Rainbow Fest: A Celebration of Pride and Community



On the first and third Sunday of the month, you can find a group of fun, active, senior members of the LGBTQ+ community gathering as Aging With Pride – plannig social activities, outings and events, savoring delicious refreshments, and laughing and enjoying each other's company. Aging With Pride is an organization that was first formed in 2017 but had its rebirth after COVID in 2022. The group was founded by Dale Allgeier after he had become aware of the need for older LGBTQ+ community members to have a forum to connect, and plan and host social, recreational and educational activities and events.

Aging With Pride sponsors a monthly social dinner event during the last week of the month at a local restaurant. You can check the specific day and restaurant on our website aging with prideerie.org or on their Facebook page.

On the second Thursday of the month, from 5:00pm to 8:00pm, AWP hosts a game night at Werner Books. Also meeting at Werner Books is the Aging With Pride Book Club, which gathers on the third Saturday of the month at 1:00pm to discuss the selected book of the month.

Other events of Aging With Pride include day trips to regional pride events; museums and other attractions in nearby cities, movie nights, educational opportunities, and fund-raising events. These activities are discussed and organized during the Aging With Pride planning meetings held on the first and

Mayor Joe Schember on the LGBTQIA+ Community

Since I took office in 2018, my team and I have been on a Mission to Build Opportunity, Restore Hope, and Transform Erie. We have also been working hard to achieve our Vision. One element of that Vision is that we celebrate our rich cultural diversity. An important piece of that is ensuring that everyone feels welcomed and valued. Imagine what an incredible community we would have if everyone felt celebrated for the unique skills, talents, and perspectives that each one of us possesses regardless of who we love or how we identify or express ourselves.

My team and I have made it a priority to enact policies that are inclusive of all of our residents, including all who identify as members of the LG-BTQIA+ community. One measure of the city's progress and success in this area is the Human Rights



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Campaign's annual Municipal Equality Index (MEI). When I first took office, the city's score was only 34. I am happy to report that the city has received a perfect score (100 points) for the last three years, 2022-2024.

Through much deliberation and analysis of city laws and policies, my team and I, including the members of the City's first LGBTQ+ Advisory Council, were able to increase these scores in the following years, first to 50 in 2018, then to 75 in 2019, 80 in 2020, 86 in 2021, and finally achieving perfect scores in each of the last three years.

The first area we tackled was the "Municipality as Employer" section, on which Erie scored 0 out of 24 possible points in 2017. We were able to turn this score completely around by adopting a nondiscrimination policy in City government, providing transgender-inclusive healthcare benefits, adopting a city contractor non-discrimination ordinance, and creating an inclusive workplace.

The second great area of improvement was achieved under "Law Enforcement" by creating an LGBTQ+ Liaison in the Erie Police Department and reporting Hate Crimes Statistics on an annual basis to the F.B.I. Fulfilling these requirements allowed the City to gain an additional 22 points on the way to an overall perfect score.

The City of Erie also received bonus points for its Conversion Therapy Ban, our youth bullying prevention policy, and testing the limits of restrictive state laws.

The City of Erie has made great progress over the last seven years on our municipal policies, laws, and ordinances as reflected in our improved MEI Score. In fact, with all of our bonus points, our total score was 111 in 2024, but 100 is the maximum number of points awarded.

My team and I will continue to work on policies and initiatives to advance equity, equality, and inclusion of our LGBTQIA+ community members.

Admiral Rachel Levine and Adrian Shanker at 2025 PA LGBTQIA+ Health Summit

Allentown, PA Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center is proud to announce that Admiral (ret) Rachel Levine, MD and Adrian Shanker will be joining us as featured speakers at our 2025 PA LGBTQIA+ Health Summit on June 3rd at the Mack Experience Center. Dr. Levine served as the 17th U.S. Assistant Secretary for Health from 2021-2025 and upon her confirmation, became the first transgender person to receive U.S. Senate confirmation. She also served as Admiral of the United States Public Health Service. Previously, she served as Pennsylvania's Physician General and Secretary of Health.

