a Golden Globe as best supporting actress.

Reel Time*, by Julia Willis (Alyson Books, \$11.95), offers "a fabulously comic novel on love, art, old movies, and wild women." If you just want to look at the pictures, try *LaChapelle Land*, by David LaChapelle (Simon and Schuster, \$50), for the out gay photog's more-colorful-than-real-life studies of more-colorful-than-real-life personalities like Leonardo DiCaprio and Madonna.

For the gay man between relationships, there's *Husband Hunting Made Easy and Other Miracles for the Modern Gay Man*, by Patrick Price (St. Martin's Griffin, \$12.95). Web aficionados will want to browse through the latest edition of *Gay and Lesbian Online: Your Indispensable Guide to Cruising the Queer Web*, by Jeff Dawson (Alyson Books, \$17.95).

This month in GLBT history

1993

The then Erie Gay Community Newsletter was first published in a format roughly similar to what you now hold in your hands, reporting news and events of GLBT interest in the greater Erie area. That premier edition was launched by the hard work of members of a coalition of many area groups called Bridges and monies collected from that group's first GLBT dance, not to mention the support of many other contributors, advertisers and, of course, readers.

Previous to that, EGCN was only a single sheet that listed local resources printed by a local gay man named Nikita. Today, even our *abbreviated* list of resources covers more than three pages.

Thanks to all the people who have made EG(C)N possible over years. Here's to another 6 (and many more) years growth and increasing visibility for Erie's GLBT community!

1995

The American Medical Association's governing body issued a report recommending against trying to 'cure' gay men and lesbians with therapies purporting to somehow 'change' them into heterosexuals. In the report, the AMA pointed out that the special problems that gay men and lesbians faced were due to an unaccepting society, and that therapists would be of greater support by giving "nonjudgemental recognition of sexual orientation."
