On Wednesday, April 18, students in every grade participated in the National Day of Silence at McDowell High School. This year, over 300 students in grades nine through 12 took a vow of silence.

The Day of Silence is a student-led day of action where people who support making anti-LGBT bias unacceptable in school are silent for a day. Participants include LGBT students and their supporters.

The Gay-Straight Alliance at school organized the event, like it does every year. I am the President but could not have set everything up by myself. I had the help of my co-officers in order to make the day as successful as we could. Last year, there were just over 250 participants. This year, there were over 300 participants. I achieved my goal for participation for the event this year. Although I will not be at McDowell next year, nor will I be presiding over the GSA, I set the goal at 350 students for the 2008 Day of Silence.

I am confident in the support of our students. There is no doubt in my mind that the number of supporters will grow each year. Discrimination against LGBT people is becoming more unacceptable everyday. People are not sitting by and letting it happen. They are taking action to help ensure that one day it will cease to exist.

Gay Rights Group Launches Campaign Against Religious Right

In an effort to prevent religious conservatives from pressuring presidential candidates to oppose gayrights issues, LGBT advocates have launched a campaign to challenge the far right in the early primary and caucus states.

Faith In America, the group heading the campaign, is focusing on Iowa, South Carolina, New Hampshire and Nevada. The group's goal is to set the tone for the presidential campaign and not cede the debate to the religious right.

"The end point will be when we have various religious leaders not trying to intimidate various presidential candidates," said Mitchell Gold, head of the group

The group plans a town hall meeting in Ames, IA on May 31, with similar efforts planned in the other early-voting states. To get their message out to the voters, the group plans grassroots organizing, direct mail and paid advertisements in traditional media in those states.

Iowa, the first caucus state, has dealt with several gay issues this year. During the recent legislative session, Iowa lawmakers worked to protect students from being bullied because of their sexual orientation, and they added gays and lesbians to the list of people protected under the state's civil rights laws.

Steve Scheffler, head of the Iowa Christian Alliance, said his group would continue letting candidates know it opposed expansion of gay rights.

Expanded Hate Crime Bill Protects LGBT Individuals

The U.S. House of Representatives has voted to expand federal hate crime categories to include violent attacks against gays and people targeted because of gender. Similar legislation is being considered in the U.S. Senate but the White House is already threatening to veto the measure.

The House bill, which passed by a vote of 237-180, would also make it easier for federal law enforcement agencies to take part in or assist with local prosecutions involving bias-motivated attacks. Locally, Congressman Phil English of Erie voted for the bill while Congressman John Peterson of Pleasantville opposed it.

"This is an important vote of conscience, of a statement of what America is, a society that understands that we accept differences," said House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer (D-MD).

The vote came after fierce lobbying from both civil rights groups, who support the measure, and social conservatives, who claim the bill threatens the right to express moral opposition to homosexuality.

In announcing its opposition, the White House said state and local laws already cover the new crimes defined under the bill and there was "no persuasive demonstration of any need to federalize such a potentially large range of violent crime enforcement."

"Our criminal justice system has been built on the ideal of equal justice for all," said Rep. Lamar Smith (R-TX). "Under this bill justice will no longer be equal, but depend on the race, sex, sexual orientation, disability or status of the victim."

In a parliamentary move that would have effectively killed the bill, Republicans tried to add seniors

and the military to those qualifying for hate crimes protection. That effort was defeated on a mainly partyline vote.

Under current federal law hate crimes apply to acts of violence against individuals on the basis of race, religion, color, or national origin. Federal prosecutors have jurisdiction only if the victim is engaged in a specific federally protected activity such as voting.

The House bill would extend the hate crimes category to include sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or disability and give federal authorities greater leeway to participate in hate crime investigations.

According to FBI statistics, there have been more than 113,000 hate crimes reported in the United States since 1991. Racially motivated bias accounted for 55 percent of those incidents, religious bias for 17 percent, sexual orientation bias for 14 percent and ethnicity bias for 14 percent.

McCain says Gay Troops Pose "Intolerable Risk"

In a letter to the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, U.S. senator and Republican presidential candidate John McCain said that gay troops pose "an intolerable risk" to national security.

"I believe polarization of personnel and breakdown of unit effectiveness is too high a price to pay for well-intentioned but misguided efforts to elevate the interests of a minority of homosexual service members above those of their units," McCain said in the April 16 letter to the group.

"Most importantly, the national security of the United States, not to mention the lives of our men and women in uniform, are put at grave risk by policies detrimental to the good order and discipline which so distinguish America's armed services."

McCain, who voted in favor of the current "don't ask, don't tell" policy when it was enacted in 1993, concluded that "I remain opposed to the open expression of homosexuality in the U.S. military."

"Senator McCain's comments are out of step with the overwhelming majority of the American people, and out of touch with the best interests of our armed forces," said Sharra Greer, the

Servicemembers Legal Defense Network's director of law and policy.

"Senator McCain's defense of this counterproductive law is disrespectful to the more than 65,000 lesbian and gay service members on duty today."