Adrian Shanker founded Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center in 2014 and served as executive director until 2022. During that time, he cocreated with the Pennsylvania Department of Health the biannual Pennsylvania LGBTQ Health Needs Assessment. He most recently served as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Health Policy and Senior Advisor on LGBTQI+ Health Equity at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and previously served as Commissioner on the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission, where he was unanimously confirmed by the Pennsylvania State Senate.

This will be the first time the summit has been in person since the COVID-19 pandemic. We are excited to bring this statewide conference to Allentown for the first time to present the data collected from the 2024 PA LGBTQ+ Health Needs Assessment. This survey, taken by thousands of LGBTQIA+ Pennsylvanian's biennially, covers many aspects of health and well-being from mental health to tobacco use to basic needs.

The summit provides vital information to healthcare providers, public health professionals, and legislators. "Our Health Matters" is the sub-theme of the summit, presenters will cover a variety of topics that impact the health and wellness of the LGBTQIA+ community in Pennsylvania.

"The PA LGBTQ Health Needs Assessment and the PA LGBTQIA+ Health Summit are the legacy of our Center and would not be possible without the dedication of the Center's founding executive Director, Adrian Shanker. We are thrilled to have Adrian return to present at this year's Summit on the state of LGBTQIA+ health policy and how it is impacting the health of our community.

We are honored to have Dr. Levine join us to speak at the Summit as she has not only been a leader for health in the state of Pennsylvania as Secretary of Health and Physician General, but also for the nation at large having served as the 17th Assistant Secretary for Health in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services," said Krista Brown-Ly, Interim Executive Director at Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center.

Adrian Shanker commented, "I am excited to return to Allentown for the 2025 PA LGBTQIA+ Health Summit, an event that has historically brought together critical voices in medicine, public health, and human services to improve the quality of health for LGBTQIA+ Pennsylvanians. The difficult reality is that LGBTQIA+ people experience health disparities in almost all aspects of our lives, and its conferences like this one that give me hope for a future where LGBTQIA+ people achieve health equity in our lifetime."

"We invite professionals who wish to provide affirming care to the LGBTQIA+ community to register for our LGBTQIA+ Health Summit," added Chrystina Obleschuk, Director of Programs at Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center, "Registration is free however spots are limited!" Those who wish to register or learn more can do so on our webpage.

Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center is a radically inclusive Queer space based in the Lehigh Valley. Our Center fosters Queer joy & liberation. Prioritizing the most marginalized populations throughout Pennsylvania, we provide innovative programs, services, and experiences for our LGBTQ+ siblings through connection, education, culture and healing.

May 16th is National Honor Our LGBTQ+ Elders Day

National Honor Our LGBTQ+ Elders Day is Friday, May 16, 2025. Established in 2015 by Baltimore's Chase Brexton Health Services, National Honor Our LGBTQ+ Elders Day gained national recognition through social media and the numerous contributions made by LGBTQ+ seniors. There are approximately 2.7 million LGBTQ+ adults aged 50 and older in the United States.

National Honor Our LGBTQ+ Elders Day is an opportunity to recognize the contributions made by LGBTQ+ Elders in Erie and Northwestern Pennsylvania.

In 2023, a group of Erie LGBTQ+ elders identified a need and formed Aging with Pride (AWP) to support the aging LGBTQ+ population in Erie. Initially a social organization, AWP grew to incorporate a commitment to the greater Erie community through contributions to existing organizations. This small, but vibrant association includes former teachers, registered nurses, managers, therapists, federal employees, manufacturing employees, and carpenters.

Our members volunteer, supporting the arts and working to improve the quality of life in Erie. AWP members volunteer in community events to support Erie's homeless population such as Blizzard of Blankets and clothes/food pantry drives. Several members assisted at Voices for Independence's No Limits Adaptive Challenge. Members participated in intergenerational game night with youth at a local counseling center. AWP has active representation on the Independent Council for Aging and on the Greater Erie Community Action Committee which allows us to support broad initiatives.

