Openly Gay Jamestown NY City Council President Sworn In

Jamestown City Councilman Greg Rabb was sworn in as City Council President Jan. 1, becoming the first openly gay man to hold that post. He was unanimously selected to serve as president by his fellow council members.

In November, Rabb was elected as the first openly gay City Council Member at Large in Jamestown, running with the endorsement of the Democratic, Independence and Working Families parties. The Democrats currently enjoy a 7 to 2 majority on the Jamestown City Council.

Although this was Rabb's first win, he had run for office before, always as an openly gay man. After running for City Council the first time, he was a speaker at the first Erie Pride Rally in 1998.

In addition to serving at City Council President, the Mayor of Jamestown appointed Rabb to the Board of Public Utilities. Ex officio, he also become Vice Chair of the Urban Renewal Agency and Co-Chair of the Strategic Planning Commission.

The historic art deco theatre is located at 1 East First Street. Tickets available at the door: \$10 general admission; \$5 with student ID.

Brennet is a passionate and gifted performer who has been churning out powerful self-produced CDs about love and heartbreak, courage and individuality, in a wide range of styles, since 2002. She has honed her craft through hundreds of performances and thousands of miles on the road and shared the stage with the likes of Melissa Ferrick, Jill Sobule, Michelle Shocked and spoken-word artist Alix Olson.

Performing Songwriter Magazine wrote that "Brennet sings and plays with an intensity and intelligence that can't be ignored."

More than just a "Boy in a Dress," as one of her song titles suggests, Brennet's gorgeous arrangements and soulful voice are perfectly suited to make the acoustic magnificence of the Latonia's monumental and must-see-and-hear concert hall shine.

Have No Fear! Underdog is Here!



They seem to think that gay/lesbian people should not have the same opportunities and rights as other Americans.

The real underdog in our society is the person who is at a disadvantage in our society because he or she is discriminated against in some socially acceptable way. That would be the entire gay population.

In our enlightened society, gay people are often treated as second class citizens. Anyone who argues that point is either stupid or out of touch with mainstream America.

It is for that reason that the church, of all institutions, must take a stand against the many injustices that are directed toward gay people. It really is a matter of justice.

That was a message of peace?

Pope Benedict XVI observed World Peace Day (January 1) with a message in which he stated that same-sex marriage, birth control, and abortion are "obstacles" to world peace, on a level with nuclear proliferation, economic inequality and environmental destruction.

I am not a Catholic, but I am a peace activist, and I must say that this assertion holds no water, holy or otherwise. Regardless of how the Pope or the Church feel about same-sex marriage or reproductive issues, these issues have nothing to do with causing war. And scapegoating and demonizing others has nothing to do with peace.

Among the real threats to world peace are attitudes like intolerance toward the way others live and believe, the desire to impose one's own ways on others, and viewing differences as evil. Many of the wars and miseries of the Middle Ages were caused by the Church's intolerance toward often-minor differences. And though his predecessor John Paul II was no ally of progressive social issues like same-sex relationships, he embraced the world and promoted reconciliation; Pope Benedict XVI, on the other hand, has been outrageously intolerant and hurtful **toward those who are different**.

It is very uncomfortable for me to comment on the religion of another. But these statements and efforts affect us all. Conservative Catholics seem now to be feeling emboldened to fight against same-sex marriage and other issues that might allow GLBT people to feel like they are part of the human race. The unashamedly anti-gay sign that Sacred Heart put up over Thanksgiving was an example of this new boldness. I fear the bigoted among the faithful will now feel it is right and sanctioned to be as nasty as they want to be.

The high-level message of contempt for others also encourages intolerance and cultural misunderstandings in other areas. If the head of the Catholic Church pronounces other faiths and belief systems to be defective, it reverses efforts to try to build acceptance and understanding of differences.

And that truly is an obstacle to peace.

Aftermath of a Hate Crime

The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines hate crime as: any of various crimes (as assault or defacement of property) when motivated by hostility to the victim as a member of a group as one based on color, creed, gender, or sexual orientation.

Hate crimes occur when there is a lack of understanding about differences among individuals. When these issues are left unaddressed they may ultimately lead to a hate-centered act of violence. Hate crime can impact both the victim and the community.

Victims of hate crime may feel a sense of fear, vulnerability, distrust, hopelessness, humiliation or betrayal. Many victims of hate crime will never report to the police for fear of retaliation. In some cases the victim may suffer long-term psychological trauma. When a hate crime occurs, the community may feel wide-spread tension and fear of a copycat or reactive crimes. Members of the community who are similar to the victim may feel victimized or vulnerable themselves. Even community ties can be affected. Law enforcement relationships and cooperation can become very strained during the aftermath of a hate crime.

If you are or someone you know has been a victim of a hate crime, seek medical attention to ensure there are no injuries, call the police and report the crime and call Crime Victim Center of Erie County, Inc. at 814-455-9414. HRC Names Friendliest Workplaces

The 2008 list of "Best Places to Work for GLBT Equality" has been released by the Human Rights Campaign (HRC). Making this year's list are 195 U.S. companies, a 41 percent increase over last year.