LGBT Rights Bills Becomes Law in Oregon

Oregon has joined a growing list of states offering same-sex couples some of the benefits of marriage.

The state's governor, Democrat Ted Kulongoski, has signed legislation creating domestic partnerships for same-sex couples in the state starting Jan. 1. He also signed a bill that outlaws discrimination based on sexual orientation, effective the same date.

In signing the bills, Gov. Kulongoski, said they would "transform our state from one of exclusion to one of complete inclusion."

The domestic partnership law will enable samesex couples to enter into contractual relationships that carry many of the benefits offered to married couples. The other law will ban discrimination against LGBT people in employment, housing and access to public accommodations.

To date, only Massachusetts allows same-sex couples to marry. Vermont, Connecticut, California, New Jersey, Maine and Washington have laws allowing either civil unions or domestic partnerships, and Hawaii extends certain spousal rights to same-sex couples and cohabiting heterosexual pairs.

The New Hampshire legislature recently passed a civil unions law that Gov. John Lynch, a Democrat, has said he will sign.

Immigration Equality Bill Introduced in Congress

Federal lawmakers have reintroduced a bill in Congress giving Americans with same-sex foreign partners equal rights under U.S. immigration law.

The Uniting American Families Act, sponsored by Rep. Jerrold Nadler (D-NY), and Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-VT), will allow citizens and legal residents in samesex relationships to sponsor their partners for immigration purposes.

According to Immigration Equality and the Human Rights Campaign, about 75 percent of the immigrant visas (Green Cards) currently in effect are issued to family members of U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Same-sex couples however, have no legal status under federal law.

"The promotion of family unity has long been part of federal immigration policy, and this bill promotes that principle by providing all Americans the opportunity to be with their loved ones," said Rachel Tiven, executive director of Immigration Equality.

A University of California study, based on the 2000 Census, reported that there are an estimated 35,820 bi-national same-sex couples in the United States.

"Our bill recognizes that American families come in all shapes and sizes," Rep. Nadler said. "Our laws should work to keep loving families together and not tear them apart."

At least 19 nations, including Great Britain, Brazil, Australia and most of Western Europe, provide some immigration benefits to the same-sex partners of citizens and permanent residents.

The Upper Room

I never really liked school. So, it surprised me when I finished four years of college and then three years of seminary. This was a cause for celebration but first I needed a little peace and quiet to let it all sink in.

I decided the best place to be alone with my thoughts was the chapel. However upon entering I soon decided this was *not* going to be the best place. There were people talking in the corner, the custodian was sweeping the floors and the chaplain was cleaning off the alter. Since this place was not going to work, I hurried across campus and found a little room under the stairs in the dorm where all was quiet and the noise of the world was locked out.

Life is like that. Those places and times we are certain should give us opportunity for spiritual rest and relaxation, turn out to be noisy and confused. Sometimes we have to find refuge in more unlikely places. This is the backdrop of the situation we read about in John, chapters 13-14. The sayings of Jesus that we read were said not in the Temple or even in a synagogue.

We might expect the words of Jesus to be said in some holy place or shrine since Jesus is after all, preaching a sermon. And its actually one of the most important sermons Jesus ever preached. But, he is not at a pulpit when preaching it. He is not even in a place of worship. He and his disciples are sitting at a dining room table.

More than once, in an upper room, Jesus told his disciples that they were not to be troubled. Even though fearful events were in the future, they were not to be alarmed because God was with them. So from that little room, that crowded space, that very ordinary situation, Jesus gave them big, great, reassuring, profound thoughts.

I was once asked a question that I could not answer. "Why were there synagogues in Jesus' day?" They had the Temple which was beautiful beyond description, with gold and silver and the wood. Then there were the synagogues dotting the countryside and they were anything but glamorous. They were small and homely in appearance compared to the Temple. So, why have them?

They served an important function in the everyday life of the Jewish believers in Jesus' day. They were little places; the gathering places where traveling rabbis were invited to pray and read scripture and preach.

Jesus knew that the Temple could be very noisy. When he went there to throw the money-changers out, they were shouting like carnival barkers eagerly trying to sell sacrifices to the bidders. It was exciting to worship in the Temple, but, sometimes you need the quiet, little, out-of-the-way synagogues to meditate and pray. Sometimes the little places off the beaten path is the place to meet God.

We must remember that Christianity began at little places like upper rooms, filled with little people who held everyday jobs in little towns much like Nazareth of Galilee. Our Christian faith takes place in the little places of the heart. It is in a small upper room that Jesus tells his disciples that the Holy Spirit will come upon them. The church celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost Sunday. It is not a glamorous place for the Holy Spirit to make its appearance, but, even Jesus' birth was not glamorous, occurring in an animal filled stable.

Jesus says that the Holy Spirit comes to teach us; to remind; and to give us peace. In other words, the Spirit of God touches us at the small places of our hearts. At those places where we need to be taught the challenges of God's love; that we love one another, even as God has loved us. The Spirit of God moves in the small places and challenges us in ordinary ways and tells us that our hearts need not be troubled either in life or death because God's Spirit comes to our aid no matter where we are.