LGBTQ+ older adults are at high risk for elder abuse, neglect, and exploitation due to factors such as social isolation, solo aging, past experiences with violence, harassment, and discrimination. AWP organizes social activities: dining at local restaurants and game nights to mitigate social isolation. There have been visits to art galleries in Cleveland and Pittsburgh. The group also schedules speakers on topics such as Medicare, which are of interest to all seniors.

Efforts have resulted in establishing relationships with other LGBTQ+ senior organizations in surrounding cities to share information and plan gatherings.

Since January 2025 a strong interest in establishing an formal archive to reflect the history of LGBTQ+ life in Northwestern Pennsylvania has evolved resulting in the collection of information and sources relevant to this goal.

We are Aging with Pride and Purpose in Erie and Northwestern Pennsylvania.

County Executive

Not Responding: Brenton Davis (R-Inc)

Nondiscrimination Policies Christina Vogel (D)

Ensuring Erie County implements and enforces nondiscrimination policies is fundamentally about opportunity and strengthening our local economy. As County Executive, I'll make sure every contractor working with the county follows strict nondiscrimination policies and that we're holding them accountable.

I'll push for stronger oversight, including regular audits and clear reporting requirements. Contractors need to show they're hiring and promoting fairly. If they're not, they shouldn't be doing business with the county. I'll also work hand in hand with the Human Relations Commission to make sure there's an easy, accessible way for workers to report discrimination -- without fear of retaliation.

Perry Wood (D)

As county executive, I believe every county

contract should reflect the basic principle that everyone deserves to be treated fairly and with respect.

Nondiscrimination isn't just the law, it's a reflection of our values.


Contractors doing business with the county should reflect the respect we expect in our public institutions which includes ensuring safe workplaces for LGBTQ+ people and holding vendors accountable if they fall short of those expectations.

Public dollars shouldn't support discrimination in any form, and I believe everyone regardless of who they are and who they love deserves to be respected and treated fairly. As County Executive, I will work to make sure that's not just a promise but a practice.

Cultural Competency Training Christina Vogel (D)

I do not specifically recall having ever participated in a focused LGBTQIA+ Cultural Competency Training, but I'm not at all opposed to such training.

As County Executive, I will focus on practical, job-specific training for staff to ensure respectful communication and fair treatment for all residents. For council members, we should emphasize how policies tackle bias and impact all Erie residents, including and especially the LGBTQIA+ community. I will seek to partner with local LGBTQIA+ organizations to make sure sessions are meaningful and relevant. Everyone deserves respect, and as County Executive, I'll make sure Erie leads with fairness and understanding.



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Perry Wood (D)

Cultural competency is an ongoing effort to ensure our government reflects the diversity of the people it serves. I support practical and thoughtful training for staff and council members alike.

For staff, training should cover respectful workplace practices and understanding of inclusive language. It should be accessible, engaging, and tailored as much as possible to ensure efficacy.

All elected officials can benefit from cultural competency training, myself included should I be elected, as it's imperative that elected officials understand the

real-world impact of their decisions on people of different identities which includes hearing directly from community members.

Partnering with local LGBTQ+ groups is key to this effort as they bring lived experience and credibility to make training meaningful.

Engagement Strategies Christina Vogel (D)

The best policies come from listening to the people they impact. That's why I'd make sure LG-BTQIA+ organizations and community members are part of the process every step of the way. I'd reinvigorate and work with the Human Relations Commission to create advisory panels and hold listening sessions. I'd also strengthen partnerships with local LGBTQIA+ groups to inform our work on important issues like healthcare and employment. My goal is to build a community where everyone feels respected and heard.

Perry Wood (D)

I believe all good policy starts with listening. In this case, it means creating consistent opportunities for dialogue about perspectives and priorities not just occasionally, but as a regular incorporation into county business. I would support regular engagement through listening sessions, advisory roundtables, and open forums.