Only companies that score 100 percent on the HRC's Corporate Equality Index, which measures company policies that regulate fairness and equality in the workplace, are named to the list. Among the companies listed are Disney, Google, US Airways, the New York Times Co., Ford, Nike and PepsiCo. New companies to achieve a perfect score this year include Mastercard Inc., J.C. Penney Co. Inc., Allstate Insurance Co. and Yahoo! Inc.

"Each of these companies is working hard to transform their workplaces and make them safer for millions of employees around the country," Joe Solmonese, HRC president, said in a written statement. "We can now say that at least 10 million employees are protected on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity on the job."

Binghamton, N.Y., City Council Gets Second Gay Member

An openly gay college professor has been sworn in as the second gay member of the seven-person City Council of Binghamton, N.Y.

Forty-one year old Democratic Sean Massey, a professor of human development at Binghamton University, was elected in November, defeating a Republican incumbent by just 12 votes to clinch the 5th District council seat. Massey joins Robert Weslar, the



1st District representative, as the second gay member of the council.

"I'm really excited about the opportunity that I have to represent the people of Binghamton," Massey told *The Advocate.* "There's a lot of work to do, but I feel like this election shows that the city's ready for a change."

Massey said it was remarkable for Binghamton, a city of about 50,000 people in a conservative part of upstate New York, to have two gay council members.

"Binghamton is a city of increasing social integration, appreciation and celebration," said Binghamton Mayor Matthew T. Ryan. "It is vital we recognize the LGBTQ community and show support for its members' rights and liberties as Americans."

Massey has written several articles on LGBT issues and was among the founders of the Binghamton Pride Coalition. He lives with his husband, Loren Couch (the two were married in Toronto) and their 5-year-old son, Alfie.

Episcopal leader defends gay bishops

Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori says her church has been unfairly singled out for criticism because it is honest about consecrating gay bishops.

In an interview with BBC radio, Jefferts Schori said that the Episcopal Church, which is the Anglican body in the U.S., is far from the only Anglican province that has a bishop with a same-sex partner. In 2003, Episcopalians elected the first openly gay bishop, V. Gene Robinson of New Hampshire, causing an uproar that has divided the Anglican community.

"He is certainly not alone in being a gay bishop; he's certainly not alone in being a gay partnered bishop," Jefferts Schori said in the interview. "He is alone in being the only gay partnered bishop who's open about that status."

The 77 million-member Anglican Communion is a global fellowship of churches that trace their roots to the Church of England. Most Anglicans are traditionalists who believe Scripture bars gay relationships. Liberal-leaning Anglicans believe the Bible's social justice teachings on acceptance should apply to same-sex couples.

The Episcopal Church in the United States

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has not developed an official public prayer to bless gay couples church-wide. However, Jefferts Schori and other Episcopal leaders acknowledge that such ceremonies take place. She noted that other Anglican churches do the same.

"Those services are happening in various places, including in the Church of England, where my understanding is that there are far more of them happening than there are in the Episcopal Church," Jefferts Schori said.

Fight Gay Rights by Buying Microsoft Stock, Pastor Urges

A conservative Christian pastor has launched a campaign to urge religious followers to buy Microsoft Corp. stock, in an attempt to force the company to "stop financing ungodly ventures."

The Rev. Ken Hutcherson, pastor of Antioch Bible Church in Microsoft's hometown of Redmond, WA, seeks to create a global and powerful group to promote traditional family values, including marriage exclusively between a man and a woman, and has created the AGN Financial Network to finance the effort. The worldwide venture asks people to buy three shares of Microsoft stock and donate one to AGN. Among the listed supporters are Richard Land of the Southern Baptist Convention and religious pundit Gary Bauer.

"We're not trying to hurt Microsoft or their shareholders, nor are we calling for a boycott of their products," volunteer spokesman Dennis Sullivan said. "We are trying to get Christians to buy their shares."

It's unclear what effect, if any, this initiative could have on the company. To gain a one percent stake in Microsoft, about 31 million people would each have to spend \$104 to buy three shares. Microsoft has about 9.36 billion outstanding shares, and its largest holder is Chairman Bill Gates, with 858 million shares, or 9 percent of the total.

At Microsoft's annual shareholder meeting in November, Hutcherson told the group that he was gathering evangelicals, Catholics, Jews and Muslims to challenge the company.

"I could work with you, or I could be your worst nightmare, because I am a black man with a righteous cause, with a host of powerful white people behind me," Hutcherson said.

Microsoft executives have publicly supported

gay rights legislation, and the company officially opposes discrimination based on sexual orientation. Microsoft shareholders have voted in favor of the company's nondiscrimination policy, General Counsel Brad Smith said.

The company was one of the first to offer employee benefits to same-sex domestic partners, according to its employee resource group GLEAM, which stands for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Employees at Microsoft. The group, founded in 1993, has more than 700 members.

"Our company policies are well-known and supported by over 97 percent of our shareholders when it was voted upon in a shareholder resolution, and we just have no comment on this (Hutcherson's campaign)," Microsoft spokesman Lou Gellos said.
