



LGLV and TRIPAC combine to create lesbigay political powerhouse

The League of Gay and Lesbian Voters (LGLV), Pennsylvania's legislative advocates for the lesbigay community, and TRIPAC, Southwestern Pennsylvania's lesbigay Political Action Committee, have combined to form Pennsylvania's first statewide lesbigay PAC.

The new PAC, the Gay and Lesbian Voters' PAC (GLV-PAC), will combine TRIPAC's track record of raising money fot, and contributing to, pro-lesbigay candidates with LGLV's existing statewide network of contacts and supporters, making the new organization the first true statewide lesbigay PAC in Pennsylvania's history.

GLV-PAC will also better allow for the integration of electoral functions with LGLV's legislative and research functions, and result in a more aggressive, and effective, effort to bring about fair treatment for lesbigay people in the state of Pennsylvania.

GLV-PAC will principally operate in two ways: by providing money to campaigns it supports, and by directing volunteers to those campaigns. It will also find and support viable candidates to run against incumbents who have a history of anti-lesbigay positions and activity.

A statewide PAC has been sorely needed. The Pennsylvania General Assembly, especially the House, remains hostile towards the lesbigay community. "To stop the flow of hostile legislation, and to make the General Assembly more receptive to proposals to bring about fair treatment for lesbigay people, some House cleaning needs to be done," said the GLV-PAC president Chris Young. "GLV-PAC will help us do that. When GLV-PAC makes its impact on elections, LGLV's legislative work will be much easier to accomplish."

The boards of LGLV and TRIPAC are being combined to form a new board which will govern both LGLV and GLV-PAC. TRIPAC itself will dissolve.

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HIV/AIDS news

World AIDS Day – December 1

HIV - by the year 2000, over 40 million people will be infected with the virus. "AIDS – End the Silence, Listen, Learn and Live"

In 1981 a young gay man died of PCP-Pneumocystitis Carinii Pneumonia, a rare form of pneumonia. PCP is known as an opportunistic infection. His death was determined to be from this opportunistic infection due to a severely compromised immune system. Today we call that a diagnosis of AIDS. More people came forward with rare forms of opportunistic infections. They died. This was the birth of AIDS.

Following research by Dr. Luc Montagnier and Dr. Robert Gallo, the virus was named HIV – Human Immunodeficiency Virus. Following a misnomer of GRID – Gay-Related Immune Disorder, the Centers for Disease Control renamed the diagnosis AIDS – Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

We found out about AIDS before HIV. Medical personnel started to take a second look at the basics of the immune system. Research teams began to study the HIV genetic structure. Everyone was in search of a vaccine.

Educators started to look for a causal effect, and they found two answers. There is a direct relationship of HIV to drugs / alcohol. There seemed to be a specific correlation of users to HIV infected individuals. Second, unprorected sexual activity transmitted the virus through vagical and seminal fluids.

Drug and Alcohol Services and HIV/AIDS groups both grew out of grass roots organizations. "ACT UP" and "GAY MENS HEALTH CRISIS" became involved by rolling up their sleeves and immediately going to work educating people about this virus.

Nineteen years later, we are still in search of answers. We are still hoping for a cure. We are still educating people about HIV infection and AIDS. We know three things:

1. HIV is not a death sentence – people are living longer with HIV and avoiding a diagnosis of AIDS. They are taking medications, which prolong their lives, boost their immune systems and lower the viral load in their system.

- 2. AIDS can be prevented, it's not who you are but what you do that puts you at risk for HIV infection. Choices affect HIV risk. We always know what the right choice is, but we do not always choose the right way.
- AIDS is not over. We still need to get out the message to the masses of people worldwide – 6 billion of us now.

WORLD AIDS DAY in Erie is a day to reflect on a global epidemic. It is a day of observance, remembrance and awareness of HIV/AIDS in our community. It is affecting our mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters, friends and neighbors. It is affecting blacks, whites, Latinos, Asians, Europeans. It cuts across all socioeconomic boundaries.

This year, the Erie County Department of Health will observe World AIDS Day with a remembrance in the East Park of Perry Square, Wednesday, December 1st, beginning at 5:00 p.m.

Once again this year as we have done in the past, we will commemorate persons who have died of AIDS by hanging red ribbons on the "Tree of Hope", following with a candlelight vigil from the East Park to the West Park Gazebo where a short program will be held.

The program will begin with County Executive Judy Lynch issuing a proclamation of World AIDS Day. There will be students from area schools to present oral and written messages on HIV risk prevention and artistic impressions of AIDS. A person living with AIDS will discuss issues and effects of the disease and a local religious representative will deliver a message of hope and inspiration.



A response and a challenge

I'm sorry, but I could not let this just go by without saying something. I'm always glad to hear of straight allies who enjoy the newsletter and, believe it or not, I welcome criticism, even when it's not very positive, because it lets me know that people are at least paying attention. But I found the above comments completely out of line. "Pornographic?" Not "woman-friendly?" and "Especially the October issue?!"