Inclusion leads to better outcomes by helping us to avoid unintended consequences, building public trust, and creating policies that are more responsive than they are reactive. My goal is to lead a county that is thoughtful, transparent, and welcoming to all.

> Positively Influenced Christina Vogel (D)

For me, the influence of the LGBTQIA+ community is woven into the fabric of my everyday life. It's in the conversations I have with friends, employees, and customers who identify as LGBTQIA+, and the way we all support and uplift each other. It's in the policies and practices I ensure are inclusive and supportive at Donatos, creating a space where everyone feels valued. The LGBTQIA+ community is just one of many that shapes the culture of openness and acceptance that I strive to nurture, making it a seamless part of my everyday interactions. Donatos has sponsored events at Pride. Donatos has collaborated on many events with the Zone. Donatos has hired members of the LGBTQIA+ arts community for events year after year. Finally, Donatos has employed and currently employs members of the LGBTQIA+ community. The LGBTQIA+ community is simply a part of the larger Erie community, and it should always be included and respected, not othered.

Perry Wood (D)

I moved from Franklin, PA to Erie to go to Mercyhurst in 1997 and got my first job out of college in the early 2000s. A supervisor at that job was a gay woman who wasn't publicly out, and the conversation that we had about her sexuality and what that meant was life-changing for me as a small-town kid at a time when the topic was much more sensitive than it is now. It still sticks with me today as a reminder of how important it is to humanize the people and issues we are talking about.

Nondiscrimination Policies Jim Wertz (D)

The Pennsylvania Human Relations Act prohibits discrimination on the basis of employment, housing, and public accommodations based on an individual's race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, education status, handicap, or disability, but it does not cover sexual orientation, gender identity or expression. That's why it's essential that Erie County Council take an active role in enforcing and strengthening anti-discrimination policies to protect people from bullying and harassment, among other forms of discrimination. Cultural Competency Training Jim Wertz (D)

Those have included a LGBTQIA+ Safe Space certification, coordinating cultural competency trainings for students in the Honors Program, and annual gender and identity discrimination awareness training. I would be interested in similar trainings for county staff and council members – particularly safe space training for new staff and council members given the diverse interactions facilitated at the County Courthouse.



Nondiscrimination Policies Daria Devlin (D)

As Mayor, I believe taxpayer dollars should never fund discrimination — period.

I would ensure that every city contract includes clear, enforceable nondiscrimination language that protects against bias based on sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression, in line with Pennsylvania's Human Relations Commission policies. But words on paper aren't enough — enforcement matters.

I would require contractors doing business with the City of Erie to provide proof of their own nondiscrimination policies and create clear processes for accountability if those policies are violated. That includes training, regular reporting, and a willingness to end contracts with companies that refuse to uphold our values.

If we say we're a city for everyone, that has to show up everywhere — including in who we choose to do business with.

Joe Schember (D-Inc)

Thanks to the work of my team and our LG-BTQ+ Advisory Council, the City implemented a contractor nondiscrimination policy. This policy is now in all of our contracts. To assist with enforcing the policy, we have created the position of Community Development Specialist, which will reside within our Department of Economic and Community Development. Some of the responsibilities of this role include: coordinating contract monitoring and compliance reviews of construction projects; monitoring compliance with ADA regulations; coordinating and monitoring of the City's EEO plan for community development; providing timely reports to management and government agencies; conducting on-site monitoring at scheduled intervals; and maintaining a written record outlining the state and performance of projects as assigned. The position is being re-posted, and we will be working to hire someone within the next few weeks.

Sheila Ellyn Woeger (D)

Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is a federal law that Prohibits discrimination in employ-

ment based on race, color, religion, sex (including sexual orientation, gender identity, and pregnancy), or national origin. It also covers all aspects of employment, including hiring, firing, pay, job assignments, promotions, and benefits.

Discrimination of any kind will not be tolerated under my administration.

Cultural Competency Training Daria Devlin (D)

Throughout my career in public service I've participated in ongoing diversity, equity, and inclusion training, including training specific to gender identity, gender expression, and orientation. Cultural competency isn't a one time training — it's a commitment to listening, learning, and evolving every single day.

