Valentines Day

One out of every 20 Americans will contract an STD this year—that's 12 million Americans. Once you know the facts, why would you take a chance?

Speaking of love and romance in February, because it will soon be Valentine's Day, be careful of what you do this year with your Valentine. Some STD's will love you for life.

Herpes has no cure, it loves you for life. Herpes is a viral infection that is transmitted through direct contact



with a sore, but can be transmitted when any body surface, such as a hand, makes contact with a herpes sore and then transfers the virus to the mouth or genitals. Approximately 500,000 cases of genital herpes are diagnosed every year in the United States. There is no cure.

HIV has no cure, it loves you for life. Don't risk it. An estimated 1 out of every 250 Americans is infected with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. HIV is a viral infection that is transmitted through blood, semen and vaginal fluids. HIV attacks and destroys the immune system. In the early stage, there are no symptoms. As the virus attacks the body, flu-like symptoms develop. In the last stage, various diseases (opportunistic infections) take over your body due to a weakened immune system. A person with HIV can live from several months to 10 years before developing AIDS. AIDS is always deadly and there is no cure. There is treatment, through medication, but no cure.

Syphilis is still hanging around. With the exception of HIV, syphilis is the deadliest STD and one of the oldest known human diseases. More than 115,000 new cases of syphilis occur in the United States each year. Early signs and symptoms of syphilis are mild or not even noted and will disappear without treatment. Second and third stage syphilis can have life-threatening results. It can attack the heart, arteries and the brain. At this final stage, syphilis is incurable and fatal.

Don't become a statistic. Avoid the risky behaviors of having unprotected sex or sharing drug needles and syringes. Use a latex condom during sex to help reduce the risk of STD and HIV infection. You can't tell by looking at someone whether or not they are infected with HIV or another STD. The safest behaviors are waiting to have sex with a lifelong, faithful, uninfected partner and avoid intravenous drug use. "Luv Carefully!"


Gift giving



Michael dithers


I opened the mail recently to see the cover story of *The Advocate* be about Nathan Lane officially coming out (finally!) It is part of an interesting trend. Lane said that he wasn't really closeted and he figured everyone already knew. Tommy Tune said some similar things, as did Michael Stipe. Nathan Lane said that the brutal murder of Matthew Shepherd moved him to finally say publicly what he figured many already knew.

I know some people who figure that their families, friends or co-workers probably have guessed their story, so why say anything when everybody knows?

Our lives do make a difference. Being honest makes a difference. True sometimes people fear losing their jobs, families and friends and sometimes with very good reason

Micheal and I have been getting our hair cut at a salon run by two straight women for a few years now. One of them was telling us a few months ago about two friends (1 male and 1 female), both of whom she was pretty sure were gay. She was perplexed that they hadn't confided in her. We suggested that she ask each of them about the other one as a way to bring the subject up and show that she was cool. She did talk with the guy, but he didn't volunteer any info. I think she felt sad or maybe hurt that he would keep this from her.

I know that each of us needs to make decisions in our own time, but sometimes we aren't as much in the closet as we think we are. Sometimes there is just as much anxiety on the other side of the closet door about discussing the issue. Sometimes by coming out, you send the message that you trust and care about a person enough to share the truth with them. Then you can laugh together about how anxious you both felt.



Let us know...

You may have noticed the Resource Directory is abbreviated this month. It has occurred to us lately that much of the information contained in the resource directory is pretty static and probably doesn't get looked at too much except by those who have just come out or moved to Erie. It has also occurred to us lately that publishing 3-1/2 pages of the same information that most people probably don't read every month is probably an unnecessary expense. It costs a fair amount of money to print the *EGN* and we think it would be preferable to put as much timely information in it as possible.

We are trying to decide what makes the most sense. We can run the full Resource Directory every month as we have been for the past few years, which is expensive and difficult to keep up to date. Or we can run an abbreviated listing like you see on the next page every month, and maybe publish a separate Resource Directory annually or something. Or we can stop printing any directory at all in the newsletter and just send out copies when we get inquiries. The full list of resources is always available on our web site and we always include contact information whenever we list a group meeting in the Calendar.

We would like some feedback on what folks read and use in *EGN*. Our guiding philosophy has been that the most important items to include are those that are GLBT-specific, timely and local (defined as the greater Erie area, including Cleveland, Pittsburgh and Buffalo). Our top priority is getting in news about upcoming events that people can participate in. Would you agree with that or not?

What do you read when you pick up an EGN? The Calendar? Local News? Entertainment Notes/Q-List? Michael Dithers? Also, what don't you read or feel shouldn't be in the newsletter? What you have to say about what goes in EGN means a lot to us.

Take our TV listings for an example. It takes a while to look through all the general TV listings to pick out the gay stuff. We usually can't get those listings until the end of the month so we always have to do it last minute. Do you or does anyone you know really make a point of reading our TV listings and then watching those shows? If so, then it's worth the effort. If not, then we'll stop running them.