I read this letter while eating tabouleh and hummus just after watching 2 Girls Alone perform at the Pride Rally, so I was feeling pretty "woman friendly" at that particular moment if I may be forgiven for catering to a stereotype. I've been called an "honorary lesbian" by some because of my appreciation of women's films and music, and I even like Audre Lorde, but I still am a gay man with a gay man's penchant for sexual innuendo, so I immediately pulled out a copy of October's issue and looked at all the articles, submissions and bylines to see if this reader might have a point. Hmm. A thank you from Directors Circle, a letter and an article on the future of WOMYNSPACE, an update on Partners gay-straight alliance and PFLAG, a plea for contributions to Friends From the Heart, articles about the Walk Against Domestic Violence and the performance of The Second Coming of Joan of Arc at HAG Theatre. Almost all were by women, at least 2 of whom identified as straight. None of them "geared towards male sex habits" at all. Now I was becoming agitated by this reader's comments.

All that remained was the Q-list and ManSEX 101. Aha! Yes, October's Q-list included a nod to the newish polyurethane condom and an editorial comment by me about increased reports of HIV infection from "lower risk" sex activities. It also included my gushing review of the British TV series *Queer As Folk* and its frank portrayal of gay male characters. Aha! Only thing is, much of the rest of the Q-list was dedicated to things of interest to women or general audiences, like Melissa Etheridge's and Queen Latifah's shows, the Indigo Girls' great new album and the Holly Hughes performance in Cleveland. And I gushed just as much about the frank and fun por-




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trayals of lesbian, straight and transsexual characters in *Better Than Chocolate* in the previous month's issue. So, what gives?

ManSEX 101. Aha! Sounds like the name of a gay porno, huh? There was an ad on page 3, a brief snippet on page 10, and listings peppered throughout the Calendar. Funny thing is, ManSEX 101 was/is actually "a series of fun and informative discussion groups for men dealing with issues including sex (AND) relationships, self-esteem, physical health and safety." (My emphasis). This was and is an admirable HIV/AIDS prevention and information outreach sponsored by AIDS Community Services and Interweave of New York State. And the titillating way that they advertised it, I think, could only have helped make it more attractive and therefore more successful in reaching its target audience - men who have sex with other men. I had a couple of people ask about it at the Pride Rally.

I ask the reader, if your tax dollars were being used to fund a healthy eating program among teens and twenty-somethings to reduce the risks of obesity, diabetes, cancer and heart disease in later life, would it make sense to have a campaign showing 60 year olds suffering from all the terrible diseases that might happen if you



contrast camera ready black and white to reproduce. No faxes, please. We can also help lay out your ad for you. Call Michael at 456-9833. eat wrong with a stern voice-over by a doctor admonishing to "Just Say No" to fatty, salty, sugary foods? It didn't work for Nancy Reagan. Wouldn't it make more sense to have a campaign entitled "Sumptuous Cooking for Health" with a couple of fit, smiling 20 year olds eating delicious looking foods? I know which campaign I would find more cost effective for my tax dollar.

I also challenge the reader to look at ANY ostensibly "straight" magazine, whether it be Time, Rolling Stone, or Woman's Day. I'll give you a dollar if you can find even ONE that doesn't have a depiction of "straight sex habits" in any of its advertising. The same goes for every billboard with a cigarette ad and every prime time television show, and every social conversation for that matter. Try listening to a straight conversation for five minutes without hearing "so how's your wife/husband/girlfriend/boyfriend?" How do you think it makes a gay person feel to be bombarded every minute of the day by all that straight sexuality when even a few instances of gay sexuality are declaimed as "pornographic"? Take a look around and think about it. Why does a single kiss between men shock and upset, when it goes happily on between men and women, very publicly, without a second thought?

This is a news magazine with information targeted towards gays, lesbians, bisexuals, transgendered people, their family, friends, supporters and straight allies. You've got to expect to see SOME gay male content. We try to be as evenhanded as we can, but may not always succeed. At least we make the attempt. I wish we could have greater input from ALL of the sexes, including transgender. Our biggest concern when Deb left the area and could no longer serve as principal writer, was that we were losing a woman's point of view, but, to let out an amusing secret, most of the sex-positive articles and titillating condom ads that appeared in these pages over the years were written or conceived by Deb anonymously because she was concerned that gay men would have a problem with a woman talking about such matters. Ironic when the shoe is on the other foot, isn't it?

I hope you're still listening, because this has not been intended to bash you, the reader, or straight allies in general, but to provoke you to recognize that gay people deserve to enjoy the same rights to express their sexuality as straight people do - no more and no LESS.