As Mayor, I will ensure that every City staff member — from department heads to frontline workers — receives LGBTQIA+ cultural competency training developed in partnership with local organizations who know this work best. But training alone isn't enough.

I'm committed to ensuring that our city's policies and practices reflect those same values — that inclusion isn't just something we talk about in a training, but something we live out in how we serve the public, how we treat one another at work, and how we respond when harm happens.

For City Council members, I would recommend training that goes deeper — not just into LGBTQIA+ terminology or history, but into how municipal policies directly impact LGBTQIA+ residents, and how council decisions can either break down barriers or reinforce them.

This work isn't optional. If we want to build a city where everyone feels safe to live openly and authentically, that commitment has to start with city leadership — in both action and accountability.

Joe Schember (D-Inc)

Under my leadership, the City of Erie has participated in cultural competency training for all employees through the Alchemy program. However, we are currently looking for a new provider, because we would like more in-depth training. In addition, Our police officers go through implicit bias training every year, we held cultural competency training with Dr. Rich McCarty, and we also did training with the FBI related to hate crimes and how to recognize them. We have always prided ourselves on ensuring that we are inclusive, and we intend to continue that training to ensure that we are being sensitive to the needs of our LGBTQIA+ communities. In terms of Council Members, the trainings that we offer are open to all staff, and I encourage them to take advantage of these opportunities.

Sheila Ellyn Woeger (D)

I have neither participated in nor would I recommend any training for staff or council. There is no amount of training that can change the heart of a person. I would however remind both staff and council of the golden rule as quoted in Matthew 7:12 of the Holy Bible. Therefore, all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them; for this is the Law and the Prophets.

Engagement Strategies Daria Devlin (D)

Policy and budgets shouldn't happen to people — they should be built with people. That's how I lead.

In Erie, we're fortunate to have incredible LGBTQIA+ organizations and leaders doing the hard work every day — NWPA, GEAE, Compton's Table, TransFamily, Erie Gay News, the LGBT Fund board, workplace affinity groups, and countless LGBTQIA+ community leaders. They know the challenges — and the solutions — because they live them.

If elected, I'll make sure these voices are not just heard but centered early and often — especially when it comes to decisions about housing, health, safety, and civil rights. That means real partnership, advisory groups, and showing up in community spaces year-round — not just during Pride Month.

A high score on the HRC Equality Index doesn't matter if people in our city are still facing discrimination in their daily lives. What matters is action — and I'm committed to doing this work with our LGBTQIA+ community every step of the way.

Joe Schember (D-Inc)

Since taking office, I have prioritized the City of Erie's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion which are key drivers of economic growth, serving to attract residents, visitors, and businesses who place a high value on inclusivity. We are focused on what matters: building community, growing the economy, and taking care of each other. When everyone feels supported, welcomed, and valued for their unique skills, perspectives, and talents, people thrive and contribute to our community. Our policies and practices enable us to strive to make Erie an inclusive place to live, work, play, and raise a family. I am grateful to our LGBTQ+ Advisory Council for their guidance and dedication in helping us to reach this milestone. In my third term, I would re-engage the Council to focus on continuing to expand our policies and practices to ensure that those who identify

as LGBTQIA+ feel welcome, safe, and supported. Sheila Ellyn Woeger (D)

All meetings are open to the public, where you are given the opportunity for your voice to be heard. It would take the participation of the community to engage themselves with the mayor and council as to what your needs are. Developing policy without empathy is fruitless.

Positively Influenced Daria Devlin (D)

During my work in the public and nonprofit sector, as an elected school board member, and now as a candidate for mayor, I've been deeply moved by the resilience and courage of Erie's LGBTQIA+ community. The moments that have shaped me the most haven't happened on a stage or in front of a microphone — they've happened in the quiet, personal conversations where people have trusted me with their stories.

I've listened to young people navigating systems that weren't built with them in mind. I've heard from parents advocating for their kids with a love and fierceness that leaves me in awe. I've met community leaders who have fought for decades just to create spaces where people can show up fully as themselves — and still, despite facing political hostility and a long history of discrimination, they keep showing up.

Especially in this moment — when the federal administration is targeting the transgender community and stoking fear for political gain — I find myself inspired every single day by the courage, joy, and authenticity. It's a reminder that leadership isn't just about policy — it's about standing alongside people in their fight to be seen, valued, and safe

Joe Schember (D-Inc)

I have been positively influenced by the LG-BTQIA+ community many times. This is personal to me because my son Joe is gay. I'll never forget the day he sat down with my wife and me to tell us. My immediate reaction was "Joe, I love you. You are my son. I could not be prouder of you." And, we've grown closer since that day several years ago. Every person deserves to live an authentic life and be treated with dignity and respect. I want to live in an Erie where diversity is valued by all - no matter the color of your skin, your religion, your ethnic background, your gender identity, or sexual orientation. Our differences should not define us or divide us. Our diversity is what makes us stronger as a community. That is clearly evident during Pride.

I can vividly recall how excited I was to be the first Mayor to participate in Pride when I took office in 2018. I was so honored to be asked to speak, and I was inspired by the excitement and engagement of the crowd. Each year, I am energized by the warm welcome I receive. My participation in Pride is a memory that I hold dear. I have been happy to witness the growth of the event over the last seven years, and I look forward to continuing to support, embrace, and

celebrate our LGBTQIA+ community. Sheila Ellyn Woeger (D)

What influences me the most about the LG-BTQIA + community is their tenacity in promoting their cause. It has stirred up my desire to spread the gospel of Jesus the Christ. John 3:16 tells us, For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. The key word here is love; and since GOD first loved us, we too ought to love one another.

Erie City Council

Nondiscrimination Policies Deonte Cooley (D)

I would first review the policies that are currently set into place to make sure that these areas are identified and being addressed before proceeding with creating any new policies. I would then schedule meetings with local unions and independent contractors to discuss these issues to see if there are particular or specific things that need to be addressed to be able to advocate for those who have been or feel they have been discriminated against. I believe it is important to conduct research on certain issues prior to implementing changes or enforcing policies based on my own opinions or opinions of just "one side" of those issues. It will be important to have open and effective communication in order to identify the need to implement change as well as the changes that need to be implemented to assure that all parties' needs are being met without conflict that would compromise the goals at hand.

Jasmine Flores (D-Inc)

I would ensure that all city contracts include clear, enforceable nondiscrimination language, specifically protecting sexual orientation, gender identity, race, disability, and more. I support requiring contractors to sign compliance statements and undergo basic equity training. I'd also advocate for periodic audits, anonymous reporting systems, and public accountability for violations. Enforcement should not be reactive it must be proactive, consistent, and transparent.

Marilyn Pol (D)

I will try to ensure all contractors have an equal chance at working within the City of Erie. I would keep an open conversation with the administration and the purchasing office.

Maurice "Mo" Troop (D-Inc)

It would start with making sure that there is a definition of discrimination that is public. Once this is established, I would stress the importance of developing ordinances that require contractors to comply with non-discrimination rules. With this, there would need to be mechanisms established to hold contractors accountable for failing to comply with the ordinances that are established. This would be one of the first steps I work to develop.

Darrel Vandeveld (D)

I would first update the City's code to explicitly include trans people, making sure that they are included in every aspect of the City's nondiscrimination policies. This is a basic first step. Next, I would make it mandatory that every city contract be audited, starting from the very first day of the contract, for compliance with the revised City ordinances, and require the results of these ongoing audits to be reported to Council periodically. Finally, I would require every entity seeking City contracts to be certified as having undergone LGBTQIA+Cultural Competency Training. These are some basic first steps in ensuring that the City awards contracts only to those entities that share our common goal of nondiscrimination toward members of the LGBTQIA+ community.