Journey to a Hate Free Millennium is the title of the recently released documentary of Matthew Shepard and two other hate-crime victims, James Byrd, Jr., and Rachel Scott. Producers/directors Brent Scarpo and Martin Bedogne have not only captured the heart-wrenching pain felt by the surviving friends and family, but the hope they have for a future where hate no longer fuels such tragic violence. The film will probably run to a pretty limited release, but a shortened educational version is planned to be released on video. If you hurry to the movie theaters, you can see the much praised telling of another tragedy - **Brandon Teena**, the Nebraska transgendered youth killed for "posing" as a male. **Boys Don't Cry** is no glitzy Hollywood romanticization. It's a no holds barred telling of the horrific murder, with **Hilary Swank** so believable as Teena that you'll find it difficult to remember that this is a fictionalized account. **Lana Tisdale**, Teena's real-life girlfriend (played by **Chloe Sevigny**), is threatening to sue distributer **Fox-Searchlight Pictures** because her revelation of Teena's real gender is portrayed in the movie as the instigating cause of the murder.

From the bigotry of 1990's Nebraska to the bigotry of 1670's England... Pittsburgh's City Theatre will be presenting *Compleat Female Stage Beauty* which dramatizes the hate faced by Ned Kynaston, the last great male actor to play female parts on the English stage before such practice was declared illegal by royal decree. Kynaston went literally overnight from being celebrated as one of the great actors of his time to being beaten and reviled as a freak. ...*Beauty* will play through November 14th at the City Theatre, 57 S. 13th Street in Pittsburgh, Tuesdays-Fridays at 8:00, Saturdays at 5:30 and 9:00, and Sundays at 2 PM. Back to movies, there's **Three to Tango**, a bit of fluff with **Matt Perry** trying to pull off the, "Haha, I get to spend time with the girl (**Neve Campbell**) because everyone thinks I'm gay, haha," plot-twist made so tiresome in the 70's by **Three's Company**. Watch for **Oliver Platt** to steal every scene he's in as the business partner who actually *is* gay.

In limited release the Swedish import **Show Me Love** shows us all the ups and downs of lesbian love among teenagers in a small town. Love first unrequited, only to emerge in backseat fumblings, be turned away again due to fear of ridicule, and eventually embraced in what amounts to a real coming of age. An old story, but rarely so well told.



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American Beauty in wide release as of this writing can probably still be found at dollar-theaters by the time you read this. In it you will find a dark and surprising look at suburban somnambulism what it sometimes takes to break that stupor and discover happiness, and beauty. **Scott Bakula** and **Sam Robards** play a happily out gay couple early on, but look for another subplot involving a man-to-man kiss to exert a major impact upon the climax of the film.

TV and video

Apparently **Peewee Herman** has his career back in, um, hand. The ultimate victim of the victimless crime has signed on as the host of a new TV game show based on the very popular computer trivia game "**You Don't Know Jack.**" In the same spirit of Comedy Central's Make Me Laugh the show will focus more on silly paroxysms of goofiness than on taut battles of wits. Look for the offbeat comedian's TV comeback in syndication.

Music

Okay, it may be a little late unless you're picking up this issue on Halloween weekend, but if you want to sit by the fire and read some ghost stories with a *pink* flashlight pointed at your face, then try **The Ghost of Carmen Miranda and Other Spooky Gay and Lesbian Tales** (Alyson \$11.95) edited by **Julie K Travelyan** and **Scott Brassart**. It's a collection of sometimes scary sometimes funny spook tales with a decidedly gay spin. Men with a sense of the macabre and just the slightest touch of the erotic can also look through **Jeffrey N McMahan**'s **Somewhere in the Night** (Alyson, \$9.95) which features tales of ghosts, goblins, vampires, and occasionally even gay men that, um, go bump in the night.

For women who may want to go bump in the night, there's Felice Newman's The Whole Lesbian Sex Book : A Passionate Guide for All of Us (Cleis, \$16.95) just out in paperback and Lip Service (Alyson, \$12.95) edited by Lambda Literary Award winner Jess Wells, featuring erotic stories from some of the hottest, brightest lesbian authors around like Wendy Caster, Anne Seale and Karen X. Tulchinsky, Speaking of Karen Tulchinsky, for Jewish lesbians who want to go bump in the night, too, she has edited a compilation of short stories entitled Friday the Rabbi Wore Lace: Jewish Lesbian Erotica (Clcis, \$14.95). And if that doesn't pack enough hot chutzpah to make a steamy Jewish goyl out of even the most gentile of shiksehs, then try reading a different story from Marcy Sheiner's The Oy of Sex (Cleis, \$14.95) every day of Hanukkah

The Survivor's Guide to Sex: How to Have an Empowered Sex Life After Child Abuse (Cleis, \$21.95) by Staci Haines helps women of all persuasions with some very real ghosts in their closets learn to accept and celebrate themselves as sexual beings. And Women on the Verge: Lesbian Tales of Power and Play (St. Martin's Press, \$13.95) edited by Susan Fox Rogers looks at stories of peak experiences that are not necessarily sexual, but very lesbian and self empowering.

Men looking for a by turns exciting and disturbing tale of raw sexuality from an *institution* among gay story tellers, sink your teeth into **John Rechy**'s newest novel **The Coming of the Night** (Grove Press, \$24). It promises to be every bit as controversial as his debut classic **City of Night**. For a more madcap romp through the mistaken mores of a sleepy New England town, check out **William Corlett's Two Gentlemen Sharing** (Alyson, \$12.95).