Yevet Anderson (R)

Since DEI is no longer in effect I believe that all contractors should not be discriminated upon but should receive equal and fair consideration through their merit, experience, and pricing. Contract should be given to Erie contractors first. Then if there is nothing available to meet the needs of the project the consideration should go to the county and if need be the state before it is outsourced away from our community.

However if it is outsourced then local labor must be prioritized.

Cultural Competency Training Deonte Cooley (D)

I have no experience in any formal or organized LGBTQIA+ Cultural Competency Training and only have had lived experiences with those who identify as being a part of the community. I am not sure of what trainings I would be able to recommend due to my lack of experience myself, but do believe that it is something that would be important in order to develop stronger relationships with all living in the city of Erie and learn ways to include underrepresented and misrepresented communities in local happenings within the city. I am not sure what that training would look like or entail, but I would be interested to learn more so that the appropriate advocacy and resources could be provided to those in need who may not be receiving those resources due to the lack of education

and information to support their needs. Jasmine Flores (D-Inc)

I've participated in community-based cultural competency training and informal learning through advocacy spaces. For staff, I'd recommend hands-on training focused on inclusive service delivery, pronoun usage, and bias awareness. For Council, we need deeper training around policy impacts, systemic barriers, and the unique needs of LGBTQIA+ residents. Training should be ongoing and led by LGBTQIA+

professionals, ideally from our local community.

Marilyn Pol (D)

I have not participated myself. As a council member I would be interested in inviting someone

from the LGBTQIA+ community come in and hold training with council members then employees.

Maurice "Mo" Troop (D-Inc)

In my career, I am fortunate to work with a variety of people from different cultures. A wide variety of training has been a regular part of my job. For staff and council, I would research what are the most current and up-to-date trainings to educate all staff and council in these areas. Some of these trainings may be completed online or through guest presenters. I would also make contact with local groups that represent LGBTQIA+, and ask them to partner in giving presentations or providing information for staff.

Darrel Vandeveld (D)

I recently completed three modules of LGBTQ-IA+ training offered by the Human Rights Campaign LEARN program (LGBTQ+101, Trans+Non-Binary 101, and Gender-Inclusive Language & Pronouns in the Workplace),

which were excellent. I pledge to complete the training by the date I am sworn in as a member of City Council. Further, I will insist that this training by undertaken by members of the Council and staff members. It's that important.

Yevet Anderson (R)

I've not received any training or attended any such training but I can tell you over my life I have not only worked with my family members who have alternative lifestyles, colleagues and individuals that I have coached in various levels of the sport of hockey. I believe that we should treat everyone equally according to God's plan. We are all created equal in my eyes.

Engagement Strategies Deonte Cooley (D)

I believe utilizing the information from the previous question would be the best approach to include and engage with LGBTQIA+ organizations and community members in developing policy and legislation. I believe that you can not speak for people you may not be fully educated about or on, so it is important to identify "champions" of those communities and allow them a seat at the table to have a voice for "their" people. In order to "speak for the people" you have to "hear from the people" and also "listen to the people." It will be important for me to create and establish relationships with those amongst the LGBTQIA+ community in order to develop any poli-

cies to address, support, or advocate for their needs. Jasmine Flores (D-Inc)

I believe in co-governance. I'd invite LG-BTQIA+ leaders into the policy process early through working groups, listening sessions, and advisory boards. I'd ensure meetings are safe and affirming spaces, accessible to all. I'd also use city communication platforms to uplift LGBTQIA+ voices and support equitable outreach. Representation matters

inclusion means real input, not just visibility.

Marilyn Pol (D)

I would like to have open discussions with possibly forming a committee meeting with the LGBTQIA+ and myself. This would be to try and make it easier to live, work and raise a family in the City of Erie.

Maurice "Mo" Troop (D-Inc)

I would work to establish a positive working relationship with members of the LGBTQIA+ community. I would do this by attending events organized by members of the LGBTQIA+ community. This would increase my visibility and accessibility. I would also set up meetings with members of the LGBTQIA+ community to get their feedback and input on policy and legislation. I would also look at how other cities are working in this area. They may already have positive strategies in practice that could be utilized in our city.

Darrel Vandeveld (D)

I support the work of the Erie LGBTQ Mayor's Advisory Council and will continue:

* Appointing LGBTQ liaisons to the mayor's office and Erie Bureau of Police,

* Supporting the continued ban within the city on conversion therapy, approved by Erie City Council in June 2019;

* Enforcing non-discrimination policies for city employment, including protections for LGBTQ applicants;

* Continuing health care benefits for transgender employees, INCLUDING their domestic partners;

* Continuing policies prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity in awarding city contracts;

* Continuing the bullying prevention project

for young people implemented through the Police Athletic League;

* Continuing the practice of appropriate hate crime reporting to the FBI.

Yevet Anderson (R)

I believe that if you are a citizen of the City Of Erie that your personal life choices should have no effect on you participating in discussions at city Council meetings and question answering and also should have no effect on your right to know on legislation or policies being made.

Positively Influenced Deonte Cooley (D)

I have been able to develop strong personal relationships with individuals who take pride in their connection with the LGBTQIA+ community and we have all been positively influenced by those relationships. I am not sure if it would be appropriate to name specific individuals or situations but I will share a podcast episode that I did with Angelica Spraggins where she interviewed me for my run for city council and spoke to some of her concerns. She is someone that I reach out to when I am in need of advice, and outside perspective, or someone to just hang with a

smoke a cigar down at "The Brig".

Jasmine Flores (D-Inc)

During a housing equity meeting, a trans resident shared their experience with discrimination and safety concerns. That conversation deeply impacted me and shifted how I approached housing policy. It reminded me that real change starts with listening. The courage and leadership I see in Erie's LGBTQIA+ community continues to inspire how I

serve with compassion, equity, and accountability. Marilyn Pol (D)

While attending high school in the 1970's it was not common to know anyone who was openly out. I have been positively influenced by my children by their personal experiences growing up in a time where the LGBTQIA+ community was more acceptable. It has been so nice seeing some of their friends get married and start families of their own. Hopefully with each generation it gets easier for those in the LGBTQIA+ community live with the support of their community.

Maurice "Mo" Troop (D-Inc)

I was influenced by a lifelong friend. This friend has shown me throughout life, what it means to be a loyal friend. Whenever I was going through a difficult situation, I could always call on him. He would listen without judgment. This both inspired and taught me important life lessons about friendship.

Darrel Vandeveld (D)

My sister and my daughter (and her wife) are lesbian, so the issues surrounding LGBTQIA+ and their full participation in government, industry and business and in society in all its strata are of central importance to me. I was particularly gratified when my sister and daughter came out to me that they did so with no anxiety that I would be anything other than totally welcoming of the news. My only concern for them has been that LGBTQIA+ persons are nowhere near the total acceptance that they should be. My fears for my sibling and my daughter and daughter-in-law, which are only rational given how unenlightened American society presently is, are with me constantly. The battle continues!

Yevet Anderson (R)

I have been blessed over the years to work with a variety of people. I have coached at the national and international level with my great gay colleagues and I have been blessed to coach many hockey players of a preference lifestyle. Do not agree though that transgender men should be allowed to play in women's sports only because of the physical differences that could be dangerous in in many sports. I unfortunately had a young lady whose parents insisted she play with the boys in high school school and she was checke on and broke her spine she was one of my Olympic perspectives. If I was still running the senior league if there was a trans team of men I would give them the opportunities to play with the men's league.

The "Red Zone" is a critical and often overlooked period on college campuses, referring to the first six to eight weeks of the academic year when students, particularly freshmen, are at the highest risk for sexual assault. This period is marked by a convergence of factors that make new students especially vulnerable, including their unfamiliarity with campus resources, a desire to fit in, and increased social activity, often involving alcohol.

During the Red Zone, incoming students are navigating new social environments and building relationships, which can sometimes lead to situations where boundaries are crossed. The pressures of adapting to college life can also make students less likely to recognize or avoid risky situations.
